

GOOD WORKERS ON PAYROLLS IN LUMBERING

and some winter operations are in prospect. Usually, lumber moves somewhat freer during the fall period. The survey of employment included the number of men at work in mills, box factories, planing mills and woods. Due to the fact there are a large number of small, independent operations of one kind or another, it was necessary to make some estimates, but the totals are backed up by many figures obtained directly from operators.

Firms who answered the questionnaires sent out include the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, the Ewauna Box company, Forest Lumber company, Pelican Bay Lumber company, Klamath Lumber and Box company, Big Lakes Box company, Deschutes Lumber company, Algonquin Lumber company, Lemus Lumber company, Crane Mills, Kesterson Lumber corporation, Crater Lake Lumber company and Shaw-Bertram Lumber company.

A survey made in the Lakeview district included the Adams Lumber company, Buzzard Lumber company, Lester de Armond, De Armond Brothers band mill, Lakeview Sash and Door company, Lakeview Pine Lumber company, Underwood Lumber company, Crane Creek Lumber company, Peterson and Johnson, Fields and Wilhelm and Deter Brothers.

The survey showed that many plants throughout the Lake and Klamath country have been running more than one shift.

While Klamath has been getting a current economic boost from the lumber industry, there is also proof that it still boasts huge resources to be drawn on in the future.

County Assessor Charles H. Mack has prepared a summary of timber valuations, covering 17 larger private holdings in the county, which show 5,153,450,800 feet of pine in these holdings.

Weyerhaeuser Timber company leads with 2,314,562,000 feet of pine, and 499,252,000 feet of mixed.

thirty-five years. During all those years I have never known him to do a dishonorable act. He is a man of integrity and known as such all over this county."

He went on to state that the indictment of such a man was a reflection on all the church people in the county and in particular on the Presbyterian church, with which Judge Grizzle has long been identified as an elder, a Bible teacher, and an outstanding member.

Dr. Wright predicted that when all the facts and circumstances should be fully known, Judge Grizzle would be entirely cleared of any criminal intent or purpose. He referred to the fact that this clean-up campaign had been heralded abroad in various ways before it was started, thus serving notice on the criminal element and enabling the real crooks to get under cover.

then said a few words: "What I would say has already been said by another. Who steals my purse, steals trash; 'Twas something; nothing. 'Twas mine; 'tis his; But he who fishes from me my good name, Robs me of that which not enriches him, but makes me poor indeed."

"There are losses that men can bear with equanimity. If death comes to a home, all sympathize, but when a man's character is attacked, many entertain and voice suspicions. It is always well to bear in mind that an incident is not a trial. Only one side has been heard and no opportunity for defense is given."

He then stated that if he were personally involved he would insist on a public trial and resist any attempt to quash the indictment.

The vote was then taken and proved to be unanimous. The resolution follows: "We, the congregation of the First Presbyterian Church of Klamath Falls, at an informal meeting of the congregation held in the church, Sunday, October 20th, 1935, adopt the following resolution: "RESOLVED: That we express our fullest confidence in the honesty and integrity of George D. Grizzle, who for over thirty years past has held membership and office in our church organization and during that period of time has maintained the highest record for probity in all his dealings and an unblemished character; that we deplore the present situation in which George D. Grizzle has been placed; that we earnestly request our membership and others to withhold judgment until this matter has been properly tried and determined; and that, relying on our estimate of the man himself, we state our firm belief that a full knowledge of all the facts and circumstances will entirely clear him of any criminal intent or purpose."

The First Presbyterian church is the oldest and largest religious body in Klamath county. Dr. Smith stated. The action was taken in order that the general public might withhold judgment," says the pastor, "until the proper judicial procedure will reveal to the whole community all the facts involved and, at the same time, know the high esteem in which Judge Grizzle is held by his fellow church members."

occupy his seat. The attorney general's rule eliminated Dickson and the Multnomah county commission named Boody. It was held by the attorney general that Dickson accepted a federal position and therefore forfeited his seat.

Low Wallace Challenged
The same ruling affected Low Wallace in the house, except he had accepted a state position, that with the same commission. He has challenged the right of Robert S. Farrell, Jr., of Portland to occupy his seat. Both committees reported they could not complete their work by noon, and the senate adjourned to 1:30 and the house to 1:00 p. m.

The right of Representative Glenn O. Taylor of Jackson county to occupy his seat in the house was challenged in the house credentials committee meeting during noon, and this issue was being considered by the group.

Taylor would come under the same attorney general's opinion. It was declared, since he holds a position as assistant clerk to the federal court.

SECURITY BILL SUBMITTED

SALEM, Oct. 21. (AP)—The first social security bill was thrown into the senate hopper today by Senator Alan Blyden, who declared he would follow it with another soon. Blyden stated, however, these were his own bills and were not administration measures.

The first bill, to be known as S. B. 2, will reduce the old age pension qualification from 70 years to 65 years. This is to be followed by one which would shift the burden of matching the old age pension fund of the federal government from the counties to the state.

SALEM, Oct. 21. (AP)—To Senator James H. Hazlett of Wasco county goes the distinction of introducing the first bill in the senate at the special legislative session. It will be S. B. 1.

This bill would exempt the R. F. C. Mortgage corporation from the payment of an annual license fee of \$200 in this state. Similar exemptions have been granted in other states, Hazlett said.

forts of recent weeks were given a vote of confidence with his victory in Sunday's parliamentary elections—was reported, unofficially, to have received suggestions from Il Duce for settlement of the east African conflict.

British Action Awaited
The premier was said to be awaiting the debate in the British parliament this week before submitting the proposals to London.

French officials would not comment on the report, but they said: "The greatest problem now seems to be to get Emperor Haile Selassie to accept Italian terms."

In Paris, Mussolini was considered certain to refuse to return to Haile Selassie any of the Ethiopian territory his armies already have occupied.

King Must Accept
Authoritative quarters in London indicated the proposals for peace in East Africa were crystallizing after diplomatic conversations in Rome, Paris and London.

It was emphasized, however, such proposals were in the very earliest stages and it would be erroneous to say that anything definite had developed, or to say great optimism prevailed.

London circles said any East African peace plan must be wholly acceptable both to Emperor

Haile Selassie and to the league of nations. Diplomats were in something of a quandary about this: How were they going to devise a peace plan acceptable under the covenant of the league, after the league plainly outlawed Mussolini for recasting to war in Ethiopia in disregard of his covenants under the league?

As for the tense situation that prevailed between Italy and England, it was felt in London this crisis had been merely suspended and not solved.

Moore To Present Resolutions
Mussolini, it was understood, conferred with Sir Eric Drummond, the British ambassador, again over the week-end, and gave him assurance Italy had no design on British interests, in East Africa or elsewhere.

The opening of the British parliament tomorrow, with its certain debate on the international situation, was uppermost in the thoughts of diplomats today.

They looked to Sir Samuel Hoare, the foreign secretary, for a complete analysis of the British position and felt it likely Sir Samuel might dwell, at least briefly, on the possibilities for peace.

Italy Gets Warning
As the Italian armies were massed between Addis and Adigrat, in northern Tigre province, for the "big push" southward, into the interior, an Ethiopian communique, issued at its legation in London, warned Italy against the "ghastly methods" of poison gas and dumdum bullets.

The legation said it had impartial substantiation of Italy's use of "unfair and ultra-civilized methods of warfare."

"We take the opportunity," the communique said, "heretofore to warn the Italian forces that if they continue to use such ghastly methods against simple, unarmed peoples that, notwithstanding the order of his majesty, Emperor Haile Selassie, I, it will not be possible to restrain the wilder section of the Ethiopian army from retaliating in some similar savage method on Italian soldiers who may happen to fall into their hands."

"The white race," the statement said, "will be intensely hated by all the people of Africa and, we think, of Asia also, for years to come."

The Ethiopian minister of war, Ras Muluzgeta, left for the southern front in Tigre province, in the neighborhood of Makale, in a communique issued in Rome, by General Rudolfo Graziani, commander of the Italian forces in the southern Ethiopian Ogaden sector, said Sultan Olo-Dinle, a chief of the Selavelli region of Ogaden province, had deserted to the Fascist cause.

Graziani reported victory in an engagement with Ethiopian warriors, October 18. His troops successfully stormed the fortress at Dagnerrel on the Webbe Shilheh river. Fourteen Italian native troops were killed and 40 wounded.

KLAMATH HAS HEAVY LOSSES IN LIVESTOCK

aside on the west side of Upper Klamath lake as this entire area was patrolled by coyotes throughout the nesting and hatching season.

Other scattered reports indicate that the same situation is true in other sections of the county where wild ducks and geese normally hatch and brood their young.

Loss from coyotes alone amounts to several times the number of ducks and geese taken by hunters in Klamath county. Figures compiled by sheepmen at Saturday's meeting showed that between 15,000 and 20,000 head of sheep have been killed by these animals since flocks were turned out on the range last spring.

Special Group Named
The meeting Saturday was called for the purpose of discussing ways and means to eliminate and prevent the damage done by predatory animals, and operators representing more than 75,000 head of sheep voted unanimously to place a tax of two cents per head on their flocks in order to raise funds for coyote control.

A special committee, consisting of farmers, sheep operators and representatives of the American Legion wild life committee, was appointed to meet with the Klamath county budget committee to ask for special funds for cooperative work in predatory animal control.

The matter is also being taken up with the Oregon game commission which is being asked to assist in the work.

Applications for special assistance from the WPA will also be made, according to County Agricultural Agent C. A. Henderson, in order to work out a county program which will be effective at once.

The committee is headed by Jim O'Keefe of Merrill, chairman. Other members are: Chester Haskins, Merrill; W. H. Casebeer, Bonanza; Jerry O'Conner, Klamath Falls; Hal Ogile, Weyerhaeuser camp; E. A. Geary, Klamath Falls; Lee McMullen, Klamath Falls, and County Agent C. A. Henderson, Klamath Falls.

Those in attendance at Saturday's meeting included many of the largest sheep operators of the county, all of whom had kept accurate records of the losses sustained by predatory animals throughout the past year.
