

AUXILIARY PUSHES AMERICANISM PLAN

Clearing American schools of all forms of influence inimical to American democracy will be one of the undertakings of the American Legion auxiliary in its Americanism program during the coming year, according to Mrs. Clara McPherron, chairman of the Americanism committee of the local auxiliary unit.

This activity will be developed under a resolution adopted by the national convention in St. Louis in September which stated: "Whereas, atheistic, communist propaganda is rampant in the schools and colleges of our United States, poisoning and confusing the minds and souls of the youth of America; therefore, be it resolved that the American Legion auxiliary oppose the appointment as a teacher of any person affiliated directly or indirectly with the Third Internationale, or who is an advocate of communism, and strongly urge the exclusion of foreign communist students from our schools and colleges, and also strongly urge a vigorous national policy against communism, nazism and all other un-American 'isms' in all forms and phases." Study of the constitution will be urged and work with youth organizations and foreigners to build better citizenship will be the objective. A program of study will be outlined and classes taught in Americanism for those who have not as yet become naturalized citizens of the United States. Last year this work, under the leadership of Mrs. Ethel Hoagland, filled a great need and was heartily taken advantage of by many men and women who have no other way of learning about the government of the United States.

Mrs. Clara McPherron, chairman of the Americanism committee of the Legion auxiliary is continuing this service this year and has arranged for classes in every section of the city to teach foreign born the fundamentals of the United States government and help to combat all un-American factions which are poisoning the minds of those who do not understand this form of government.

Seven new comets were sighted during 1932.

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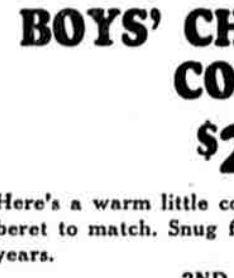
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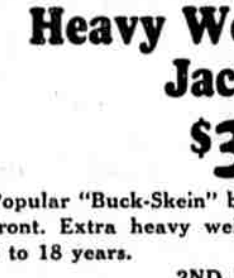
