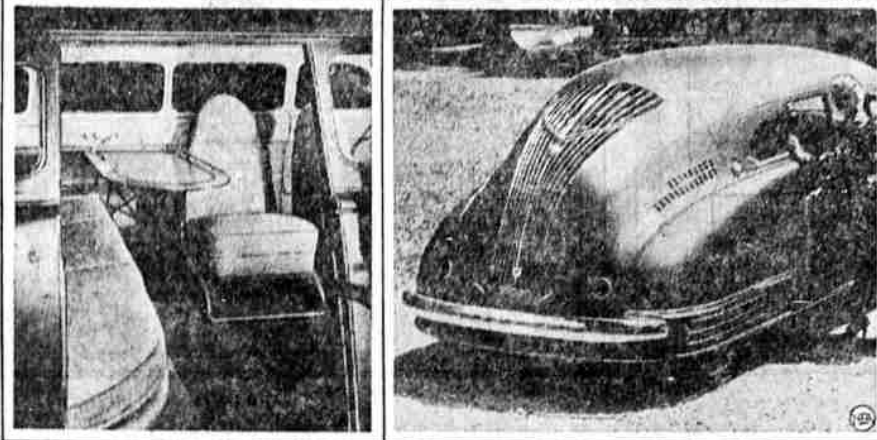
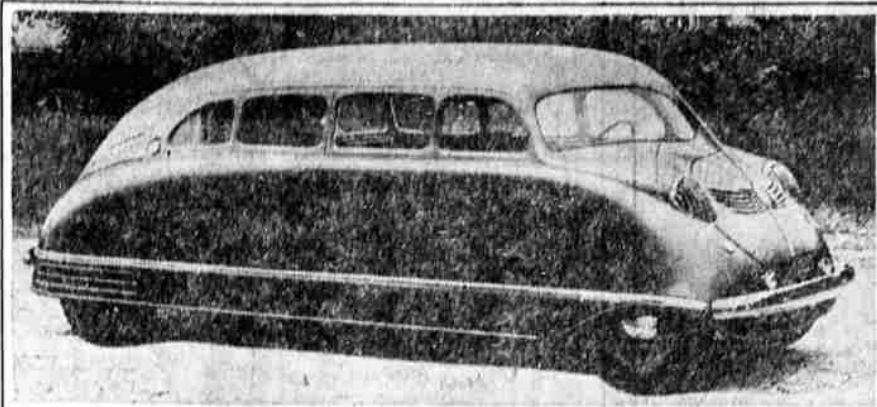
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Luxurious, Rear-Drive Auto Invades Country



Before long you may see a snub-nosed bullet-shaped automobile scud by, and that will introduce you to the radically different type of motor car that its designer predicts will be adopted by the industry within five years. It is the Scarab, a rear-drive car, built by William B. Stout of Detroit. Side view, at top, shows that it has no running boards and not even door handles to break the smooth lines of the exterior. Electric, key-controlled switch buttons open the doors. The engine in the rear is separated from the body by a double sound-proof bulkhead, the entire mechanism one compact unit. Seats, as shown at lower left, can be moved about, and a table set in back. Lower right photo shows rear view of the car, which will be limited to 100 in production and will sell for \$5000.

Automobiles Kill 24,840 First Nine Months of This Year

CHICAGO, Oct. 31. (AP)—Automobiles killed 24,840 persons in the United States the first nine months of 1935, the national safety council estimated today, a reduction of 1 per cent from the 25,089 deaths in the same period of 1934.

Milwaukee had the best record among cities of more than 500,000 population with 43 dead, a death rate of 9.6 per 100,000 of population on the basis of the nine months report.

Other leaders were: Cities of 250,000 to 500,000, Providence, R. I., 11 dead, death rate 5.7; cities of 100,000 to 250,000, Fall River, Mass., 3 dead, death rate 3.5; cities of 50,000 to 100,000, Mount Vernon, N. Y., 1 dead, death rate 2.1; cities of 25,000 to 50,000, Pensacola, Fla., Central Falls, R. I., and Burlington, Vt., all with no reported deaths. The council estimated that if

the nine months trend continues throughout 1935, this year's toll will be approximately 35,000 compared with 36,000 for 1934. Reductions in the 1935 total to date as compared with the 1934 record were reported by 23 states. Among the largest reductions were Delaware, 15 per cent; Rhode Island, 31 per cent; Illinois, 12 per cent; Massachusetts, 14 per cent, and Missouri, 10 per cent.

California reported the most deaths for the first nine months, 1,923 compared with 1,975 for the same period in 1934. Other large figures included Illinois, 1,335 in 1935, 1,543 in 1934; Indiana, 800 in 1935, 812 in 1934; Massachusetts, 528 in 1935, 617 in 1934; New York, 1,708 in 1935, 1,726 in 1934; Ohio, 1,284 in 1935, 1,151 in 1934; Pennsylvania, 1,445 in 1935, 1,512 in 1934; Michigan, 978 in 1935, 916 in 1934.

Young Detroit Bride Claimed Kidnap Victim

DETROIT, Oct. 31. (UP)—Pretty, blond Mrs. Dorothy McGraw, bride of a month, today was reported to police Wednesday by her husband, Dr. J. H. McGraw, a chiropractor. Federal agents, Michigan state police and city police began a search for Andy Elsigian, an Armenian, whom Dr. McGraw said was an acquaintance of his wife before they were married in September.

Snatched From Street Elsigian was named by the diminutive chiropractor as the man who attempted to drag "Dot" into a back room of a beer garden while the couple was dining a week ago. The attempt failed, he said, when he called police, and the man was frightened away.

Mrs. McGraw, according to the story Dr. McGraw told police, was snatched from the street by two men who pulled her into a green Cadillac coupe some time after 1:30 this afternoon.

Husband Hysterical He said that she left their apartment at that time to shop for groceries. When she failed to return, he said he went in search of her, and by questioning bystanders, learned that she had been forced into the automobile which bore Florida license plates. Numbers of the license was not obtained.

Dr. McGraw, apparently in his 50s, was in a near hysteria, when he burst into police headquarters at 5:30 p. m., crying: "They've kidnaped Dot, they snatched her right off the street."

When he could be calmed suf-

ciently, Dr. McGraw told police they had lived in fear for a week, since the beer garden episode. He said his wife's diamond rings, which she was wearing when abducted, were valued at \$3500.

Police so far have been unable to find any of the witnesses who Dr. McGraw reported as describing the abduction. He was questioned for an hour and then allowed to go to his home.

Girl Hitch-Hiker's Career Cut Short

PORTLAND, Oct. 31. (UP)—The wandering of pretty Dorothy Osborn, 19, who has hitch-hiked through every state in the Union, was cut short Wednesday by Federal Judge J. A. Fee who sentenced her to a year in Alderson, W. Va., women's prison, for transporting a stolen car from California to Oregon.

The girl was picked up on the highway north of Eureka by J. Stevens, Talent, Ore., and California State Quarantine Inspector Crossen. When the two men got out of the truck at the Hill, Cal., quarantine station, Dorothy drove the truck away. She was arrested when she went to sleep in the vehicle in Ashland.

CENTRALIA DEER HUNTER SUCCUMBS

CENTRALIA, Oct. 31. (AP)—A wounded deer hunter, Val Smith, 37, Centralia, died in a hospital after searching parties bore him from the snow-covered bald hills near Helm and sped him here in an automobile.

Smith was shot through a leg Tuesday when a hunting companion mistook him for a deer in underbrush in the Bald hills.

Harry Smith and his son, Robert, who were hunting with Val Smith, bound the wounded leg with a tourniquet and then Robert left to get help.

He became lost, while returning with a rescue party, and the two Smiths spent the night in the woods until another searching party found them yesterday. Val Smith died in the hospital surgery.

He and the other Smiths were not related.

Portland Taxi Drivers Strike

PORTLAND, Oct. 31. (UP)—Persons abroad on Portland streets on the coldest morning since last winter Wednesday had difficulty in finding taxicabs.

Approximately 120 drivers of Yellow, Red Top, Brown & White and General cabs went on strike when operators failed to sign a new union agreement. Royal and Broadway firms signed the agreement and their cabs were operating.

Drivers seek a \$2 daily guarantee, 35 per cent of receipts over \$8, and eight instead of 10-hour day.

Four Die as Plane Crashes Into Sea

ROME, Oct. 31. (UP)—Four Italian fliers were killed and one injured Wednesday when their hydroplane dived into the sea shortly after taking off from the hydroport of Puntaella, near Pola, in the Adriatic.

The dead were Pilot Bonanni, co-pilot Evaristo Bortese, Assistant Pilot Quinto Castellani, and Mechanic Gaetano Biseno. Manlio Brusaporci, a pilot, was injured.

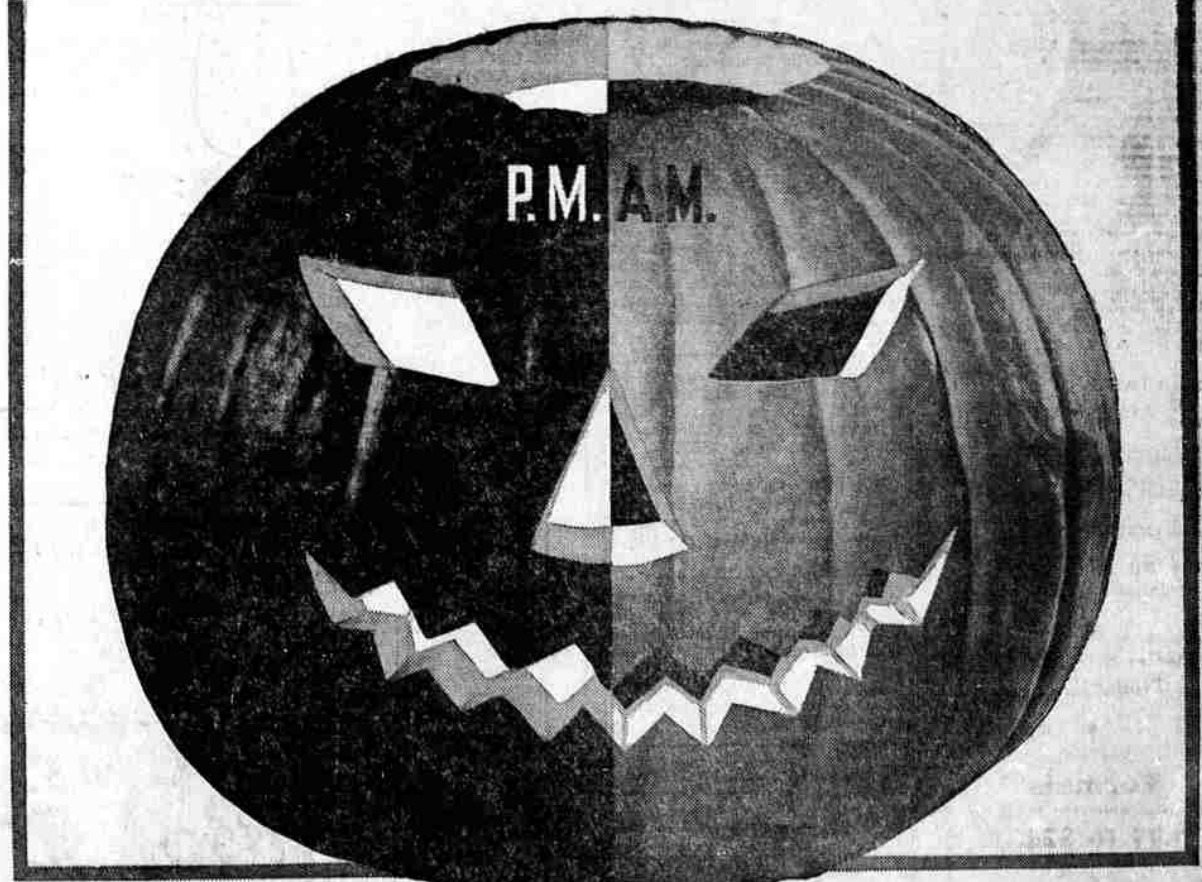
