

TREE TROOPER CAMPS FILLED TO REGULATION

With CCC camps Number 41 and 20 located at Merrill and Tule lake filled to standard regulation, work projects on the Klamath reclamation project are in full swing, according to Superintendent B. E. Hayden, who is in charge of the program.

"We have been particularly fortunate in the type of troopers transferred here from northern Idaho," said Hayden Thursday. "They are all good workers, and a good bunch."

A crew of 50 men is now at work on the government "A" canal just outside the city, making small drainage trenches to carry off leak water in order that the upper canal may be cleaned of all debris later this winter.

The trash will be removed from the canal with tractors and loaded into dump trucks and carried away.

The men engaged in the canal drainage work are from the upper camp, and a detail of 125 men from the lower camp has started to clean the Tule lake laterals and all portions of the "A" canal system serving Tule lake. This is regular maintenance work, and will continue indefinitely.

One of the major projects of both camps is the matter of obtaining sufficient wood to heat the barracks, etc. Approximately five cords are required by each camp daily.

Superintendent Hayden and Captain Meiring of Medford, district quartermaster for the CCC, made arrangements Wednesday to take wood out of the Shaw-Brertram holdings six miles south of Indian Wells in the Lava Beds.

Large crews with trucks and drag saws will start the wood project at once, hauling the wood to the Tule lake camp for later distribution as needed during the winter.

Captain William S. Akers, who was at the Tule lake camp Number 20 during its construction, has been put in charge of Klamath camp Number 41, at Merrill. In addition to Captain Akers, the staff there is composed of Lieutenants Hammond and Huefner.

Captain Douglas C. Dittmore is in charge of the Tule lake camp, assisted by Lieutenant C. G. Berger.

Earl Snell, secretary of state, will give the Armistice Day address.

The national guard has a very interesting dedicatory service planned for the armory.

Everybody will be interested in seeing the street events for the children. There will be races of various kinds and cash prizes for the winners.

The hot dog feed directly across from the armory is free to everyone and will be served as were the boys in the army in '17 and '18.

At 6:00 P. M. there will be a banquet for all veterans and distinguished guests at the Willard hotel.

The day will end with a military ball at the new armory which the public is invited to attend. There will be added attractions there during the dance.

"G-Man" Does Business Here Until Police Catch Up

C. E. Bundy, transient harvester recently employed on the Kinney and Grimes ranches here, was credited Wednesday night with introducing a new type of skin game into Klamath county. Bundy posed as no less than a federal agent as he laid the groundwork for what he apparently hoped would be successful passing of a flood of bad checks.

The imposture began Wednesday morning after Bundy had allegedly spent the night touring the city's "hot spots" by taxi. At 7:30 he started out to subpoena the county's farmers for federal grand jury duty at Portland.

When the trio had left, the State Line proprietor learned that Bundy had no account at the Merrill bank. Shortly thereafter state police and "federal police" had a showdown. At the time of his arrest, Bundy allegedly had in his pocket five bad checks all written and ready to cash.

HAY ASSIGNED TO SEVERAL KLAMATH CASES

Circuit Judge Arthur D. Hay of Lake county is expected to sit in the Klamath county circuit court next week to hear motions and arguments in a number of cases, including those growing out of the recent grand jury investigation of alleged gambling and graft conditions.

Judge Hay has been specifically assigned to the case of Lake-shore Gardens, et al. versus California Oregon Power company, et al., and has a general assignment for other cases.

It is understood motions to quash indictments will be filed in a day or two in the cases of the state versus County Judge George Grizzle, charged with larceny, and state versus former County Commissioner C. R. Williams, charged with malfeasance.

Williams has not been arraigned nor entered a plea. Grizzle has been arraigned, and the plea is yet to be entered.

Other cases pending upon which affidavits of prejudice have been filed against Judge Ashurst, and on which Hay presumably will sit, include:
