### Oregon, O. S. C. Get Ready

Annual "Big Game" Swings Back to Campus Scenes. Webfoots Have Big Lead Since First Game.

The state of Oregon's "big game" comes back to its natural surroundings next week after two years in Portland. Henceforth, or as long as the possibility of larger financial returns doesn't draw the contest north again, Oregon and Oregon State will alternate between Hayward Field at Eugene and Bell Field at Corvallis.

This season the game will be played at the Oregon campus. With each team definitely eliminated from the Pacific Coast championship running, the annual "civil war" will be, as usual, for the state championship. That's about all the Webfoots and the Beavers have had to fight for these many seasons.

It is always interesting, especially for the University of Oregon followers, to review the record since the two schools played their first game in 1894. There have been 37 games. Oregon has won 22 and the Beavers trail with only nine victories. Seven games have resulted in ties.

### BAD WEATHER HITS PRACTICE

Players, Coaches Prepare to Resist Medford Invasion.

Handicapped in practice by weather conditions and still a little shaken by the upsetting at Ashland, the Klamath Pelicans strove this week to get themselves ready for a "last ditch" fight against the undefeated Tigers from Medford.

State weather predictions for the week-end were a little more cheerful Wednesday, and there was definite hope that the storm will have blown over by starting time on Modoc field Saturday.

Practice held inside Klamath's practice for Monday and Tuesday was confined to the gymnasium, but the facilities have been inadequate for whipping the team into shape for the Medford invasion.

In spite of the weather, Leslie Arritt, head coach, expected to get his squad out on the field Wednesday night for a much-needed scrimmage. Another hard practice probably will be held on Thursday with a light workout coming Friday afternoon.

Strong Roseburg, Marshfield and Salem elevens have fallen easy prey to the powerful attack of Bill Bowerman's Tigers. On the basis of the season's records, there appeared little hope that the Pelicans could stem Medford's rush toward a title.

Tigers Best in Years

Coaches who have opposed Medford this year declare it is one of the best combinations produced in the valley. The truth of this is not doubted. It is generally conceded that the Tigers have as mighty a squad as those many powerful teams of the past.

"I think our team will play its best ball of the season against Medford," Arritt said Wednesday. Only 13 points have been scored against Klamath this season. Eugene scored one touchdown to win 6 to 0. Ashland scored a touchdown and kicked goal to win 7 to 6.

Tentative Starters Named

There was some hope in the Klamath camp that the Pelicans might be able to cut down the terrific attack with which Medford has successfully piled up six and seven touchdowns against every opponent it has met this season.

This week Arritt and his assistant coach, George Mabee, were attempting to get better coordination and timing in the offensive while at the same time drilling the team in a defense against the Medford formations.

Joe Kendall, combination lineman and backfield man, is back with the team after absence for the Ashland game with a serious cold. Geno Carnini, who injured his foot early in the season, has returned to the squad, but probably will not be in shape for much action against Medford.

### Commander Wins Newmarket Race; Man's Pal Second

NEWMARKET, Eng., Oct. 30, (AP)—G. R. C. Foster's Commander Third today won the 96th running of the Cambridgeshire stakes.

Mrs. V. D. Sainsbury's Man's Pal was second and Lady Ralli's Finalist third.

Forty horses ran.

The race, run over a course of a mile and one furlong, was for a purse of 1,050 pounds with extras. Some \$6,000,000 in sweepstakes prizes hung upon the outcome of the race, a bulk of the winning tickets being held in the United States.

The winner, Commander III, was runner-up in the 1934 Cambridgeshire, won by O. V. Watney's Wychwood Abbot.

Commander III won by a length and a half and rewarded his backers at 28 to 1. A short head divided Man's Pal at 100 to 1 shot, and Finalist, one of the favorites at 6 to 1.

### Former Alabama Star Leading Pro Scorers

NEW YORK, Oct. 29, (UP)—Don Hutson of the Green Bay Packers and end on Alabama's Rose Bowl champion team jumped into the lead in national professional football league scoring according to averages released today.

Hutson, playing his first season, caught five passes Sunday and made two of them good for touchdowns, giving him the lead with 35 points. He is the first end in the league's history to lead in scoring so late in the season.

### Nello Giovanini "Iron Man" With Oregon Freshmen

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 30—Nello Giovanini, 190-pound guard from Klamath Falls, bolstered the middle of the freshman line for 60 minutes in their first game with the Oregon State Rooks last Saturday in Eugene. The ex-Pelican star was one of the outstanding men on the field for either team. Although the Ducklings went down to a 9 to 0 defeat, Giovanini, by his heady play in the middle of the line, kept the heavy Rook backfield of Ben Ell et al from making any headway through that avenue.

Giovanini is close to being the iron man of the Duckling football squad in the number of minutes played. In the season opening game against the Southern Oregon Normal school he participated for 53 minutes. The second game against the Oregon Normal "Teachers" saw his services for 40 minutes. And in the Frosh-Rook game he played the full four quarters.

Giovanini, who was awarded the Maloney medal and was selected as northern Oregon all-star tackle, is considered to be one of the most promising varsity prospects of the yearling football squad. He pulls out of the line fast on the offense and blocks effectively in front of the ball carriers.
