end of the first period. Klamath was leading 7 to 6 at this point. The Klamath coach pointed out a second difference between Referee Deal and Umpire Scheffel. Shortly before Medford scored the touchdown winning the game, Deal informed Arvit the Klamath team had one more time out. When the team took the time out, Scheffel stepped off a five yard penalty and gave Medford an extra down.

Schedule Coaching Cited
Had Scheffel's ruling on the number of times out and disputed touchdown been disallowed Klamath would have taken the ball on its own 18-inch line with three seconds to go. One play would have ended the contest, observers here believed, thus giving the Pelicans the ball game, 14 to 13.

There was also some discussion against Bowerman for allegedly following the course of the teams from the sidelines and flashing signals to his quarterback.

Content to forget the contest, Klamath school officials were aroused again this week when an article in the Medford Mail-Tribune accused a Klamath player of striking Scheffel after the game.

It was pointed out that apologies had been made and that Scheffel, taking cognizance of the emotional strain of the Pelicans after the game, passed off the incident lightly.

Result of Game Affected
L. B. Emery, principal, indicated he would be interested in submitting the entire situation to the impartial state high school athletic association. It was a question whether Medford was entitled to a 19 to 14 victory or Klamath to a 14 to 13 win.

Coach Arvit, while resenting the loss of the game from what he thought a blunder on the part of an official, said he did not intend to make a formal protest.

Klamath, outplaying the undefeated Tigers through a large part of the contest, had pointed toward an upset. The team has won but one game from Medford since 1914. This came in 1929, the year following the departure of Prink Callahan to become freshman coach at the University of Oregon.

DEAL MAKES DENIAL

GRANTS PASS, Nov. 6 (AP)—L. Deal, Grants Pass high school instructor who refereed the contested football game between Medford and Klamath Falls last Saturday, denied today that a penalty was assessed against Klamath Falls for a time out when they were told there would be no penalty.

Deal explained that first he told Coach Arvit that Klamath Falls had taken all their rests. A conference between the referee and the timekeepers followed with the result that it was agreed Klamath had one more time out in its favor. Deal said he then informed the Klamath captain and coach and the next time out was taken without penalty.

Principal Smith of the Medford high school told Deal in a telephone conversation Tuesday unless a Klamath Falls player apologized for his asserted assault made in the dressing rooms on Scheffel, Smith was seriously considering severing athletic relations with the Pelicans, Deal said.

Smith asked Deal if he intended to take the matter up with the Oregon State High School Athletic association, but Deal said he responded that the affair "is ancient history" and that if action was wanted it should have been requested at the time of the dispute.

the bill out in a form similar to this:

1.—That the capitol commission consist of five members appointed by the governor.
2.—That the expenditure be \$3,500,000.
3.—That Candelaria Heights be eliminated and the commission be given power to select any adjacent land up to a certain extent.

Speculation was rife the senate would not take long in rejecting the house amendments to its senate bill 54, as the capitol project is known.

Reports at the state legislature today further indicated Howard Latourette, speaker of the house, would not protest desires of Governor Martin strenuously, due to his announced ambition to succeed Walter Pierce as national democratic committeeman.

Immediately after passage of the capitol bill Representative Bull of La Grande introduced the resolution for sine die adjournment at midnight Friday. The resolution was tabled.

The branch banking bill, known as house bill 21, which would make it illegal to operate branch banks, was still in committee, but it was expected the proposal would be reported out later on a divided report, the majority of eight against the proposal and a minority of two for the bill. Representatives Eckersley and Hyde were expected to bring in the minority report.

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REPUBLICANS GAIN MAYORALTY VOTES

Many cities elected republican mayors yesterday, but returns today showed there also were triumphs for democrats and socialists.

Although in most instances local issues dominated, and some campaigns were non-partisan, the republicans won in Philadelphia, Cleveland, Columbus, Detroit, and many smaller cities in New York and Ohio.

In Philadelphia, S. Davis Wilson, with a plurality of 47,214 votes, hailed his election over John B. Kelly, the democratic candidate, as indicative of "a united party for the election of a republican president in 1936." But democrats pointed out the Quaker city had not elected a democratic mayor since 1881, and compared Wilson's 47,214 plurality with the republican edge of 358,679 in the 1931 election.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 6 (AP)—S. B. Hall, Multnomah county agricultural agent, said today that the crop loss in the county because of the untimely freezing weather can be estimated, conservatively, at \$500,000.

Growers of late cauliflower in the Troutdale and Springdale areas were hardest hit. The crop is almost a total loss, the damage amounting to about \$250,000. Cabbage growers in the county suffered a loss of about \$50,000.

Hall said the freeze was not severe enough here to damage the can berries, but many acres of strawberries are believed to have been destroyed.

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\$30,000 AVAILABLE FOR AIRPORT WORK

Approximately \$30,000 will be spent through WPA in improvement of the Klamath Falls municipal airport, bringing it up to standard in all ways but the administration building and lights. This was reported to the board of directors of the chamber of commerce Wednesday by J. A. Gordon, of the aviation committee.

Gordon said that about \$2,000 will be contributed locally and \$28,000 by the government for the WPA project.

Ed Geary of the agricultural committee reported that through the county appropriation, the contribution by sheepmen, and the biological survey, five trappers will be provided for this county to fight predatory animals the coming year.

Malcolm Epley of the forum committee, reported that Senator Charles L. McNary is being invited to speak at a November forum, if possible, and that other prominent speakers are being sought. It appears likely that George Koen, state department commander of the American Legion, will be a speaker at a forthcoming meeting.
