News Behind the News
 The Inside Story From
 The Capital

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WASHINGTON, June 16.—What the world statesmen secretly have been fearing is an alliance of Italy, Germany, Japan and, perhaps, Poland.

That would line the world up for war, with France, Russia and, eventually, Britain on the other side.

Such unspoken thoughts agitated the inner diplomatic circles as Mussolini and Hitler closed the door of that Venetian villa the other day and bussed in each other's cars, without even a stenographer or an interpreter present. It is an interesting possibility, but it will never happen. Mussolini is too smart.

STAGE THUNDER

The Hitler-Mussolini meeting was a staged show. The producer was Mr. Mussolini, who is the greatest showman since Barnum.

He dressed himself all up in the uniform of a fascist corporal. His fascists put on the required demonstration for him just the same as followers of a presidential candidate whoop up demonstrations for their favorites in our national conventions.

To top it off, a dagger parade was held with the fascist marching before Messrs. Mussolini and Hitler with bared daggers aloft. The daggers were aimed at the skies, but Mr. Hitler got the point. He was in civilian clothes, the official pockets of which are so empty he could not buy daggers enough for a first-class street brawl.

SCHEME

The hidden purpose of the show was to offset the Franco-Russian alliance from a diplomatic standpoint. That is not very much of a secret.

Messrs. Mussolini and Hitler are the two European bad boys who were not invited to that alliance party. At least Mussolini received a belated invitation which he was not expected to accept and Hitler was completely snubbed.

At heart, Mussolini dislikes France as much as anyone. That is saying a lot, because he also dislikes Russia, Japan and Germany, in the order named. In fact, the only one he really likes is Mussolini.

But his game is to stay on the fence in Europe, playing first with one side and then with the other. That is historic Italian foreign policy. It was so even before the World War. In the present Franco-Russian game, Mussolini would rate no higher than a substitute halfback. In the German game, he can be a star quarterback.

Furthermore, he wanted something from Germany now—the independence of Austria. To gain that, he fought the German battle for increased armaments at the various European conferences.

PROSPECTS

You can get sincere assurances privately in Italian quarters that Mussolini does not intend to go as far as getting tied up on a long contract with Germany and Japan. He will act as if he is doing it, but he will not actually do it.

Obtaining a pledge of Austrian independence from Hitler now will heal a European sore spot and really make war more remote. And next month he will team up on the other side of the fence.

It's a great game they play in European diplomacy—somewhat like our log-rolling in congress, only a little dirtier.

LEAKAGE

There was turmoil backstage in the senate when the administration's compromise labor bill leaked out.

Floor Leader Robinson brought it from the White House, looking around corners as he went, so no one would see him. He slipped a copy to republican leader McNary secretly. The next he heard, copies were all over the press gallery and had been published in one paper.

Robinson warned newsmen that if they published the bill they would violate his wishes and perhaps also the federal law against publication of secret government documents.

Newsmen said that was too bad, and anyway, the bill was not a government document. What happened was this: When McNary got a copy, he had several copies made so republican senators could look it over and decide whether they were going to support it. Several senators slipped copies to newsmen and, in a few minutes, the bill was all over the place.

The reason the White House and Senator Robinson were so angry was that the bill had to be materially altered later.

NOTES

Enactment of the railroad pension bill is supposed to have been part of a deal made by the administration with the rail workers several months ago to avoid a strike. At least, that is the word spread among democrats in congress, and it explains why the measure was enacted so suddenly.

The reason the house cut down the Nazi investigation appropriation has been sloppy. Much good testimony had been brought out, but not in an effective or striking way. The committee members are mostly amateur congressional investigators who paid their leading investigator more than Mr. Pecora received for his successful stock market inquiry.

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Telling the Editor

ABOUT FURS
 SILVER SPRING, Md.—(To the Editor)—I had the privilege of visiting Annapolis Sunday afternoon, and they really do have quite a school. I found a good many of the students in real action, such as running hurdles, pole vaulting, throwing the discus and javelin, and so forth. The way they play and the effort they put forth looked like real work to me.

After three weeks at the institute school I have become quite familiar with our course of training, and the one subject that appeals to me most of all is furs and the methods of handling them. One reason I am so interested in this particular subject is because we have a good many furs in the West. And I think one gets a great deal of pleasure from doing something one really understands. It just so happens that at this time of year furs must be given attention and put away for summer storage. The institute plant has at the present time between \$50,000 and \$55,000 worth of fur coats which are being prepared for storage. All of which we have the opportunity of following through their different processes.

Our course on furs is one of the stiffest subjects we have, and covers the following processes:

1—Identification of furs. (174 in number.)

2—From what part of the world each of these furs comes from.

3—The durability of the different furs.

4—Tanning of the raw skins.

5—Re-tanning and oiling of furs which have become dry from age or other reasons.

6—Fur glazing.

7—Fur bleaching and electrolyzing.

8—Proper methods of sewing and taping furs.

9—Proper method of cleaning the different furs.

All these furs are divided into four classes:

1—The most beautiful furs.

2—The most durable furs.

3—Less durable furs.

4—Non-durable furs.

This work is under the supervision of Mr. Joseph Kocals, who has actually been in this work for more than 45 years, and who is recognized as one of the leading furriers in the United States. I believe this will be a very valuable part of my course here at the school.
