The Bible conference under the leadership of Dr. W. P. White at First Presbyterian church opened Sunday with the auditorium well-filled both morning and evening. The Irish wit and humor of Dr. White is always in evidence, and no one knows where it is going to hit next. Young and old were delighted, and eager to hear more.

Dr. White, according to his public statement, is past 70, and has been preaching for over 45 years, but his keen thought and vigorous delivery reveal a man of power and of profound knowledge of the Bible. He has held over seven hundred Bible conferences, as well as serving in long pastorates, so that he speaks out of years of rich experience. He was the first president of the Los Angeles Bible institute, serving for several years during the reorganization of that institution.

Dr. White addressed the men's luncheon group at the First Presbyterian church, speaking on the book of First Corinthians, and dealing with factions and fuses in the church of early days and of today. He said many caustic things regarding professing Christians who had nothing of the Christ spirit in their lives.

"On account of the very gracious attitude of sister churches," says the pastor, Dr. Theodore Smith, "in dismissing their evening services to attend the Bible conference at the First Presbyterian church and in particular the wonderful attitude of the First Methodist church and pastor, there will be no evening service today. This will enable many of the music lovers of our own church to attend the concert given by the Ecclesia choir of Los Angeles in the First Methodist church tonight. This service will be made up by holding a Saturday evening meeting, which was not originally planned."

The Mission Covenant church, the Congregational church and the First Methodist church dismissed their evening services last evening in order that their people might attend the Bible conference. The same thing will be done with the midweek meetings and the Sunday evening services next Lord's day.

Beginning Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, Dr. White will begin an exposition of the book of Philippians and a four division woodshed is being completed in the rear of the apartments this week by Paulson and Neymann. The new building is finished and all four of the apartments are being occupied.

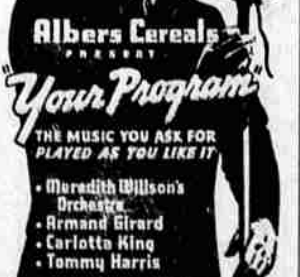
The bodies of 42 miners were recovered, and 41 other miners were listed as missing.

Book Circulation Here 5th; Income Listed as Ninth

Klamath county library held fifth place among Oregon libraries in circulation of books during 1934. This in spite of the fact that it ranked ninth in income.

Statistics of Oregon libraries, just released by the state library, show the following figures for the eight largest libraries, exclusive of Multnomah county, which includes Portland.

Umatilla, Jackson and Salem libraries were the only ones in the group serving from 10,000 to 30,000 population which had a greater circulation than the Klamath county library. Umatilla, Jackson and Wasco county libraries for several years during the reorganization of that institution.

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FROSTS CAUSE HEAVY DAMAGE

MERRILL, Oct. 28. — Frost damage in potato fields of all districts of the south end due to the recent heavy frozes is estimated by growers to run from 10 to 25 per cent. Digging is being rushed, although large acreages are yet undug. In some fields of from 50 to 100 acres the harvest has just been started.

Reports of frost damage from other potato growing districts in Idaho, Oregon, Minnesota and the middle western states has stimulated buying here with offers from local buyers ranging around 75 cents in the Merrill and Malin districts.

Glutting of markets in the near future is predicted by some growers due to the fact that quantities of damaged potatoes, particularly those that have been pitted must be sorted soon to prevent heavy losses.

Few idle men remain in the basin and for a few days in the early part of the week it was impossible to find additional help when growers decided to increase their crews. With the harvest drawing to a close within the next few days transients will be leaving to search for work elsewhere.

Frantic Geese Trapped Above Niagara Falls

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Oct. 27. (AP)—More than 8,000 wild geese, apparently confused by the roar of the Horseshoe falls, fought frantically today to keep from being swept over the drumming cataract.

Officers of the American and Canadian parks commission hoped to devise some scheme of frightening away the stubborn flock.

Honking cheerily, the birds settled on the upper Niagara river yesterday about the falls.

Five minutes later, the strong current swept the flock over the falls to the crest. Only by frantic flappings with more honking were they able to fight their way back.

All day the crazy routine of riding the current and fighting their way back to safety was followed by the befuddled geese.

The flapping and the honking continued through the night sufficiently loud to be heard above the pounding waters.

Efforts to scare off the flock failed. Searchlights on the Canadian ledge were winked, shotguns boomed at them, and even rockets blazed toward them—but the geese wouldn't leave.

There have been years when the mortality rate among the geese was exceedingly high. In 1932 hundreds of them were dashed over the falls to destruction, but as a rule they get away with only a few casualties.

Girl Wounded in Hunting Accident

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 28. (AP)—Anna Rasmussen, 13, western Washington's first girl hunting accident victim of the season, was still in a serious condition in a Puyallup hospital today, following the accident in which she was shot Saturday.

Anna, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rasmussen of Sumner, had gone hunting with her father in the woods near their home. Donald Glaser, 24, of Puyallup, who was hunting in the same neighborhood, saw a movement of Anna in the bushes and fired. The bullet penetrated the girl's right forearm and hip.

1935 PRODUCTION TO SHOW INCREASE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28. (AP)—Although lumber production, shipments and orders declined slightly during the week ended October 19, the National Lumber Manufacturers' association today predicted that 1935 production would be approximately 16,200,000 feet, an increase of about four per cent over 1934.

On the basis of tabulation of shipments for previous months of 1935, the report said this year's shipments probably would total nearly 17,000,000 feet or a 12 per cent increase over 1934.

"Weekly reports from mills operating both this year and last, do not indicate the relationship between the two years because many mills in operation last year under the lumber code are idle this year," the report said. "The 1934 output of these now idle mills is therefore not included in the reports of identical mills for 1934-35 and part of what they might have produced in 1935 is diverted to the now operating and reporting mills."

During the week ended October 19, reports from 577 mills gave production at 230,544,000 feet, shipments 129,503,000 feet and orders 106,700,000 feet. Revised figures for the previous week from 597 mills showed production of 239,642,000 feet, shipments 203,392,000 feet and orders 261,476,000 feet.

Clipper Will Get Laboratory Tests

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 28. (AP)—The 25-ton China clipper of the Pan-American Airways awaited "laboratory" tests over the Caribbean today after a 1,200-mile flight from Baltimore.

The huge ship made the trip yesterday in 7 hours and 44 minutes. Capable of carrying 75 passengers and a crew of six, it is to be tried over non-stop ranges of 1,000 to 3,000 miles before leaving for San Francisco via Mexico for the beginning of regular mail service to China next month.

SLIDE BLOCKS ROAD

PORTLAND, Oct. 28. (AP)—Traffic on the Columbia river highway was blocked temporarily last night by an earth slide about 10 miles east of Cascade Locks. One-way traffic was opened soon by an emergency road crew and it was believed normal traffic would soon be resumed.
