

JUDGE AGAIN CLASHES WITH PROSECUTOR

viduals investigated in such instances but selected himself out from the number investigated to be the chosen and favored individual for whom the grand jury should return "not a true bill" for the purpose of assuming to exonerate the said Hardin C. Blackmer.

The judge went on to say that Blackmer refused to step aside and let some disinterested attorney appear before the grand jury, but instead appeared there personally and by his deputy, William Kaykendall, who was dependent upon Blackmer for continuance in office.

"This court has reason to believe, and does believe instead of fairly and impartially presenting both the facts and the law to the grand jury in question the said Hardin C. Blackmer and his deputy labored diligently to persuade the grand jury that the said conduct on the part of his and the said Hardin C. Blackmer did not constitute a violation of the provisions of the laws."

Judge Ashurst repeated charges against Blackmer, particularly that in the case of N. S. F. checks he allegedly failed to prosecute but instead took compensation for making collections on these checks.

Judge Ashurst cited section 11-112 of the Oregon laws to prove his right to appoint a special district attorney. This section provides for such appointment when a district attorney "fails to attend any court at which he is required to be, or shall be related to the accused by consanguinity of affinity, or prior to his election as district attorney, shall have represented the accused in the matter to be investigated before the grand jury or the crime charged in the indictment, or shall be associated with the accused in business," and for various other reasons.

New Jury Called
"Thus," said the judge, "under the terms and provisions of this statute this court has authority and power to appoint a special district attorney whenever it is found the district attorney duly and regularly appointed is interested in the matter to be investigated."

Judge Ashurst's order indicated that the present grand jury will not again hear the Blackmer case. It states the malfeasance charge is re-submitted to the grand jury at the December term of court immediately upon the selection and impaneling of the new grand jury at the expiration of the term of the present grand jury.

The affidavits of prejudice filed by Blackmer cover nine cases of such affidavits in criminal cases by the representative of the state has seldom occurred in courts here, and is regarded as indicative of the stress between the district attorney's office and the circuit court judge.

In each affidavit, Blackmer stated that Judge Ashurst "is prejudiced against me that I cannot have a fair and impartial trial before said judge."

In one case, that of former County Commissioner C. R. Williams, charged with malfeasance, Williams himself had filed an affidavit of prejudice against Ashurst.

Local attorneys, asked what would be done if the court should refuse to grant the request for a new jury made in the affidavits, discussed the possibility of mandamus proceedings in supreme court, Judge Ashurst, however, has given no indication he will not grant the motion in any case. In the cases of Williams and County Judge George Grizzle, he told attorneys several days ago he would immediately grant such requests.

Semon still receives the support of William Graham, Portland democrat, and Earl Hill, late county republican and minority floor leader. In addition Moore Hamilton, Jackson county candidate, will swing his vote to Semon when he is informed there has been no "deal" in the swing for Semon. Along with Hamilton's vote may go his dozen or more pledges in his own behalf.

Forward LaTouraine of Portland heads the opposing forces, and with the aid of his friends is making a strenuous campaign with imposing results.

Damage May Be Million
The terrorizing vibrations gripped this city of 12,990 with such intensity that Oscar Baaron, city engineer, estimated the damage might run as high as \$1,000,000. Other estimates were several hundred thousand dollars lower.

Colonel E. H. Williams, commander of the 153rd Infantry, Montana national guard, ordered members of the Helena company to be prepared in uniform for service, but martial law was not declared.

As the quake swayed Helena for about 12 seconds, the brick facing of many buildings peeled, crashed into the streets and was scattered. The shock began at 9:47 p. m., mountain standard time.

Building Wall Topples
The front wall of an unoccupied structure fell in a pile and killed Harris. The building stood on South Main street, an historic traffic artery which follows "Last Chance gulch," scene of glamorous mining adventures of yesteryear.

It was several moments before anyone in that section knew the quake had taken a life. The body was under a pile of bricks, which stood two feet deep in the street. The entire city was thrown into darkness for a period by the paralyzing of light and power facilities.

New School Suffers
A new half-million dollar high school, which went into use this fall, suffered severely. A chimney was knocked down and bricks fell from the walls that had not yet been weather-stained. Two floors caved in at the National Biscuit company factory. The roof of the state arsenal fell and damaged trucks and national guard motor vehicles.

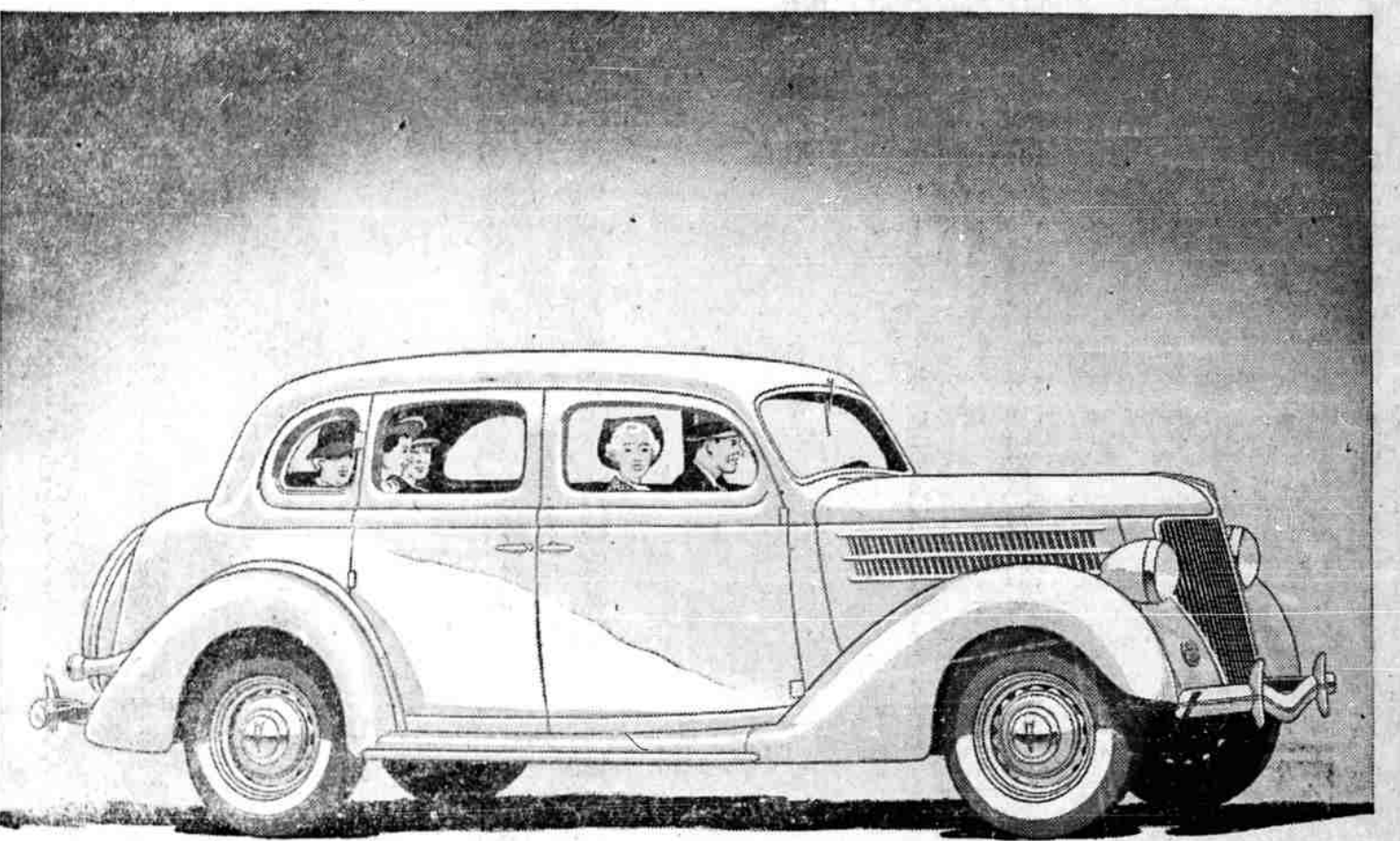
