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# National and Local Markets

## PORTLAND SPUD MARKET LISTED SLOW, STEADY

PORTLAND, Oct. 28. (AP)—There was no change in the egg market situation for the week's opening. Receipts are now increasing but cold storage interests are still in control of price making generally.

Market for butter suggested a generally unchanged tone and price for the week's opening. Demand was steady with an increased supply showing although receipts from out-state points were a trifle below the previous six days. Local make was greater.

Full steadiness was generally suggested in the market for cheese.

At practically all leading primary points well sustained prices at the previous advance were confirmed. At consuming markets there was likewise no change in the current situation.

Market for chickens was ruling firm and in spots a further fractional advance was shown in the price on hens, both white and colored sorts. There was a slight demand for ducks.

Strong tone was ruling for dressed turkeys of the new crop with recent sales to retailers as high as 24c pound, which is exceptionally good for this period of the season.

Slowness of buying tone was continued in the market for country killed calves. There was suggestion of further weakness with late receipts a trifle above demand.

There was another showing of gain in the market for hothouse tomatoes with the marketing season opening slowly while prices are tending a trifle higher as a result of poor field grown stock. Sales up to \$1.30 for extra fancy and \$1.25 for fancy 10s.

Onion trade continued firm at \$1.25 net to grower for shipments.

Potato markets were slow to steady with Klamath mostly \$1.25 and Deschutes \$1.15 cental.

Fancy oranges are up 15c case over a week ago while Arizona grapefruit is down 25-50c case.

Apple trade was about the same as last week.

Fancy seedless grapes from the south were being offered at \$1.25 compared with around \$1.40 for ordinary.

Sweet potatoes were firmer to higher with new marketing agreement in effect.

Green and red peppers of quality were higher.

Beans were higher for best higher stock.

Cranberry market was again higher with scarcity of supplies.

## Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Oct. 28. (AP)—Although some rails, utilities, metals and specialties were in fair favor in today's stock market, a number of the recent leaders backed up under realizing.

Such reactionary tendencies as were in evidence were attributed mainly to technical influences. The losses gave ground gradually, however, and the activity was not pronounced. The close was irregular. Transfers approximated 2,950,000 shares.

Speculative and investment sentiment was mixed. Bearishness was not pronounced, but analysts felt that a "correction" was due because of the almost uninterrupted advance which has carried the industrial average to the highest point in more than four years.

There was little change in the economic outlook. The American Iron & Steel Institute reported current mill operation at 51.9 per cent of capacity, up 1 of a point from the previous week. Earnings statements contained few surprises, and were mostly satisfactory.

Shares of Case got up some four points, but pared this gain. American Chain advanced two points and a steady firm tone also was shown by American Smelting, Great Western Sugar, South Porto Rico Sugar, New York Central, Santa Fe, Great Northern, American Water Works.

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
