

JUDGE ASHURST REVERSED IN CONTEMPT CASE

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give an opportunity for the charge to be reduced to writing and permit the defendant to answer thereto."

The Driscoll case developed with sensational suddenness last March, when Judge Ashurst halted the insurance man before him and made the contempt charges.

Driscoll was told to return to court at a certain time, and when he did so, he was sentenced to pay a \$100 fine and to spend 60 days in the county jail. Judge Ashurst denied bond at the time, but a day later granted bond after Driscoll had spent one night in jail.

Notice of appeal was made immediately after the sentence, and on September 13, the supreme court held a hearing on this matter. At that time Arthur Schaupp, local attorney, and Harding C. Blackmer, as district attorney, appeared as representatives of the state (respondent) and T. R. Gillevaters of Gillenwaters, Van Vactor and Gilmore, appeared in behalf of the appellant.

Judge Ashurst accused Driscoll of having attempted, while talking to him in chambers, to influence the court in connection with the case of Lamm Lumber company versus Keaton Lumber company, then pending in court.

Judge Ashurst, after hearing of the reversal on Tuesday, issued the following statement:

"This court extends congratulations to Mr. Driscoll and his attorneys for their legal victory in the supreme court.

"I must admit that I would

have been more gratified had the supreme court found it possible to sustain this court in its efforts to administer the law in a manner conducive to the interests of good government and a clean and honorable administration of the law.

"While I am naturally disappointed, we must bow to the decision of our supreme court judges, each and all of whom are men of high honor, unquestioned integrity and men of experience and great learning.

"While this is a defeat for the court, it is likewise a defeat for the moral and intellectual forces which are striving for supremacy. "I am firmly convinced that while the supreme court could not and did not condone or approve of the conduct of the defendant, they simply found that under the provisions of the Oregon statute, defendant could not be held legally accountable.

"Notwithstanding the fact that this court was not sustained, the action taken in this case by this court has had a beneficial effect, in that questions coming before this court can be decided without undue influence being brought to bear.

"This court is not, and will not be amenable to outside political influence or otherwise. "The court tells me that 'I care not who makes the laws if I may take the judges flailing.'

"This court will continue in the future, as it has in the past, to make an effort to correct the evils adverted to by Plutarch, to the end that private individuals shall not be permitted to make merchandise of the misfortunes of their fellow man."

quarantine. All homes in which cases originated are still under quarantine, and the contacts in the home will be inspected daily during the period of incubation.

"All physicians are on their guard, and are taking no chances on doubtful cases, which are immediately isolated until definite diagnosis can be made. Two such cases are now in isolation. "NOT ONE CASE DIAGNOSED AS INFANTILE PARALYSIS HAS ORIGINATED IN KLAMATH FALLS and there are no active cases in the city. One case, from Keno, is in the isolation hospital.

"No active cases have developed since Saturday.

"The county health authorities, the state police, Klamath Falls police and sheriff's office are cooperating in an effort to prevent persons from coming into Klamath Falls from Keno."

Dr. Newsum said that there have been numerous wild rumors, grossly exaggerating the number of cases and confusing the location of those which have developed. For this reason he adopted the plan of issuing official bulletins, making public complete information.

BOTH HOUSES BEGIN STUDY OF CAPITOL

Some of the bills which had appeared previously were again introduced. One by Senator Hess provided for the elimination of all interest and penalty on delinquent taxes on real and personal property of counties due and payable during 1935 and prior years.

Insurance Plan Offered
Senator Burke proposed a measure repealing the compulsory student fee at higher educational institutions which was passed last session. An initiative petition has been filed asking for the same action.

A measure by Senator Duncan would limit the jurisdiction of the state utilities commission to control of utilities engaged wholly in some utility function, and not those indirectly engaged in utility business. Senator Stringer proposed a bill limiting salaries of retired officers and employees of Oregon higher educational institutions to \$1,500 a year.

Insurance for state buildings on a basis of 70 per cent of their sound value was proposed by Senator Pearson. The state now only carries a small restoration fund. Senator Burke in another proposal requested the repeal of the 1935 egg grading law.

General committees were announced in the house also, but the senate was awaiting the report of its credentials committee on the contest for a seat between Ashby Dickson and Nate Boody of Portland before taking further action. That committee was expected to turn in a divided report later today.

SALEM, Oct. 22. (AP)—Both of the houses of the state legislature were set to go today as the house of representatives completed organization late yesterday after finally voting 30 to 29 to seat Robert S. Farrell of Portland in place of Lew Wallace.

BOYS GET STEERS FOR FOUR-H WORK

Three boys, Charles Rudolf, Bobby Norris and Bruce Hess, of the Hines Baby Beef club, secured Shorthorn steers to be used in the 4-H Baby Beef club work this winter. The steers were secured from W. E. Hammond of Merrill and each weighed 460 pounds, costing 75 cents per pound.

These are probably the first of 30 or 40 steers which will be on feed by 4-H club members by the middle of November, to be fed out during the winter and spring and shown at baby beef shows in the late spring and fall of next year.

This is a fairly new project in Klamath county and is under the direction of Clifford Jenkins, county club agent, in cooperation with local leaders of 4-H Baby Beef clubs. One of the stipulations is that each boy taking the work must own his own calf and feed and care for it during the year. The boys are very much interested in the prospects and there will no doubt be some prime baby beef on the market next spring that will bring a premium from buyers.

the tense feeling between Rome and London, one of the day's developments was likely to add to the strained relationship.

The Italians barred from circulation in Italy the London Daily Telegraph, a conservative newspaper and regarded in political circles as the mouthpiece of Captain Anthony Eden, Britain's leader at Geneva.

While an unconfirmed Exchange Telegraph report said the Ethiopians suffered heavy losses in assaulting the Italian lines, official communiques said all was quiet at the tropics.

Heavy rains in the southeast Ethiopian desert area delayed the northward drive toward Harar of the Roman legions under Rudolf Graziani.

The Italian forces in the north of Ethiopia likewise were inactive.

Apparently, the northern forces were awaiting the end of the belated rains in the south before continuing their advance into the interior.

In Rome, the whole idea of Mussolini's Fascist government seemed to be this: To conquer as much of Ethiopia as quickly as possible to be in the best bargaining position.

ALARM EXPRESSED FOR MISSIONARIES

NANKING, Oct. 22. (AP)—Apprehension was expressed today by friends of American and British missionaries who fled Lanchow, Kansu Province, October 8 before an invasion of Chinese communists.

No word has been heard from the missionaries since they boarded inflated goatskin rafts to travel by the perilous Yellow river to Paotow, thence to Peiping.

He cited what other states had done in obtaining adequate capitol sites, and announced he was adverse to a skyscraper type of building on the narrow grounds now owned by the state, declaring 25 stories would be required.

Five Sites Named
In addition to the purchase of the Willamette University campus adjoining the present grounds the executive listed five other proposed sites, naming the Candalaria Heights outside the South Salem city limits as the alternate proposal. He likewise cited opinions of attorneys opposing the attorney general's ruling that the capitol could not be built outside the city limits of 1864, which would eliminate the alternate proposal and another site suggestion.

In discussing the second proposal the executive declared that in addition to a capitol for housing the legislative branches and chief state officials, there would soon be need of a state library, state office building, governor's mansion and a museum. He made no recommendation as to type of building.

Salem Aid Considered
State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman's proposal for financing the construction, with federal aid, out of the general fund by direct appropriation within the next three years was cited in the message.

In addition to the direct appropriation the message suggested the site could be purchased, with the aid of the city of Salem, from liquor revenues, "or the cost of both can be secured from the liquor revenues." He recently issued a statement favoring
