

COUNCIL BACKS PROGRAM FOR HOLIDAY EVENT

A major feature of what promises to be the most elaborate decoration plan in the history of Klamath "Christmas openings" was officially approved by the city council Monday night.

The city fathers permitted erection of pillars at intersections of all streets from Link river bridge to Esplanade street. Elaborately lighted, the pillars will be built and erected by the newly organized Klamath Ad club. The ad club will be in charge of Christmas opening this year in connection with the chamber of commerce and merchants' bureau.

Orville Ortelle is chairman of the street decoration committee. Recommendations that the city supply boats and other equipment to effect the rescue of children and others caught on thin ice in favorite skating places were presented to the city council Monday evening by A. C. Erickson of Shippington. Erickson is the father of the 8-year-old boy who nearly lost his life in his heroic attempt to save Douglas Frazer who drowned Sunday afternoon.

Fire Chief Keith Ambrose stated that a boat was badly needed in such cases, and that in many cases lives could be saved if rescuers had quick access to such equipment.

The matter was referred to the police committee for further consideration, and a report will be presented to the county next week.

WPA Talked
City Engineer E. A. Thomas reported a conference with Thomas W. Delzell, district supervisor for the WPA, in which Delzell recommended that the city present additional applications for numerous work projects. Thomas stated that he was preparing such project suggestions and that they would be presented next Monday. The city will probably be asked to supply a small amount of money, approximately \$100 for equipment for such projects as street grading, etc., which will require only manual labor.

Employment of a man to be supplied by the Salvation Army to solicit food for the transient camp on South Sixth street, was authorized by the council. This man, who is to be paid \$40 a month, will also prepare one meal per day for itinerants.

Franchise Talked
City Attorney J. H. Carnahan recommended that a clause allowing the city the right to condemnation proceedings on properties owned by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company included in the telephone company franchise ordinance recently advertised. As the ordinance now stands such measures could only be taken through arbitration, which would entail long delays before bringing a case into court, it was said.

A. G. Goehring, local manager of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph, objected to Carnahan's suggestion on the grounds that it should have been included in the original ordinance. He reported, however, that he had submitted the matter to the company attorney, and would present counsel's opinion at the next meeting of the council.

Should the condemnation amendment be added to the ordinance, it would be re-advertised before final passage. The city attorney was instructed to draw up an agreement between the city and the company which would govern police relative to the transfer of the city's one-half interest in the isolation hospital, should the transfer be made as recently suggested by the county budget committee.

Councilman J. J. Keller, president of the council, presided at the Monday evening meeting. Mayor W. E. Mahoney has not returned from the middle west.

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CROP GROUPS TO MEET HERE ON THURSDAY

Farm crops committee members of the Klamath county outlook conference to be held in Klamath Falls on February 25 and 26, will meet Thursday afternoon, November 7, at 1:30 o'clock in the civil service room at the federal building. There are 40 members of this committee, with U. E. Roeder acting as general chairman, Henry Semon has been appointed chairman of the entire outlook conference. E. H. Jackson, farm crops specialist of Oregon State college, will be here Thursday to meet with the committee and assist in the preliminary work of obtaining information for a substantial report on the agricultural outlook to be presented at the final meeting in February.

The farm crops committee consists of five sub-committees listed as follows: potatoes, S. P. Behringer, chairman; small seeds, E. A. Geary, chairman; grain, Chester Haskins, chairman; hay and forage, Stuart Nicholson, chairman; truck, Al Crystal, chairman.

A meeting of the livestock committee, which is the second major group of the outlook conference, will be held in the near future, the date to be announced soon. W. C. Dalton is general chairman of this committee.

The central committee of the outlook conference met last week and elected the men who are serving as chairmen of the various general and sub-committees.

ASHLAND PLANS DRAMA CONFERENCE

Another step in the rapid development of Ashland as the center of amateur drama on the Pacific coast was announced recently by Angus L. Bowmer, dramatic instructor of Southern Oregon normal. He is laying definite plans for an extensive drama conference to be held in Ashland, from Friday to Sunday, January 17 to 19.

The conference, the first of its kind there, will become an annual event and, together with the Shakespearean Festival, will give Ashland and Southern Oregon normal school a reputation for leadership in the field of histrionic art. An effort is being made to draw drama enthusiasts from as far north as Eugene and Portland, as far south as Redding, and as far east as Bend. Those attending the conference will include teachers, students, leaders in the little theatre movement of the state and members of such organizations as the little theatre guild in Klamath Falls.
