Mrs. Gage was born in Oregon before it was a state. Her birthplace was at Starr's Point, near Monroe. She didn't leave the borders of Oregon until she was 65 years of age. She remembers Eugene and Medford when they were nothing but brushy fields.

Hearty and hale, Mrs. Gage sometimes plays old-time dance numbers on her violin for the Townsend club, of which she is a member. In early days she played for the square dances.

She is alert on political issues of the day, and is a strong supporter of the Townsend plan—"not for myself, but for generations yet to come."

Mrs. Gage married Joseph C. Gage in Jacksonville in 1876. Mrs. E. H. Linville, Altamont, and Norman Gage, her daughter and son, were the first twins born in Medford. Another daughter, Mrs. Martha Fertig, lives in Nevada City, Calif.

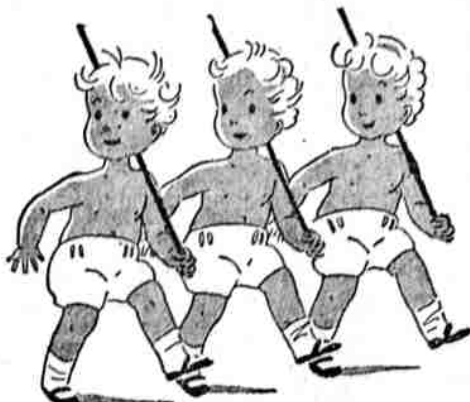

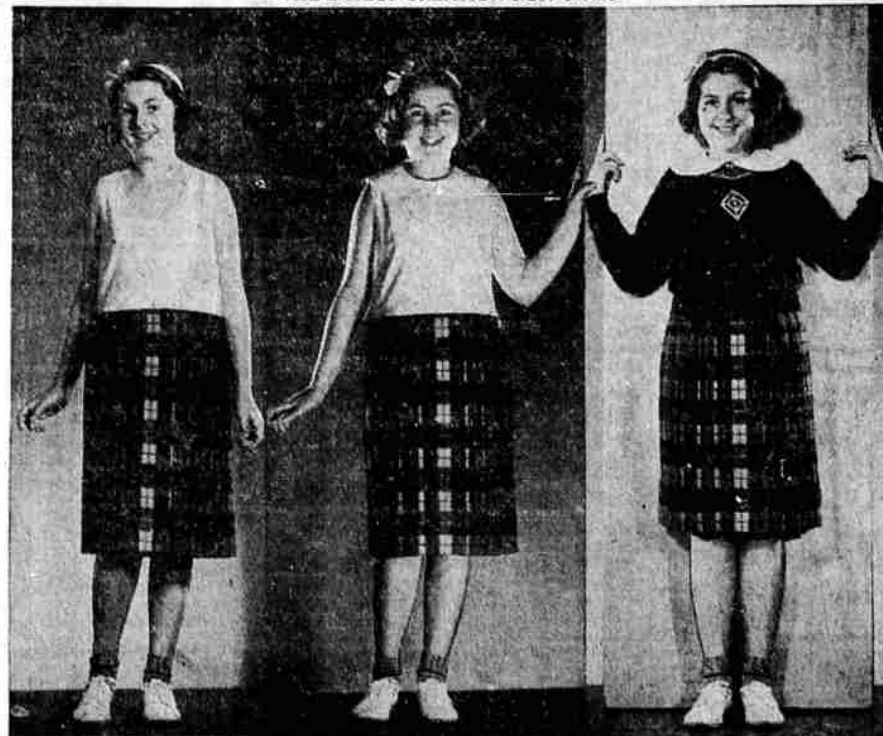
