having its claim that the east African campaign is not a war but a crusade of "liberation," bands of native troops were sent forward in advance of the regular forces to win over the Ethiopian population to the Italian side. Officers of the high command said that if this strategy succeeded, they expected to march into Makale without experiencing the pitched battle which had been forecast during the last few days. The forward movement of the regular troops was largely in the nature of a reconnaissance operation.

(By the Associated Press) The economic war of the league of nations against Italy steadily gained strength today. The league's sanctions staff is meeting tomorrow to set a deadline for imposing penalties, and 36 nations already have pledged participation in the economic isolation of Mussolini's fascist government for its conquest of Ethiopia. These nations gave approval to both of the economic sanctions—the "buy nothing from Italy" boycott and the prohibition against the export of certain key products to the aggressor nation.

Temblors Rock South America

QUITO, Ecuador, Oct. 30. (UP) Earthquakes along the Ecuador-Colombian frontier early Tuesday caused many deaths and injuries and considerable property damage.

Casualties figures were lacking because of destruction of communications with the affected areas.

Taqueres, Colombia and the nearby town of Santa Ana were badly shaken. Buildings were cracked in Taqueres. Most of the houses in Santa Ana were reported destroyed and the number of deaths there was believed considerable. The temple of San Francisco, regarded as the outstanding building in Narino department, was demolished.

Surviving populations of both places have begun to evacuate in fear of new shocks.

Three Bills Favored—SALEM, Oct. 30. (AP)—A definite plan for construction of the new state capitol building was ready for submission to the senate of the special legislative session today, after the joint committee of the house and senate tentatively approved three bills last night.

The majority bill, which will carry the signatures of most of the committee, will call for an expenditure of \$3,500,000 for the building and site, the structure to be built on or adjacent to the old location, and will carry the emergency clause.

Two minority bills will carry appropriations of \$2,000,000 and \$2,750,000 and will provide for construction on the old site alone.

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Big Army Ship Crashes Today Near Dayton, O.

Bogart was appointed to conduct an investigation. The plane was brought to Dayton August 21, in a spectacular non-stop flight from Seattle, Wash. It would fall even before the time of slightly over nine hours for the flight.

Lieutenants L. F. Harman and R. K. Giovannoli, who witnessed the crash said a sickening lurch that ended in a turn of 180 degrees warned them the bomber was going to crash. They sprinted toward the spot where they knew it would fall even before the left wing dropped and the plane smashed into the ground.

To the quick action of these officers, officials said, several members of the crew probably owe their lives.

A second after the crash, flames enveloped the plane, trapping the five members of the crew, who had not leaped at the moment of impact.

Lieuts. Harman and Giovannoli who had watched the takeoff reached the plane as the flames soared. They threw their coats over their heads and with their arms over their faces leaped through the flames and clambered into the wreckage. They dragged through the blaze, first one and then another of the crew. Just how many or whom, no one seems to know.

Crew Pulled Out—When the ambulance bumped across the field to the wreckage, all of the crew had been pulled to safety. But in this few seconds before Harman and Giovannoli risked their lives to rescue their friends, the gasoline and oil fed flames had taken their toll. Some of the crew was unconscious, others, with hands, arms and bodies burned, were unable to talk because of pain and shock.

Both Harman and Giovannoli were burned, neither seriously. They were treated at the field hospital and then removed to Miami Valley hospital in Dayton for observation.

Taylor on Stand in Damage Case

With Huntington Taylor on the stand, the defense continued its testimony Wednesday in the trial of the \$10,000 accident suit brought by Philip Shadd against Taylor and the Crater Lake Lumber company.

Taylor, driver of the company's car involved in the mishap, described the accident and denied responsibility. Earlier, the defense introduced a volume of evidence to show that any injuries sustained by the plaintiff were far under the \$10,000 estimate he set upon them.

Dr. George Merryman, physician, Mrs. Ruby Lyle, superintendent of the Hillside hospital, and Dr. H. M. Brown, specialist, were called in this connection.

Certain hospital records and doctor's reports to support the defendants' case. Introduced Tuesday, were objected to by the plaintiff's attorneys, but on Wednesday morning Circuit Judge E. B. Ashurst ruled they could be included in evidence.

Coast City Cold—Astoria had its coldest October day in 20 years with the mercury at 28. Snow flurries were reported. It was 29 at Portland, but the sky was clear and no more snow likely.

La Grande reported a temperature of 15 degrees. Two lives were reported lost in the north in fires and gales that sank several small boats.

The weather bureau at Seattle said the storm was lashing the coast from Alaska to southern California. Communications were disrupted in many regions.

Helena, Mont., was one of the coldest spots in the country. The city, scene of recent terrific earthquakes, was freezing at 8 below.

CORPORATION VALUES DOWN

Total valuation of public service corporations in Klamath county is \$9,191,652, a drop of about \$310,000 under last year. The valuations were received Wednesday from the state tax commission by County Assessor Charles H. Ma.

Central Pacific (S. P.) leads the list with a taxable valuation of \$4,740,891.70. The smallest public service corporation in the county is the Hamaker Telephone company, at Bonanza, which has an assessed valuation of \$51. No mileage of telephone lines is given by the tax commission, but the assessment is placed on wires. It is understood the Bonanza company has three subscribers.

was made to the county board late Tuesday afternoon by Dr. Warren M. Hunt, manager of Klamath Valley hospital, as the board members ended the second day of their preliminary session.

Dr. Hunt offered for \$20,000 to take full charge of the county poor, including hospitalization, maintenance of the poor farm, ambulance service, mileage expenses and the costs of hiring additional medical aid.

Hunt said that his hospital, which he termed a semi-municipal institution, maintained at all times a staff and facilities more than adequate for its regular needs, and that the county and its poor might well benefit by taking advantage of the services it was able to offer.

He added that if his proposal were accepted, his handling of the work would always be open to inspection, and that the court could, if it wished, rule on any borderline hospitalization case.

Hunt saw a possibility of rehabilitating the old and infirm through proper medical care, restoring them to positions where they might again find gainful employment and independence.

Concrete Pouring Begins At Damsite

COULEE DAM, Wash., Oct. 30. (UP)—A three-quarter mile long concrete chain conveyor belt, capable of moving 700 tons of sand hourly across the Columbia river, was given its first tests Tuesday.

The conveyor, on a suspension bridge, will move sand and gravel from pits on the east side of the river to the great mixing plant on the west side. First pouring of concrete on the \$25,000,000 power and reclamation project will begin this week.
