Generally steady tone was continued here for potatoes although no real snap to the buying by retailers was suggested. Arrivals of Deschutes to date have shown very disappointing quality.

Applies in heavy supply were selling at extremely low prices. Grape market was generally firmer to higher, including Concord.

Oranges were up about a dime a case.

Arizona grapefruit was due for the first time this season and nominally priced \$3.75 for 30s.

Sweet potatoes were higher, with California growers together and naming a minimum price.

Sales of walnuts in Portland were practically nominal as a result of the trade fight and shaded values.

Some rather good southern Oregon casahs were being offered around 2c pound.

California market was a trifle easier locally and for carlots.

# National and Local Markets

**DESCHUTES SPUDS SHORT IN QUALITY**

PORTLAND, Oct. 21. —Advances were forced in the entire domestic cheese price during the last week. The advances were generally 1/2 to 1c pound, the greatest rises being shown as a rule in the western sector.

Trading in the butter market is showing price advances with all cube prices higher for the late season of the produce exchange. The advance of 1c pound in the buying price on butterfat followed.

Actual shortage of good quality large eggs is influencing the price upward locally as well as in the markets of the country generally. The supply of medium is maintaining but pullets are decreasing.

Demand for live chickens remained good and prices in general continued to be maintained. There were only moderate offerings aside from springers which are somewhat better than other lines.

### Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Oct. 21. (AP)—Speeding motors ran away from most contentions in today's stock market, although scattered specialties were close seconds.

It was one of the most active sessions in more than a year, numerous "new highs" were recorded, with gains ranging from one to three points or so among the favorites. The close was firm. Transfers approximated 2,800,000 shares.

Buying orders swamped the ticker tape early with a business of about 800,000 shares in the first hour. There was considerable profit taking, but this failed to shake the leaders to any great extent. It was observed that most rails, utilities, steels and coppers were unable to get anywhere.

Economic optimism helped sentiment as well as reports from Europe and Africa that peace moves were impending. Clearing also was the estimate of the American Iron & Steel Institute that mill operations this week would be 1.4 points above the rate last week, at the highest point since last February.

Besides the motor equities section, demand also appeared for the aircrafts, textiles and a few chemicals.
