REVENUE FROM
LIQUOR SALES

SALEM, Oct. 29 (AP)—The state department released its quarterly report listing the quarterly distribution of revenue from the tax on manufacturers and importing distributors of malt and alcoholic beverages, set aside for distribution to the several incorporated cities and counties of the state.

The portion allotted to counties and cities was determined in proportion to population at the last census, with the proportionate share of each county being determined by its total population less the combined population of all incorporated cities. The list included the following:

POTATO MEETING
SET FOR FRIDAY

The annual meeting of the Klamath Potato Growers' association will be held Friday at Merrill in connection with the basin potato festival. Exhibits of potatoes at the festival will be handled through the association.

A complete exhibit on potato diseases is being prepared by the county agent's office. Commercial exhibits should be in place Friday morning.

G. H. Hyslop of Oregon State college will judge the potato exhibits at 10 a. m., Friday. This will be followed by a demonstration in grading by W. L. Close, federal potato grading supervisor.

The annual meeting will come at 1:30 p. m. Hyslop and Congressman Walter M. Pierce will speak on the potato adjustment act. Other speakers will be Frank McKennon, chairman of the bureau of plant industry of the state department of agriculture, and Close. The election of officers for 1936 will follow.

A subject for discussion at the business meeting will be the question of advertising in the California consumer districts, such as was done last year.

Directors of the association will hold a meeting Thursday at Klamath Falls to discuss this project.

Mexico Center
Of Search for
William Mahan

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 29, (UP)—Reports that William Mahan, suspected kidnaper of young George Weyerhaeuser of Tacoma, Wash., had been seen in Mexico, sent two federal agents southward across the border Monday.

Chief Federal Agent Joseph E. P. Dunn said they would cooperate with Mexican federal authorities near San Jose Del Teino, 175 miles south of the border.

Dispatches were received from Salvador Meling, Mexican federal investigator, that a man resembling the fugitive had been reported entering mountains near the town, carrying a miner's pack.

The section is one of the most remote in northern Mexico, and except for wandering cowboys and prospectors, few ever travel through the mountainous regions.

Federal agents at San Diego, Calif., said Meling reported the man had been identified fairly accurately by photographs, distributed to Mexican police.

Due to inaccessibility of the region, it was believed that the man headed into the mountains several days ago.

REV. DAGWELL
BECOMES NEW
OREGON BISHOP

DENVER, Oct. 29, (AP)—The Very Rev. B. D. Dagwell, rector of St. John's Cathedral (Episcopal) of Denver today announced he will accept an invitation to become bishop of the Episcopal diocese of Oregon.

"I have made this decision after very serious consideration, and I must break my many ties in Denver, but with happiness because of the splendid opportunity for service it offers in a new field," he said.

"I have telegraphed my acceptance to Oregon, but I probably will not leave here until the middle of January. The acceptance must be acted upon by the church's standing committee in America and by the house of bishops."

The Rev. Dagwell held several conferences with Bishop Irving P. Johnson of Denver and members of the vestry before he announced he will leave the pulpit he has occupied here 11 years.

Cold Compels
Surrender of
Hunted Thief

BURNS, Ore., Oct. 29, (UP)—Cold and snow in the high country, shortage of food and luck combined Monday to imprison Tobe Skiens, admitted horse thief, "silent man" of the range, and accused slayer of Ed McDonald, Burns state buyer.

For 10 weeks Skiens eluded posse which hunted him through remote sections of eastern Oregon and Idaho. His intimate knowledge of the back country gained in years of travel on horseback as a "lone wolf," kept him well ahead of pursuers.

Captured Without Shot
But last night he rode on a stolen horse into the yard of the Rinehart ranch in the breaks of the Owyhee river in Malheur county. He was armed with a revolver, had little food and only two feedings of grain for his horse.

C. L. Jamison and Eldon Madden, state livestock inspection officers, who had been hunting Skiens and were eating dinner at the ranch house, captured him without a shot being fired.

No motive has been unearthed for the shooting of McDonald, Skiens' former brother-in-law, August 13. Skiens fled on a stolen horse, which he later "swapped" for another.
