JUDGE GIVES
RULE FAVORING
TAKOMA DUKE

A finding for the plaintiff in the case of Takoma Duke versus Fred and Hertha Duke, and Fay Morris, as trustee, was rendered by Circuit Judge Arthur D. Hay in an opinion filed in circuit court Thursday.

Takoma Duke, sister of Fred Duke, asked judgment for \$26,980 and foreclosure of a second mortgage on the Duke building on East Main street, Duke defaulted, but Fay Morris, as trustee in bankruptcy, opposed the foreclosure.

Judge Hay, in his opinion, cited the near relationship of the plaintiff Takoma Duke and defendant Dukes, saying that this might give rise to suspicion as to the bona fides of the instrument attacked, but suspicion is not proof.

The judge pointed out that both sides admit the property is only worth \$12,000, and there is a first lien of \$13,329.57 against it, a claim prior to that of Takoma Duke. Therefore, it was pointed out, there is no equity for the trustee in bankruptcy to lose.

No costs were assessed to either party. R. C. Groenbeck represented Takoma Duke, plaintiff in this case.

CAMP TULE LAKE
HAS FULL CREW

TULELAKE, Nov. 7. — Camp Tulelake of the reclamation service is now filled to capacity and is operating under the direction of Captain Dittmer of Seattle, assisted by Lieutenant C. C. Steggs of Los Angeles, and Dr. Shlach, camp physician.

The original personnel of the camp was 137 men, who arrived shortly after the first of October. This number has been augmented this week by addition of 76 men from Ft. Knox, Ky., and 17 from California points. The Ft. Knox men arrived over the past week-end and the California boys came to camp on Monday.

Superintendent Hayden of the reclamation service, under whose direction the camp work is designated, has placed most of the personnel on jobs in the Tulelake basin area, where the boys are cleaning and repairing ditches and drains. They also are at work on new construction, building gates and other appliances to the irrigation system in preparation for the spring waters.
