

Eligibility of UCLA Player Questioned

FULLBACK KEY MYSTERY MAN

Identity Status Unknown; Dean Leaves for Texas to Investigate.

AMARILLO, Tex., Nov. 5. (AP)—R. F. Key of Amarillo said today he did not know whether the University of California at Los Angeles football star playing under the name of R. F. (Ted) Key was his brother, Clois (Shorty) Key, a cousin by the name of R. F. (Ted) Key, or someone else.

After making a statement that he himself was Clois Francis Key, the Amarillo man refuted the statement a few minutes later and said his initials were R. F.

VERNON, Texas, Nov. 5. (AP)—W. T. Lofland, superintendent of the Vernon school system, said today R. F. (Ted) Key, former Vernon high school football star, called on him as an equipment salesman for an Amarillo, Texas, concern less than 20 days ago.

His statement further clouded the mystery of the identity of the star fullback of the University of California at Los Angeles, who has been playing on the Pacific coast team as R. F. (Ted) Key.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 5. (AP)—The mysterious chain of circumstances surrounding the question of the eligibility of R. F. (Ted) Key, as a football player at University of California at Los Angeles, tightened today as a mass of evidence, for and against the youth, poured in from California and Texas.

While Dean Earl J. Miller, athletic faculty representative of the institution was en route to El Paso and Amarillo, Texas, to get first hand information on the star fullback's status, he was being sought by U. C. L. A. authorities in the hope that he might be induced to take an airplane to El Paso and meet Dean Miller there.

Player Not Found
School officials said late yesterday that Key would make the trip to Texas to help solve the amazing story that came from Amarillo Saturday morning, causing Dean Miller to keep the fullback from the game with California, but when the train pulled out he had not been located.

Dean Miller's information came from R. B. Norman, Amarillo high school principal, that R. F. (Ted) Key of that city said Clois Francis Key, a former Texas Mines star, was playing at U. C. L. A. under his name and with his high school credentials.

Coach Protests Key
Among the developments were these:
1—W. W. Cook, now in the public school system of Los Angeles, identified the picture of Ted Key as the youth he had in English class when he was going to school at Vernon, Texas, thereby corroborating the statements of the youth and his father, James Key, and his sister, that he is R. F. Key.

2—Coach Matty Bell of Southern Methodist university, the next grid opponent of U. C. L. A., said at Dallas last night that he was "thoroughly convinced" Ted Key is the same as Shorty (Francis Clois) Key, former football player at Texas School of Mines, at El Paso.

Pictures Show Resemblance
3—Bob Vaughn, superintendent of schools at Panhandle, said R. F. Key was graduated from high school there five or six years ago, but that he did not know if it was the same Key who now is attending U. C. L. A.

4—Coach Al Baggett, of West Texas State Teachers' college, said a newspaper picture of Ted Key, the U. C. L. A. star, resembled Clois Key, whom he coached at Vernon high school prior to 1925.

All efforts to reach the R. F. Key at Amarillo failed yesterday. A messenger boy from whom he received a telegram yesterday said he would see no one until today.

Brothers Key Men on Bear Eleven
BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 5. (AP)—If California is to stop Washington in their important conference game here Saturday, two brothers—Jack and Bob Brittingham—will have to do it, fans said today.

Stanford's star wingman, Monk Moscrip and Keith Topping, succeeded in bottling up Byron Haines and Jimmy Cain when the Indians stopped Washington, 6 to 0, and "Stub" Allison's California team feel they must adopt similar tactics.

Jimmy Braddock Feels Confident of Beating Joe

SEATTLE, Nov. 5. (AP)—James J. Braddock, reigning king of the heavyweights, defied Brown Bomber Joe Louis today, promised to beat him, predicted a million dollar gate, and belittled the rest of the heavyweights—all in one breath.

Blithely summing up the shortcomings of other possible adversaries, Braddock declared Louis was the only opponent in whom he was interested.

"There is no one now that means a great deal outside of Joe," Braddock said. "I figure that a match between Louis and me will draw better than a million. I'm picking the toughest opponent for the biggest money."

"Louis is quite a fighter, but I really think I can beat him. Louis hasn't been tested yet, and I feel sure that I can take him."

Braddock will not defend his title until June, but when he does go into the ring, he said, he wants to see none other than Joe Louis in the other corner.

Here are the champion's opinions of ranking heavyweights: "Max Schmeling is a pretty good boxer, but Louis will take him."

"Primo Carnera, King Levinson and Max Baer were scared to death when they faced Louis." Braddock dismissed Jack Sharkey with a shrug. Joe Roubid, Braddock's manager, was more expressive. He called Sharkey "a bum and a quitter."

"Could credit Louis with being an excellent boxer, but 'not good enough' to whip Braddock. Gould said he would sign for Braddock to meet the Brown Bomber, but did not know whether it would be in June or September.

Braddock will box Jack McCarthy of Boston in an exhibition here tonight.

Husky Scouts Warn Players

SEATTLE, Nov. 5. (AP)—Warnings by scouts that the University of California's football team will prove a tough nut to crack, spurred the University of Washington Huskies today in their final drills before heading toward Berkeley.

Cotton Wilcox, a scout, returning from Los Angeles, where he saw California beat U. C. L. A., commented:

California's line is heavier and stronger than Stanford's. Lutz is the best tackle on the coast. Altogether, the Bears present a well-nigh impenetrable defense."

Wilcox enlarged upon California's strength thereby setting Coach James Phelan and his Washington Huskies alwitter and causing a great stir of preparations intended to head off the Bears on Saturday.

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BROWN, TUTT SET FOR FIGHT

Lightweights Top Card At Armory Ring Tonight.

King Tutt of San Francisco and Elmer Brown of Klamath Falls will step into the Klamath Armory ring tonight to determine the difference between a slugger and a boxer.

Boxer Brown and Slugger Tutt fight the ten-round main event. Brown, because of his past record in Klamath Falls fights, stood out this afternoon as a slight favorite.

With an accurate, sharp-shooting left hand, Brown has boxed his way to victory in every fight he has appeared in here. He has won the majority by decisions. Those others that he won by knockouts proved pretty definitely that he also carried a strong punch in his right hand to back up the aggressive jabbing of his left.

The fighter has never been off his feet in a Klamath Falls battle.

Tutt, taking the name of that original King Tutt, is a lightweight with a good reputation in California. While probably not as fast and clever as Brown, he can hit a moving target from any point of attack—and usually the target stops moving immediately.

Brown has been training in the city for this fight and is reported in top form after several weeks' absence from the ring.

A battle of 160-pounders will occur when Jack Hibbard of Klamath Falls lines up against Ray Quigley of Oakland in the six-round semi-windup. Hibbard has fought and won many "wager hikes" from Pullman to Spokane.

Quigley is showing here for the first time.

The two featured bouts will be introduced by a series of local preliminaries.

Leg-Weary Gonzaga Trainer Nears End of Journey

ROSALIA, Wash., Nov. 5. (AP)—Black cats were the violent peevish of leg-weary Dr. Ray Mauro today as he plodded into the final miles of his 77-mile "wager hike" from Pullman to Spokane.

"Just as though there wasn't enough walking to do without having to dodge black cats!" the chunky Gonzaga university trainer ejaculated in setting out at dawn.

Congrat Defeat Did It
"Yesterday I had to walk a quarter of a mile through a field to get around a cat that had crossed the road. It thought I was chasing it, but I was just being cautious. I've got my share of bad luck without inviting more. I wish someone would ask every farmer on the highway with a black cat to tie it up until I get past."

Mauro is hiking home because he said he would if Gonzaga beat Washington State in Saturday's football game. He rode home by car after the game, but the football players "called" his bluff, and took him back to Pullman Sunday for the hike.

The Gonzaga band and student body will meet him at the Spokane city limits tonight.

Hikes Turned Down
Mauro said last night he would sleep with his shoes on. He said he was afraid his feet would swell so big he couldn't put his shoes on again if he took them off. No one peeked to check on him.

Mauro's hike has shoved Ethiopia into the background as an Island Empire news topic. Dozens of motorists slow up to chide him with ride offers. He has to turn them down. It's a hike, not a hitch-hike.

Cards Will Go South Early for S. C. Tilt

PALO ALTO, Calif., Nov. 5. (AP)—Stanford is taking no chances on weather putting its football team in a bad spot for the University of Southern California game. Two years ago, the Cards barely got to the stadium in time after a washout delayed their train. Coach Tiny Thornhill is remedying the situation this season by starting south with the team a day early. The squad will rest in Pasadena Friday night and play Saturday.

Thornhill had hopes of using fullback "Bones" Hamilton and guard Larry Roubid against Troy, but further exercising will be needed to determine the improvement in their injuries.

OREGON TEAMS BUILD ATTACK

Webfoots, Beavers Get Set for Annual "Big Game."

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 5.—A strictly offensive battle, with both teams bending every effort to roll up scores, looms for Saturday afternoon when the University of Oregon and Oregon State college meet on Hayward field for their 39th annual gridiron classic.

Oregon State's sophomore aggregation has demonstrated its scoring power in every game this fall and has as yet to be held scoreless. The chief Orange scoring threats will be a brilliant air attack, engineered by sophomore Joe Gray, and the dazzling open field running of the same Gray.

Webfoot Attack Weak

Oregon, on the other hand, hasn't shown as much offensive power this fall, but with two weeks of almost constant work on running and passing plays, Coach Prink Callison is confident his Webfoots can match the States in advancing the ball. The return of Bud Goodin, Oregon's sophomore left half, will strengthen the Webfoot offense at least 50 per cent, in the opinion of observers.

The Webfoots are expected to have a slight edge in defensive power, with a more experienced forward wall. Four lettermen and three sophomores are due to start Saturday. They are Stan RJordan and Bud Jones, ends; Del Bjork and Ken Skinner, tackles; Ross Carter and Tony Amato, guards, and Vern Moore, center. Skinner, Amato and Moore are the first year men.

Backfield Set Named

Callison's choices in the backfield are John Rofschneider at quarter, Goodin and Bob Braddock, halfbacks, and Frank Michalek, fullback. This quartet averages 176 pounds and is Oregon's fastest and hardest-hitting group.

While Callison and his players try to reach a proper playing pitch for the annual battle, Webfoot athletic officials were making plans to handle a near-capacity crowd of 18,000 at the gates Saturday. Only 2500 reserved seats were on hand Monday, but a like number of general admission seats will be placed on sale at noon the day of the game, which starts at 2 o'clock.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Nov. 5. When the Oregon State football team meets the University of Oregon eleven at Eugene Saturday at 2:00 o'clock in the 39th annual encounter of the two rivals, the Orangemen will be at full strength with the possible exception of right halfback. It is still doubtful whether Tommy Swanson, injured in the Washington State game, will be in condition to play.

Regulars who were kept out of last week's 19 to 2 win over University of Portland by injuries were Ed Strack, right guard; Woody Joslin, left end; Maynard Schultz, right end, and Ken Deming, star Orange center, who has been out since the Southern California game, all will be in shape Saturday according to R. L. Bosworth, team physician.

Espee May Put on Football Special

Providing 15 reservations are made immediately, the Southern Pacific will put on a special car leaving here Friday night for the Oregon-Oregon State homecoming battle at Eugene Saturday.

The tourist car would be hooked up to the regular train leaving here at 9:30 and arriving in Eugene Saturday morning. Those making reservations would be back here Sunday morning.

Fencing Star Awaits Reply From Germany

OAKLAND, Calif., Nov. 5. (AP)—Helene Mayer, German-Jewess whose fencing prowess has earned her world recognition, today awaited response to her statement that she would not participate for Germany in the 1936 Olympiad in Berlin unless she is accorded full citizenship rights.

The Miss, a language instructor at Mills college, made her stand late yesterday, denying quotations of German Olympic Games officials that she had agreed to represent the Nazis unconditionally.

An official of the college related the 1932 Olympic champion's statement, and said, "If the German committee and government refuse to grant such citizenship rights, Miss Mayer will decline."

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
