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Keep It in Limits

THE resolution of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce board of directors, urging the legislators to act on capital construction and social security and then go home, undoubtedly is representative of a great volume of public sentiment in Oregon.
Called for the purposes indicated by the chamber's resolution, the legislators have been introducing a flood of bills on all manner of subjects. If they attempt to take definite and final action on these controversial matters, there's no telling how soon they can get out of Salem. Meanwhile, the costs go on and on.
That there is some effort to control the situation is evident in a Salem dispatch which states that 33 signatures of house members have been attached to a round robin pledging support to the legislation and rules committee in withholding from the house bills not regarded as emergency measures.
The Roseburg News-Review offers a wise suggestion when it remarks:
"If the governor serves notice on the legislature that he will veto everything except those bills having to do with the reason for calling the special session, he will have the approval and backing of the people of Oregon."
It appears that pretty fair headway has been made in committee on the capital construction and site problem, and a number of bills pertaining to social security have been proposed. If the legislators will keep to these matters, they can finish up before long and get out of Salem. Careful deliberation on the issues that brought about the special session, no deliberation at all on others—that should be the policy.

Celebrating the Spud

ITS time for a last reminder of the Klamath Basin Potato Festival, scheduled for Merrill Friday and Saturday.
Its purpose being the celebration of the famous Klamath potato, the festival was inaugurated at Merrill last year. So successful was the first event, and the idea caught so well with the public, it was decided to make it an annual affair.
The plan is to make the festival inclusive of the entire basin in its appeal and support, and representatives have been named from each potato growing district of the county.
An interesting program of entertainment and instruction has been worked out for the two days. Klamath people should plan to be on hand for at least part of the time to pay their respects to the delicious Klamath potato.

The Dishonored Dead

THE anti-Semitism of the Hitler government is an ugly thing, even when viewed in its most favorable light; but it has never appeared meaner than it does in the recent order sent out by Paul Joseph Goebbels, minister of public enlightenment, that the names of all Jews killed in the World War must be removed from the rolls of honor of German war dead.
For a combination of pettiness and utter lack of logic, this would be hard to beat. How can a man more truly show his love for his country than by dying for it? Does not such an act automatically enshrine him among his country's heroes?
Logically, it is hard to see how the German government can strike these Jewish names from its honor rolls—unless, at the same time, it contrives to find some way of giving their lost lives back to them.

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS
The Inside Story From The Capital
By PAUL MALLON
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WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—The eminent Dr. Tugwell does not generally speak with authority on the financial aspects of the New Deal. Specifically he did not at Los Angeles, if his speech there meant that the profit from gold devaluation is going to be applied to the debt so as to make the budget look better any time soon.
There are good reasons at this end for suspecting that the doctor did not intend to say anything new. All he meant to do was to reiterate what Treasury Secretary Morgenthau has been saying for months; namely, that the debt will thus be reduced at some time.
Far more authoritative financing sources than he within the New Deal believe the proper time will not be reached until money gets tight. They do not see that time coming within a year or two. To use that profit now would add an inflationary aspect at a time when it is not needed and would probably be harmful. The only thing it would accomplish is to give the budget a better political appearance.

CLINCH
But there is a better reason than that why it would not be done. The gold profit is the stabilization fund. The treasury cannot afford to use up that fund as long as world currencies are flitting about as they are.
You may check off Dr. Tugwell's assurances as at least semi-political and wholly academic.
GUESSING
Some men at the controls here are willing to bet even money that Dr. Tugwell will not have a Washington residence when the next campaign starts. They expect the White House to discover suddenly some day that the economic situation at Geneva, or something equally important, needs Dr. Tugwell's personal touch, for the year 1936.
Nothing specific has happened lately to warrant such a conclusion. The Los Angeles speech was not that important. Nor is the fact that his rural re-settlement program has developed administration difficulties indicating that the doctor's talents for administration work are not equal to his proficiencies.

PAYROLLS
Behind President Roosevelt's personal poll of business men for ideas to raise the payroll level is an apparent move to promote a permanent modified NRA.
The government business chart (published yesterday) showed that the payroll index has increased about 123 per cent since January, while industrial production has shown no increase at all. Offhand, an outsider looking at the figures might fall into the error of believing that the manufacturers have raised salaries without increasing production, since NRA was abolished.
The fact is one government authority has kept close tabs on wages in specific large industries and has found them relatively unchanged since January. That indicates the demolition of NRA has had no appreciable wage effect in the large industries as represented in the industrial production index (steel, autos, textiles, etc.).

TALK
One explanation for the extent of the increase in the payroll index is that it includes a lot of small factories not included in the industrial production index (small canning factories, textiles, etc.). Business has hit such a pace that these smaller fellows have extended operations and total payroll volume since January. Also, some of the increase is seasonal, but much of it represents solid business expansion.
It still leaves economic room

for a new deal promotional campaign to increase wages, as the wage index is 75 per cent of normal, while production is 91 per cent.
Few insiders here, however, have any hopes that anything very important can or will come out of the current permanent NRA promotional campaign. It is a good thing to talk about politically, a difficult one to act on economically.
"RIGHT"
Great care is being taken on the inside in the selection of a successor to the late Federal Judge Grubb of Birmingham. Recommendations have been prepared by Senators Black and Bankhead, but the justice department also has been quietly looking over the list of eligibles. This is one of the most important districts in the country from a New Deal standpoint. Grubb's court has jurisdiction over all TVA cases. It is hardly a secret that some New Dealers want "the right kind of man" at that bench. This may mean a kind of man with economic views directly opposite those of Hamiltonian Judge Grubb.
Some influential authorities are insisting, however, on a man who will be a judge and not an advocate for any partisan viewpoint.
Note—All New Dealers privately pay to Grubb as high a tribute as anyone can offer an adversary who has caused them so much constitutional grief. They say he never made a decision which failed to represent fully his sincere convictions.

Ten Years Ago In Klamath

WATER gushed forth and partially inundated Pine and Main streets shortly after noon today, when the water main on the corner of Pine and Fourth street broke.
Water was quickly shut off and workmen started to repair the two joints in the main which had broken because of too much water pressure.

A malignant form of bird cholera is responsible for the epidemic which is devastating countless flocks of ducks in the Tule lake country. This was the opinion expressed in Sacramento today by George Tonkin, U. S. game warden for California and Dr. Rudolph Snyder, inspector in charge of the U. S. bureau of animal industry for California, following a two-day inspection through the Tule lake district.
The two federal game officials estimated that there are now at least 50,000 dead ducks in Tule lake, with thousands still dying daily from the ravages of the dread disease.

Previous contrary reports that the malady was not bird cholera have been discarded as the investigation continued, and authorities are now certain that it is cholera. Warnings against eating any ducks until such time as the epidemic runs its course, have been reiterated.

NAZIS PROTEST BRITISH VIEWS

BERLIN, Oct. 31. (AP)—The Nazi regime's recent coolness toward Great Britain was given concrete expression today in orders to the German ambassador at London to protest attacks on the party and on Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler by Winston Churchill.
Not only Churchill, but other prominent statesmen in England, have spoken recently of the German government in a vein construed in official quarters here as unfriendly.
The official German feeling as it applies to Great Britain and the Italo-Ethiopian war was announced by a government spokesman.
"If such expressions as Churchill's are repeated very often," he said, "we most certainly would have to reconsider our neutrality position in the Italo-Ethiopian conflict."

Charles M. Gardner, pioneer of the Poe Valley district, died at his late home in Napa, Calif., Tuesday, October 29, following a paralytic stroke. He is survived by his widow, Emma Kester Gardner, formerly of Poe Valley, three sons and five grandchildren.

Gardner will be buried by the side of his son, Dayton, who lost his life in France.

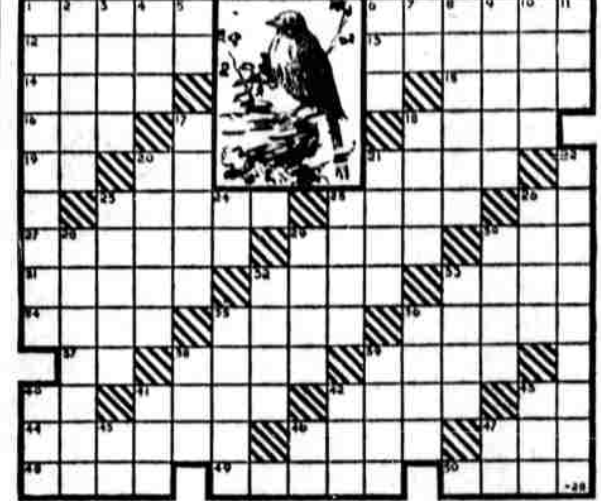
