6-MEN RECEIVE MARKS OF MERIT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21. (AP)—J. Edgar Hoover, director of the federal bureau of investigation, called 23 police officers together to get their diplomas today as first graduates of the "G-Men's" police training school.

The bureau's "Little Red School House" of law enforcement will be continued, Hoover announced, to create "a permanent body of officers who will be a link between the bureau and the local police throughout the country."

The second class of 25 officers, selected from more than 200 applicants, will start the 12-week course within a few weeks.

"In three or four years we will have at least one man in every police department in the country who will be a liaison officer between the local force and the F. B. I.," Hoover said.

In their three months on the bureau "camp," the police officers studied technique, investigations, fingerprinting, crime laboratory work, law and penology. "Sham" raids on kidnapers' hideouts were staged at the marine base at Quantico. "Oscar," the bureau's dummy, who has been "murdered" hundreds of times, was "killed" some more, and the policemen-students were ordered to find clues leading to his slayers.

Fire Season at End in Klamath

Marking the close of the forest fire season, the Klamath Forest Protective association called in its last lookout Monday. The association has started its annual slash-burning program, which begins when the woods are wet in the autumn.

The chamber of commerce received word Monday that the regional forester had cancelled requirements for camp fire permits in the national forests. The slash-bucketing regulation is also off, as well as the prohibition against smoking while traveling.

Jack Kimball of the forest protective association said that the season had been generally favorable, except for the series of incendiary fires that burned over a total of about 18,000 acres, mostly range land, in the Bonanza country. There were no other serious fires, and the Bonanza blaze damaged only a small amount of timber, which will be salvaged.

Plans are now being made by the association for its winter beetle control program. Work will probably be done north of Bly and west of Klamath Falls.

FOURTH PARALYSIS DEATH REPORTED

Two more Keno deaths from infantile paralysis were reported Monday.

The victims were Duane Evans Parker, 12, and Nell Wallace Gifford, 13. They were both among the first stricken in the current epidemic at Keno.

The Gifford boy died Sunday night, a few hours after young Parker's death.

Dr. G. S. Newsom, county health officer, said no new cases had been reported. In the current epidemic the cases have all occurred at Keno.

The schools at that western Klamath village are closed, and will remain so for at least three weeks. The school at Weyerhaeuser camp is also closed, although there have been no cases there.

STATE PROTESTS RIVER POLLUTION

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 21. (AP)—State Game Supervisor Frank B. Wire sent a registered letter today to the St. Helens' Pulp & Paper mill, ordering it to cease polluting the Willamette river where thousands of dead fish were found yesterday and today.

Meanwhile Wire communicated with the attorney-general's office, seeking means of action if acid from the St. Helens' mill is found to be the cause of the deaths.
