

Ever Powerful Medford Team Invades Klamath

Old Rivalry Resumed

Avrit Tries for Fifth Time to Win From Medford. Klamath's Recent Teams Fail to Punch Over Score.

The story of recent meetings between the football teams of Klamath Falls and Medford high schools hasn't been a pleasant one for this side of the mountains.

The days before 1931 were pretty black and the days following, when Leslie Avrit became head coach, have not been any brighter. No Klamath team, no Klamath coach has had consistent success against these Tigers.

For four seasons Avrit has pointed toward a victory over Medford; each year the hopes have resulted in disappointment. Not only has Medford defeated Klamath every year since 1931, but it has stopped every one of the Pelicans' scoring drives.

Here are the results:

1931—Medford 6, Klamath 0.
1932—Medford 21, Klamath 0.
1933—Medford 7, Klamath 0.
1934—Medford 20, Klamath 0.

It is interesting to note that the 6 to 0 and 7 to 0 contests were both played on Modoc field. Medford managed to run up the heavy scoring on its own gridiron.

Perhaps this may be a reason for advancing the possibility of a Klamath victory on Modoc field this week.

The nearest Avrit came to a victory was in 1931. Then the Pelicans carried the ball over the Medford goal line when the way was cleared for a long run. The score was disallowed, however, when the officials ruled that the runner had stepped out of bounds before crossing the last marker.

Medford is the only regularly scheduled team Leslie Avrit has been unable to defeat. Bend, Grants Pass, Corvallis and Ashland have been among the major Klamath victories. Eugene has won two games while the Pelicans have failed to score on this Willamette valley team.

Often it takes a little while to get the "hump," but eventually every team wins and every team loses. This may be Klamath's year to eliminate the Tigers from the state title running.

The coach explained that Miss Kight was dropped because "Any one that swims on this team has to be under the club management. That's a rule of the board."

PELICANS MEET BITTER RIVAL

Klamath Once More Seeks Victory Over Mighty Tiger

The Klamath Falls Pelicans, hungry for a victory over the ever powerful Medford Tigers, get set this week for their most important game of the season.

The Tigers, now listed as one of the most formidable teams in the state, invade Klamath Falls either Friday night or Saturday afternoon. School officials are considering shifting this big game to Modoc field under the floodlights providing the weather is favorable. In the event of poor playing conditions, the contest will be scheduled for Saturday afternoon.

Tigers Big Favorites

Right now the Tigers are pre-dominant favorites. This, however, is nothing new for the Pelicans. The Klamath team is pretty well accustomed to entering this one game as the underdog year after year. Klamath victories over the Tigers have been few and far between and there have been none in recent seasons.

In his five seasons as head coach here, Leslie Avrit still has his first win over Medford to enjoy. There have been many close games, but each year the Pelicans have lacked that final punch to win.

Medford Has New Coach

Medford comes to Klamath Falls with a brand new coach. The team this year is headed by Bill Bowerman, former Oregon backfield star. Bowerman, who played on the Medford high school championship teams under Prink Callison, succeeded Darwin Burgher, one time Idaho player.

Last season Bowerman coached at Franklin high school in Portland.

Medford was not considered as an Oregon title contender at the start of the season. The Tigers lost many veterans and were starting out afresh under the new coach.

Scout Brings Report

However, after the first game, the team pushed through to the front among the leading eleven in the state. It holds one-sided victories over Roseburg and Marshfield.

George Maboe, the Klamath line coach, scouted Medford against Marshfield. He returned with a story of the Tigers' power, and described the Rogue river valley outfit as one of the greatest organizations of young players he had seen.

The Pelican team, too, is strong. Slowly the lineup is gaining its original effectiveness as crumpled recover and report for practice.

The team has suffered only one set back this season, a 6 to 0 loss to Eugene. Dunsmuir, Lakeview and Grants Pass have all fallen before the Pelican drives.

PHOENIX BOXER WILL GET TEST

Stankovich Lined Up For Tough Fight Against Young Wills

Another "black and white" fight card, starring the winners of last week's chief battles, will be seen at the armory next Tuesday night.

Mike Stankovich, lightweight from Phoenix, Ariz., returns to Klamath Falls for his second main event in as many weeks. Stankovich will meet Young Harry Wills, Longview Negro, in the 10-round top match.

Stankovich apparently is a serious "jinx" for black boxers. Last week he boxed his way to a close decision over clever Leroy Gibson of Wichita. This coming week he hopes to do the same or better against Wills.

Young Wills will have a five-pound weight advantage over his rival when they enter the ring. The situation means that Stankovich's position will be reversed from what it was last Tuesday. The Arizona lad was the heavier of the two main eventers when he tackled Gibson.

Midnight Bell, Texas Negro, who so carefully laid away Ernie Cavelli of Walla Walla in the third round of their scheduled six-round semi-windup, will come back to meet Ray Cote of Butte, Montana. The clash will be for six rounds.

Bell made a good impression against Cavelli. The dusky glove thrower is long and rangy. Besides his ability to box, he proved his punching powers by downing the rugged Italian, Both Cote and Bell will weigh 140.

Mack Lillard, promoter, has guaranteed another fast series of preliminaries. The four-rounders of a week ago were bright spots on the cards. They included fast action and wild slugging.

Looking forward to a string of boxing cards, Lillard announced that Bud Brown and Jack Hubbard, popular here in seasons gone by, will appear in the near future. Brown may battle the winner of the main event.

Fishing Jaunt Takes Poundage Off President

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26. (AP)—Battling with deep sea game fish on his recent cruise took just two and a half pounds off President Roosevelt's weight.

Captain Ross T. McIntire of the naval medical corps, who was a member of the presidential party, said the president stepped on the scales upon his return and the dial showed 186 pounds. Before the vacation, the chief executive weighed 188½.

Captain McIntire said 186 was approximately the president's normal weight.

"Yes sir," said the captain, "he never was in better health than he is today."

City Recreation Director Plans Basketball League

A meeting of team managers and players interested in entering the league has been set for Jack's Tire Shop Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock.

It is likely that all games will be played in the new armory. Cook has tentatively made arrangements for the floor twice a week. Doubleheaders will be played.

Basketball is one of the most popular sports in this section, and a number of successful leagues have been organized in the past. The chief difficulty, however, has been the lack of playing floors. The armory is expected to fill this need.

Beaver Rooks Down Freshmen in First Game

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 26. (AP)—The spirited Oregon State college rooks were one up today on the University of Oregon fresh football team after capitalizing on breaks, and making others, for a 9 to 0 win last night.

Don Coome, speedy end from Salem, blocked Gannon's punt in the first period, chalking up a safety for the rooks. The rooks had an opportunity in the first half to add to their two points, but Eli fumbled on the fourth down two yards from the goal line.

John Alexander dashed six yards for a touchdown early in the second half after the rooks took the ball on the fresh 15-yard line when a bad pass from center prevented Blackman from punting on the fourth down. Ben Eli, who had a big night packing the ball, placekicked for extra point.

Jimmy Nicholson led two second half duckling marches which were halted only within the rook 10-yard line. The fresh made eight first downs to six for the Corvallis men, but the rooks had the advantage in yards gained.

Major Neyland Not to Resume Coaching Work

NASHVILLE, TENN., Oct. 26. (AP)—Major Robert R. Neyland, possibly influenced by the present grid season of "headaches," heartaches and upsets, is seriously considering "calling it a day" as a football coach.

Free from the worries of a gridiron tutor for the first time in nine years, Neyland, on a 30-day vacation from his army assignment in the Panama Canal zone, said today that he wondered "if the nerve strain and anxiety are worth it."

Neyland spiked rumors that he was in contact with any school regarding a coaching post next year, saying "I have entered into negotiations with no school and have not been contacted by any body. All these reports about my plans for next year are news to me."

It has been rumored that Neyland desired to return to his old post at the University of Tennessee, where he hung up an enviable record between 1926 and 1934. It was reported also that he was interested in Fordham and U. S. Military Academy positions.
