NEW YORK, June 16, (AP)—With the threatened steel strike off, at least for the moment, and the National lawmakers about to quit for the summer, stocks resumed their advance in today's brief market. While trading was relatively dull, numerous gains of fractions to around 2 points were recorded. The close was firm. Transfers approximated 600,000 shares.

The declaration of temporary peace in the important steel industry had been fairly well discounted, but brokerage houses reported that sentiment for equities, as a whole, was noticeably improved.

The financial district was cheered by the house approval of the substitute Wagner Bill containing the administration's proposal for dealing with labor disputes.

The German debt moratorium seemingly failed as a market deterrent although some international bankers felt that the final word in this situation has yet to be said.
