National and Local Markets

KLAMATH SPUDS CONTINUE TO GAIN INTEREST

PORTLAND, Oct. 22, (AP)—Curtailed of the record spread between extra and standard grade of butter was accomplished during the late session of the produce exchange when an advance of 1/4 pound was made in the latter along with a similar rise for firsts.

No further change was made in butterfat.

Market for eggs reflected a strong tone locally. Receipts were decreasing and especially so for the large and small stuff. Demand for fresh eggs was gaining with decrease in call for storage.

Further showing of strength was suggested for live chickens in general along the wholesale way with indications of a slightly better price offered.

There is a far better demand at the moment for No. 2 potatoes than for No. 1 although the interest in Deschutes and Klamath offerings is gaining. Unusually good quality is showing from Ellensburg, Wash.

Slipping tone has been shown for some days in the cauliflower trade. Warm weather in the Chicago area has curtailed call and buying prices have dropped from 55c to 50-60c within a week.

Trifle slower trade is again reported for country killed meats. Previous high values in veal, hogs and lambs have somewhat curtailed consumption.

Just a limited volume of new business is passing for onions in carload lots, with no change in price.

Further climb in orange and lemon prices by California interests was confirmed. In oranges 288s and smaller are up 15c and there has been a general rise in lemons of 25c case.

Grapes were generally higher again in the south and local Concord was stronger.

Hot-house tomatoes were finding more favor with field grown stock not very good.

Puget sound is taking considerable Oregon vegetables.
