

Stankovich Meets Hard-hitting Negro Battler

A Long, Sad Story for Klamath

Known Record Includes But One Football Victory Over Medford.

The entire known record of Klamath Falls football competition against Medford is dismal. This known record, including all games played since 1924, is really a bitter piece of athletic evidence for any school to file in its history books.

There was a 7 to 0 victory for Klamath in 1929 and it is the only victory in a list of nearly two dozen meetings. There were a few years when the Pelicans made fairly close stands of 14, but, for the most part, the games represent big score shutouts for the Tigers—called the Peapickers in the old days of the great championship teams when Prink Callison, University of Oregon head coach, was directing athletics.

The single Klamath Falls victory came the year following Callison's departure for Eugene. It was a let down for the Tigers that one year Merle Hagen, former Oregon player took over the team.

On the whole—that is, compared with the routs of previous seasons—Leslie Arritt, Klamath coach, has made a good showing against the valley club as any of his predecessors. In fact, his showing has been better than most. Klamath came close to winning and held the score below average in the other two of Arritt's four years.

Klamath's record against Medford is probably about as sad as any Oregon school's record against an opponent.

The Medford supremacy since 1914 represents a total accumulation of 527 points against only 54 for the Pelicans. The Tigers have scored an average of 24 points per contest, with the Pelicans making an average of about two and one-half.

Perhaps this statement of past games might arouse the 1935 Pelican team to get out Saturday afternoon and do something about it when the Tigers invade Medoc field.

Klamath has come to regard Medford as a "traditional rival."

Medford, however, does not hold to this. One look at the record shows why. There has to be some tough competition occasionally before a team can be classed even as a rival, let alone a "traditional" one.

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YOUNG WILLS OPPOSES SLAV

Midnight Bell Returns for Semi-windup with Ray Cote.

Young Harry Wills of Longview and Mike Stankovich of Phoenix, two of the most promising lightweight battlers on the coast today, face each other tonight in the weekly 19-round main event at the Klamath armory.

Stankovich, 135, will rule at the start as the favorite despite the fact that he will be giving away about five pounds to the punching Negro from Washington. Probably the chief reason why the Slav from the southwest has been awarded the edge comes because of his victory over LeRoy Gibson, another Negro, here last week.

Stankovich possesses two things that can bring him to the front and make a battle of it against most any opponent. First is his punching ability and second his fine boxing science.

Falling a little short on boxing ability, Young Wills is known chiefly as a hitter. His knockout string in recent fights has made him much in demand as a main eventer throughout the northwest. He is a straight-forward puncher, not a swinger.

Because he can absorb punishment as well as deal it out, Wills should be able to weather the stiffest flurries Stankovich can offer.

Cote, calculating Midnight Bell of Texas, the Negro who knocked out Ernie Cavelli last week, will tackle Ray Cote, French-Canadian, in the semi-windup.

Cote has been fighting professionally since 1930. He is but 21 years old and appears a certain comer. He has beaten Frankie Monroe, Tommy Corbett, Roy Ockley, Battling Gizzy and other prominent fighters who have appeared in the northwest.

Both welterweights appear fairly even and the semi-windup should be filled with action.

Mack Lillard, promoter, has not announced his preliminaries. He does, however, promise another series of four rounders equal to those presented last week.

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MEDFORD TIGER HAS BIG EDGE

Pelicans Underdogs for Annual Meeting Here Saturday.

The task confronting the Avritt's Pelicans, however, is a terrific one. Rolling up great scores over their toughest foes, the Medford Tigers stand out this week as one of the chief contenders of the Oregon interscholastic title.

For this reason, the Pelicans, beaten twice this year, will oppose the Tigers on Medoc field Saturday afternoon in the role of an underdog.

The team resumed practice this week determined to shake off the gloom accompanying the unexpected upsetting at Ashland last week. There the Pelicans, favored to win, went down to defeat, 7 to 0.

Weather conditions prevailing Tuesday morning indicated that the Pelicans might encounter some difficulty in getting ready for the Medford invasion. If the field continues to be covered with snow and the cold weather persists, workout will be handicapped.

Del Fontaine, Boxer, Hanged in London Jail

LONDON, Oct. 29. (AP)—Raymond Henry Bousquet, Winnipeg boxer known as Del Fontaine, was hanged today for the murder of Hilda Meeks, while opponents of capital punishment demonstrated outside Wandsworth prison.

Bousquet was convicted in the Old Bailey last month of murdering Miss Meeks, a 21-year-old waitress on the night of July 20. The girl's mother was shot and seriously wounded at the same time.

The light heavyweight formerly lived in Winnipeg. In 1927 he won the dominion middleweight title from Harry Henning of Toronto.
