

DEATH STILL'S PREACHING OF BILLY SUNDAY

CHICAGO, Nov. 6. (UP)—The Rev. William A. (Billy) Sunday, world famous evangelist who deserted a professional baseball career to "save sinners for the Lord," died Wednesday in the home of his brother-in-law, William J. Thompson, Chicago florist.

Sunday had suffered a stroke of angina pectoris at 2 o'clock yesterday morning. However, he apparently had recovered and was active throughout the day yesterday, Mrs. Sunday said.

At about 8 o'clock, after eating dinner and sitting for a while with Mrs. Sunday and Mr. and Mrs. Thompson, he went upstairs to rest for a while, according to the widow. He had been upstairs only a short time when the sound in the lower room heard a sharp cry.

They found him suffering intensely and summoned a physician, but the noted evangelist died before medical aid arrived. Sunday had been visiting the Thompsons several days.

Sunday would have been 72 years old November 19, had been in poor health for several years, and was stricken with a heart attack in Chattanooga, Tenn., last May 15, but said at that time "I will have a third strike left."

He was not able to be as active in recent years as his custom because of his poor health and he found it necessary to take long vacations between revivals, but always managed to find the strength to come back for one more fight with the devil.

ATTORNEY TO START TULELAKE PRACTICE

TULELAKE, Nov. 7.—Walter L. Chandler, graduate of the Hastings school of law, University of California, is making arrangements for establishment of a law office in Tulelake and expects to be at work the first of the coming week. Chandler left for San Francisco Tuesday afternoon to secure his law library and will return Monday and establish his office.

Chandler is a native son of the state, having been raised in Chico where he graduated from the Chico high school and also from the Chico State Teachers college. Taking up the study of law, Chandler took the complete law course at Berkeley where he graduated last June.

Following his graduation he entered the law office of Otto L. Hayes, Mt. Shasta, as an assistant. On October 19 Chandler took his state bar examinations and received a high rating from the examining board.

Chandler's license permits him to enter any state or federal court in pursuance of the practice of law.

With the prospects of much work in his profession, Chandler is enthusiastic regarding the possibilities in Tulelake. His entry here is welcomed by all residents. In the past work of this nature has of necessity been taken to Klamath Falls and Yreka to outside attorneys and has added considerably to the expenses of cases by local residents.

Pair Charged With Death of Ten Given Long Prison Terms

CHICAGO, Nov. 7. (UP)—Frank Vitale and Joseph Di Chiri, charged with the murder of 10 persons in an insurance fire plot, Wednesday were convicted and given sentences of 99 years and a day each in prison by a jury in criminal court which had deliberated five hours.

The sentence was a surprise, since Joseph Vitale, third defendant, yesterday was given a 199-year sentence by Judge Joseph B. David, after he had been allowed to enter a guilty plea, "because of mitigating circumstances."

Immediately after sentence was pronounced, First Assistant State's Attorney Wilbur T. Crowley informed the court he was prepared to proceed with nine other indictments returned against the three men.

They were tried on specific charges in connection with only one death during the present trial.

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Propaganda Artists Reach New Height in Tall Stories

Propaganda and rumor factories worked overtime turning out prize tales on the Italo-Ethiopian war Wednesday. The Ethiopian government, which has admittedly poor communications with the north, "announced" death of 10 Italians in a surprise raid driving Italian advance patrols out of Makale. Other "tall" stories of the day included:

ROME, Nov. 7. (UP)—Ethiopia massacred 4,000 children and 2,000 women belonging to followers of Ras Haile Selassie Gussa in retaliation for Gussa's denunciation to the Italians, the Popolo Di Roma's Adwa correspondent reported Wednesday, quoting "certain armed men" who arrived at Adwa.

The report said the hereditary Prince Asefaussien, chief of the Uollo, transported the Gussa-ites' wives and children some distance from Makale and then "abandoned them to a savage massacre." Afterwards the prince's men held a frenzied war dance all evening long.

PARIS, Nov. 6. (UP)—L'Intransigeant's Addis Ababa correspondent reported today that "King Menelik's treasure caves, opened by dynamite, revealed 175,000,000 francs worth of valuable which will be used for defense of the country." Emperor Haile Selassie decided after a conference with Tekla Hawariat, his former leagued delegate, to wage "war to the death." Subscription to a national war fund was opened.

ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 7. (UP)—An Italian newspaper dispatch saying an American negro had planted a live bomb in the emperor's palace was denied heatedly Wednesday by Colonel Hubert Fauntleroy Julian, the erstwhile "Black Eagle" of Harlem who wears a gaudy uniform and rides a white horse but has an uncertain status in Ethiopia's armed forces.

"The six loyal American negroes now in Ethiopia would die rather than attempt such an atrocious deed," spluttered Julian. "The report indicates I am the only one visiting the palace daily. It is my duty to go there and receive orders."

"There is no amount of money or position in the world which the Italians would be able to offer me capable of tempting me to do such a thing."

Julian said the emperor had allowed him to choose which of the three major generals clamoring for his services he would accompany to the front.

Again referring to the bomb rumor, Julian struck a pose and declared:

"Twenty-five million Ameri-

can negroes who supported my aeronautical ventures have too much confidence to believe such reports."

The Black Eagle apparently referred to the subscriptions raised to finance his Harlem to Addis Ababa airplane flight which ended on mud flats near New York.

Eleven Injured as Train Jumps Track

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 7. (UP)—Eleven persons were injured, none critically, when the last car of the New York Central's Empire State express jumped the track here Wednesday and crashed into a train standing on the State street bridge.

It was believed the standing train kept the derailed car plunging from the bridge, 39 feet high. The coach and one car of the standing train were badly damaged.

The injured were treated at hospitals. All but four were able to proceed on the Empire State express when the wreckage had been cleared away.

TOLL CHARGES WIN SOUTHEAST PROTEST

MERRILL, Nov. 7.—In protest against the 10 cent toll on telephone calls between Malin, Tulelake and Merrill, levied early last summer by the Columbia Utilities company, several petitions have been circulated in all districts of the south end and with completion last week, were sent to the interstate commerce commission at Salem.

Signers agreed to have telephones removed in event the toll is not revoked. Sentiment against the toll has been growing steadily among the telephone company's patrons, many of whom have business connections in more than one town. In a number of instances, homes of business men are just across the line, making a toll call necessary from home to office.

With close consolidation of the south end district, telephone patrons are of the opinion that no toll is necessary.

While Tulelake has a switchboard and operator, Malin is served by an automatic switchboard which clears lines for all calls in the Malin district. The Merrill office recently moved into new quarters built by the company.

New lines, repair work on old lines and installation of new phones is reported by the local office.

Recent repairing of the Shaw-Bratman and Liskey brothers

line was completed and on Monday a new 25-pair cable was installed under the Southern Pacific tracks at Tulelake, replacing worn out apparatus. The new cable will make provision for serving 25 patrons on the east side of town.

General repair work is scheduled for the winter and building of new lines is expected to get under way next spring.
