

HOG CONTROL GAINS FAVOR OF FARMERS

complete returns today showed that 317,994 favored an adjustment program in 1936 to 55,178 opposed. These totals included both farmers who signed contracts to control their production in return for government benefit payments, and others who did not.

An Associated Press tabulation at 6 a. m. (EST) showed the following results by states:

Oregon: Contract holder, 1,132 yes, 131 no; non-contract holders, 245 yes, 48 no.

VOTE DECLARED FRAUD
DES MOINES, Oct. 28. (AP)—Milo Reno, national president of the Farmers' Holiday association and militant AAA opponent, charged today the national corn-hog referendum was "the biggest fraud ever perpetrated on the American people."

"I am surprised that they (the AAA) didn't get a bigger majority than they did in view of the tactics employed (in the referendum)," Reno said.

"They sent out up to 70 paid experts to a county to influence the farmers to vote. They had both the election officials and the tellers. They cast aside all the rules governing an honest contest."

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 28. (AP)—Oregon corn and hog producers voted more than eight to one in favor of continuation of the corn-hog adjustment program for 1936, unofficial returns from 19 of the 34 counties with corn-hog committees showed today.

Oregon producers participated Saturday in the national referendum to determine whether the present program which expires November 30 should be continued next year by the agricultural adjustment administration.

France, Britain Gain Strong Ally Against Italians

ported this province held vast deposits of gold.

The Italian advance spread joy in Italy, where the Fascist celebrated the thirtieth anniversary of Mussolini's assumption of power.

The cry of the Italians in Ethiopia, on both northern and southern fronts, was:

"On to Harar."

Water Resources Gained

Harar, the metropolis of eastern Ethiopia, is the objective of both the northern and southern forces. With Harar, they would cut Addis Ababa and central Ethiopia off from access to the Red sea; they would give Italy a strip all along the eastern half of Ethiopia, connecting Eritrea with Italian Somaliland.

In the south, the forces from Somaliland, according to dispatches received in Djibouti, have crossed half of the Ogaden desert.

The Italians in this sector, the Djibouti report said, hold a strip of Ethiopian territory more than 400 miles in length.

In the northern sector, the troops only gained an important advantage, occupying water resources.

JAPS, GERMANS SPEAK

GENEVA, Oct. 28. (AP)—Japan and Germany today gave League of Nations officials reason to believe they will pattern their policies after that of the United States with respect to league sanctions against Italy.

Both the Japanese and the German delegations eagerly inquired after the text of the note from Washington, responding to the league's notification of its judgment against Italy.

League officials believe the American reply distinctly encouraging to its efforts to hasten the end of the war. They also believe Japan and Germany will do nothing to wreck the league sanction machinery against Mussolini, which the American note described by implication as a machinery of peace.

An authoritative Japanese spokesman told the Associated Press Japan has refrained from granting any licenses for the shipment of armaments or war materials either to Ethiopia or Italy.

This policy, he said, will doubtless be continued without the formality of Japan proclaiming an arms embargo.

ANTI-GAMING, POWER BILLS FILED TODAY

and dog races as well as prohibiting all forms of gambling and pin boards.

Senator Lessard's proposal will follow closely the suggestions made by L. L. Liljequist, special prosecutor of gambling conditions in Multnomah county. Liljequist had declared all forms of gambling could be checked if the dog and horse racing acts were repealed.

The state now receives two and a half per cent from the pari-mutuel racing meets while the promoters are allowed 10 per cent. To date the state has received \$325,000 from gambling at dog and horse races, which shows that more than \$12,000,000 has been wagered in races the past two years.

Lane County Bill Up

The measure also provides that any private attorney may be called in as special prosecutor of gambling cases with a minimum fee of \$25 to be charged.

The grange power bill, introduced by the committee on public utilities of the house, is similar to the initiative measure for which a ballot title was issued Saturday. Should the bill pass in the legislature and be referred to the people as provided, the grange leaders announced they would drop the campaign to put the initiative proposal on the ballot in 1936.

The power bill provides for the creation of a state power commission to regulate transmission of electrical energy from the Bonneville project. It is also similar to the bill passed by the last legislature and which was vetoed by Governor Martin.

A bill affecting Lane county particularly was introduced by the house delegation from that district and would provide for the creation of county health departments upon petition of a majority of school boards in the county. Several bills which would tighten picketing laws were also introduced.

budget board, agreed with Chilcote that 6 cents a mile ought to be enough. Alfred Collier, the other member of the board, said that 8 cents might be enough on an occasional basis, and 6 cents on a daily basis.

the road. About 30 feet farther on Mrs. Phillips fell out.

She was dashed against the rocks. Her head was smashed, bringing instant death.

Enders car crashed on over the rocks for a short distance, coming to rest against a fence. He was treated later for lacerations.

All cars involved in the accident stopped immediately, and a call was put in for county authorities. Dr. George H. Adler, coroner, and two state policemen, left at midnight for the scene of the tragedy.

Enders was placed temporarily under arrest, pending completion of the investigation and was held in the county jail.

District Attorney Hardin C. Blackmer announced Monday that an inquest will be held Tuesday morning before Justice of the Peace W. B. Barnes, in the absence of Coroner Adler, who is in San Francisco.

Six persons received injuries, chiefly lacerations in a head-on accident at Keno Sunday night, involving cars driven by Earl Uhly, McCollum's mill, and Albert Halton, Santa Rosa, Calif.

In the Uhly car were Mrs. Uhly, Ed Bartow and June King. Ben Curtis and Halton were on their way to California from Hood River, where they had been working in the apple orchards.

As the two cars met in Keno, the drivers became confused as to what each intended to do, and they swung together, according to reports given investigating state policemen. Both machines were wrecked.

Mrs. Uhly and Curtis were the most seriously hurt, both suffering head lacerations. Uhly was slightly cut, as was Halton, the other driver. Miss King had a minor head bruise.

State Officer Currie arrested Halton and charged him with having no Oregon operator's license.

P. E. Martin, south end resident, was hurt when automobiles driven by E. W. McClure of Tulelake and Mike Arnold of Merrill crashed on The Dalles-California highway.

Mrs. J. L. Jacob reported that her car was involved in an accident at Merrill, the other vehicle being an onion truck driven by A. L. Ferts.

Martin G. Lacher, a resident of Mt. Angel, Ore., was accidentally killed at Tulelake, Calif., Sunday, October 27, at 6:00 p. m. He was a native of Pe-Eli, Wash., and was aged 32 years and 5 months. Surviving him are his mother, Mrs. Josephine Lacher of Mt. Angel, Ore., three brothers, Joseph Lacher of Tulelake, Calif., Charles Lacher of Mt. Angel, Ore., and Emil M. TULELAKE, Calif., Oct. 28.—Martin Lacher, 28, was crushed to death near the railroad station here last night when a water tank car ran over him.

Lacher was helping his brother, Joseph, fill a water can from the tank car. A switching train struck the car, shoving it over Lacher's body. The car went through a dead-end stop, and came to rest with two wheels off the rails.

Death was instantaneous. A section crew from Stronghold worked several hours to raise the car and dig a pit so that Lacher's body could be removed.

The Lacher brothers came here a few days ago from Mt. Angel to pick potatoes.

The Siskiyou county coroner authorized Whitlock's funeral home at Klamath Falls to remove the body to that city. From there it will be shipped to Mt. Angel.

This was the third fatal accident at Tulelake in the course of two months.

Just as they reached the foot of the hill, the lights on the car went out. It struck a post, broke off, and then slid down the embankment. At the bottom it hit a rock and turned over.

No one in the car was hurt.
