National and Local Markets

FROST CREATES STRONGER TONE FOR POTATOES

PORTLAND, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Increasing strength is shown in some items in the egg trade despite the increasing supply. On the produce exchange the late session showed a rise of 1c in small extras and the small standard.

Stronger demand for chickens with practically general advance in the buying price on live hens. The situation has strengthened generally along the coast. Shipments of Oregon fillets were being made generally although few orders can be filled in full. A noticeable feature is the absence of competition among buyers.

Slow gain of walnut sales locally was reported. Prices, however, are weak and the bulk of the local business is being done below established values.

Heavy frosts were reported in leading potato producing sections of the Pacific northwest which were understood to have created a stronger tone at primary points.

Cranberries are showing a spread of \$2.30-\$2.75 a quarter bbl. box, with quality the general consideration.

Country killed calves continued easy but other lines were steady.

Onion trading was fully steady at late advances in the country. Orange prices continued to firm up but no further advance was announced.

Cauliflower was firmer and generally higher for all grades. Slight improvement was suggested in cabbage demand.

Carload Texas grapefruit, first of the season, was due during the day with some pinks scheduled.

Pumpkin and squash were both in increased call with no price change.

Brussels sprouts were firmer. More interest was shown in the proposal to have a Willamette valley apple week.

MacDonald Joins Armament Party

LONDON, Oct. 29. (UP)—J. Ramsay MacDonald, whose pacifism made him unpopular during the world war, Monday embraced the heavy armaments policy of the Tories. He indicated that Italy's attack on Ethiopia had convinced him force is needed to sustain peace pacts.

The former laborite and national union prime minister, now lord president of the council in the Baldwin government, announced his change of heart in a speech at Caxton Hall in which he sounded the keynote of the national labor party campaign preliminary to the Nov. 14 general elections.

The gray-haired socialist condemned pledges not to fight in the next war as unhelpful to peace.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Oct. 29. (AP)—A late rally in U. S. Steel common brought support to a stock market that had exhibited highly irregular tendencies throughout the greater part of the session.

While there were still a few soft spots in evidence, the general upturn in the final hour gave the list a steady to firm closing tone. Transfers approximated 1,750,000 shares.

The last-hour buying rush, centered largely on U. S. Steel and allied stocks, put the ticker tape two minutes behind floor transactions. Early trading was quiet, although several selected issues in various groups moved ahead from the start. The backwardness of several recent leaders did much to engender cautious participation in the morning.

The renewed appetite for the major steel equity was attributed to rumors that the corporation's directors, at their meeting after the close of the stock exchange, might decide to advance the payment on the preferred dividend accumulations. Last disbursement on this stock was 50 cents a share.

There was a moderate profit taking near the finish, but shares up around a point or so included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Sharon Steel, Hoop, Deere, Cerrito, Paco, North American, Canada Dry, Crown Cork, Container Corp.,
