**LOCKE FIRM
TO DISPLAY
NEW MODELS**

Formal opening of the new quarters of the Locke Motor company will be held Saturday in the remodeled building, formerly housing the Acme Motor company, at the corner of South Sixth and Oak streets.

The opening will be featured by the first showing of the 1936 Chevrolet cars, and special entertainment.

Little information has been available concerning the new Chevrolet series. The 1936 model is hailed as the "only complete low priced car," by Chevrolet officials. There will be both standard and master models on display and cars will be on hand for immediate delivery.

Eleanor Calkins, soprano; Jim Stevens, baritone, and Sebastian Apollo, pianist, all of Medford, will entertain from 2:30 to 5 o'clock in the afternoon and from 8 to 9:30 in the evening. Stevens and Apollo appeared in Klamath last year with the Medford Glee-men.

**PRIZES OFFERED IN
POTATO CONTESTS**

MERRILL, Nov. 1.—Some attractive prizes are being offered by the Potato Festival committee for entrants in the various contests to be staged Saturday morning, second day of the second annual Klamath Basin Potato Festival to be held in Merrill.

Field sports will begin at 10:30 a. m., with a boys' sack race, boys' three-legged race, girls' potato race, boys' tire rolling contest and a tug-of-war with 10 entrants to a side. Cash prizes will be offered in all events.

A first prize of \$20 is offered in the potato sorting contest, with a second prize of \$5. A special spud picking belt is to be given for first prize in the potato picking contest to be held between halves of the Merrill-Malin football game, with a second prize of \$5 and a \$2.50 prize to the one taking third place.

Big tents for the event are being placed in readiness for the numerous exhibits to be entered all of which have some connection with the potato industry. Exhibits will be entered from Klamath Falls, Tulelake, Malin and Merrill.

Fine exhibits of potatoes in both the certified seed and commercial potato divisions will be on display with a first prize of \$10 and a second prize of \$5 to be given the best entries in the certified group.

Potatoes will be auctioned off following the football games Saturday afternoon.

The first day's program will begin at 10 o'clock Friday morning with judging of exhibits by Professor G. R. Hyslop, followed by a potato grading discussion and demonstration by W. F. Close, state federal shipping point inspection supervisor.

The annual meeting of the Klamath Potato association will begin at 1:30 p. m., with Walter M. Pierce, congressman, Professor Hyslop, W. L. Close and Frank McKennon listed as the speakers.

A grade school football game is scheduled for 2 p. m., with the banquet in the Presbyterian church annex at 6:30. Entertainment is to be furnished by the Klamath Falls Glee club and the Business and Professional Women's club.

On Saturday morning the parade will pass through the streets of Merrill at 9:30, followed by the competitive sports and a baked spud luncheon at noon at the Community hall.

Merrill and Malin football squads will battle it out for the championship of the county at 1:30 p. m., and the second day will close with a dance at night in the Community hall.

Italian Deserter**

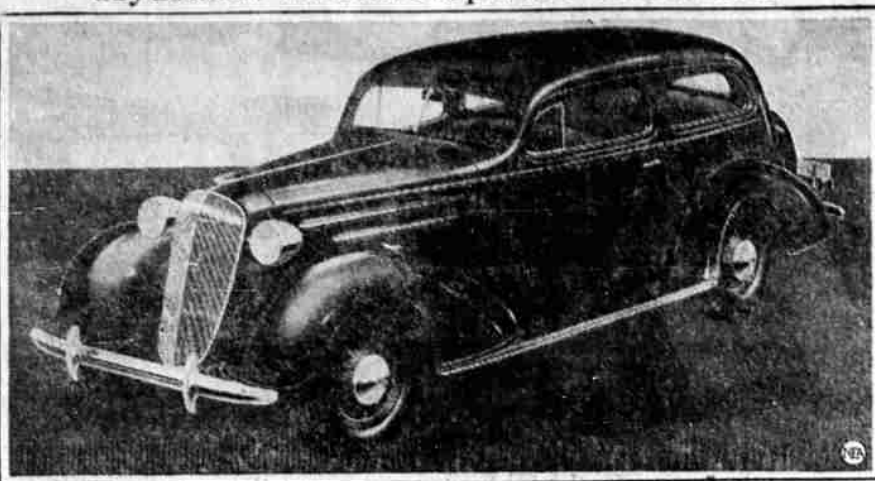
ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 1. (UP) Emperor Haile Selassie—supreme judge of Ethiopia's courts—intervened Thursday to free on parole an Italian Tyrolean truck driver from Trieste, who deserted to the Ethiopians near Dolo and was brought here by airplane, at the order of Ras Desta Demtu, southern commander.

Interviewed by the news, the prisoner, a former subject of Austria, said he "hates Mussolini."

The emperor offered him his choice of passage to Yugoslavia or parole here. He chose the latter and obtained a job as mechanic in the only American automobile service station in Addis Ababa. His name was concealed for fear of reprisals to his family.
