NOTICE OF REGULAR ANNUAL ELECTION AND UNITED STATES CONTRACT ELECTION OF LANGELL VALLEY IRRIGATION DISTRICT, KLAMATH COUNTY, OREGON.

Notice is hereby given that the regular annual election of the Langell Valley Irrigation District of Klamath County, Oregon, will be held on Tuesday, the 12th day of November, 1935, at the herein-after specified polling place, for the purpose of electing one Director for said Irrigation District, and for the purpose of voting on contract with the United States.

Nominations for candidates for said office must be filed with the Secretary of the District at least ten days before the date of said election.

The polls shall be opened at 8 o'clock on the morning of the election day and shall be kept open until 5 o'clock in the afternoon of said day, when the same must be closed.

The Board of Directors has specified the following polling place within the boundaries of the District for said election:

"DISTRICT OFFICE" of the Langell Valley Irrigation District located approximately in the Southeast corner of Section 34, Township 39 South, Range 12 East W. M. and within the boundaries of the Langell Valley Irrigation District.

In addition to voting for a Director of the District, said election shall be held for the further purpose of voting upon the following question:

"Shall the Langell Valley Irrigation District of Klamath County, Oregon, enter into a contract with the United States of America amending the following contracts heretofore entered into between the Langell Valley Irrigation District and the United States of America: Contract of March 27, 1922, as amended by contracts of June 15, 1922, June 18, 1923, October 15, 1923, October 17, 1925, January 7, 1927, July 1, 1927, April 30, 1931, and December 27, 1933, wherein and whereby the maximum amount of money payable to the United States shall be 'balance of construction charges payable currently \$421,057.05, deferred construction charges, \$26,118.32, and engineering expense, field surveys, \$288.64, making a total maximum amount of \$457,464.01, exclusive of interest and penalties that may hereinafter accrue, to be assumed by the Langell Valley Irrigation District."

That at said election the ballot shall contain the words:

"Contract with the United States—Yes"

National and Local Markets

DECREASE IN EGG RECEIPTS AIDS MARKET

PORTLAND, Oct. 23. (AP)—Decreasing receipts of eggs were aiding the market somewhat with late advances almost general in the price list throughout the country.

Prices locally were being generally maintained for the better class supplies and especially really fresh offerings with storage prices list somewhat mixed.

Trading in the butter market is being influenced chiefly by the decreased fresh churning here and along the coast generally. Demand for ice cream is seasonably good which affects butter-fat.

Higher price has been forced generally in the market for chickens and especially for Leghorn hens. Springers are also doing better.

Only the best dressed turkeys are meeting with favor at suitable prices here. Up to 23c pound is being offered for new crop dry pick hens and toms at 9 to 11 pounds respectively as low limits.

Fear of considerable damage and loss to the Pacific northwest cranberry crop is expressed as a result of preliminary examination of the bogs since recent frosts. Market is gaining strength at all points.

Hot-house tomatoes are moving better since the cold snap. Sales are still being made down to 8c pound for extra fancy. Field grown tomatoes were higher for the day.

Twenty-five cents advance in the buying price of onions was confirmed at Labish points. Purchases of about 15 carloads were made at \$1.25 net to grower.

Brussels sprouts from local places are in most favor with a slight price shading.

Cauliflower market is slow with a carload moving on consignment.

Country killed veal continued easy.

Corn supplies and quality are rapidly dwindling.
