NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

The Inside Story From The Capital

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WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Another of those White Sulphur Springs business conferences was held in New York last week, very, very secretly. About 150 of the foremost business leaders of the country were there. If you will read the big names at the top of the roster of the National Association of Manufacturers, you will have the rough list.

How such an assemblage could foregather, act and adjourn, without outsiders finding out about it, is the highest possible verification of the fact that nothing sensational was done. In that fact lies the story. The unofficial topic under discussion was the same subject that comes to the fore whenever two business men meet on the street—the new deal and its effect on business. The official topic was taxation, a far safer debating subject. After some sharp expressions of opinion, the conference is supposed to have agreed to start a campaign against increased taxation and free spending.

DIFFICULTY
 At least this is the confidential report on the gathering as received by President Roosevelt. Its general authenticity has been attested elsewhere, although there seems to be some disagreement about whether taxation and spending are bipartisan political issues.

At any rate, no direct action was taken against the new deal. One or two outstanding business men who are democrats are supposed to have attended the gathering. They opposed any step which would have a flavor of political partisanship. The first result has been the publication nationally of a tip that the national business conference committee will start an anti-taxation drive. There will be more of that later.

REASONING
 Leaders of the conference believe they made a wise decision. Nine-tenths of those present were probably against the new deal but they realized that their votes count for little. To make any action effective they had to take a step which would have the broadest popular appeal. The dual subject of taxation and spending seemed to meet the situation.

Furthermore, such a campaign may help to keep down the spending wing of the new deal. Thus, its effect might really turn out to be non-partisan.

POOLING

There are many inside rumors that the Wall Street pool players have donned their swimming suits again. Gossips relate that the securities and exchange commission is checking up on a lot more pool operations than the one it has prosecuted. The fact is the SEC has some tickler tape detectives of whom it is proud. Authorities here like to believe no large operations could escape their notice. They are always checking up. What these detectives seem to have found lately is evidence that there could have been or might have been some pools in certain stocks. But proving it is another matter, especially because the strong price jumps of these stocks could also be logically attributed to particular conditions affecting them.

Neither the gossips nor the detectives can mention any names, nor are they likely to.

TREND

First returns from the Literary Digest poll so far are supposed to show a far stronger trend against the new deal than any of the other indices yet published. The results will be out in about two weeks. Incoming postcard ballots of the next few days may soften the figures before publication. No one knows about that.

New dealers here are grumbling that the poll question was improperly phrased. The question was: "Do you now approve the acts and policies of Mr. Roosevelt's new deal to date?" The question submitted in the 1932 poll was: "Do you on the whole approve the acts and policies of President Roosevelt's first year?"

RECIPROCITY

It did not get out, but both President Roosevelt and Premier King have had men working in Washington on the subject of trade reciprocity since the Canadian elections. These workers brought the agreement much further along than has been publicly supposed.

Incidentally, Mr. Roosevelt decided to "bone up" for his King conference. He had the two government experts who were han-

1935, quoted five days ago by Wall street gambling commissioners at ten to one, skidded to TWO to one tonight as a result of yesterday's elections."

THAT IS TO SAY, hard-headed citizens who aren't greatly interested in political dopesheets but are keenly interested in making a little easy money—or losing it—interpret Tuesday's elections as an indication that people are THINKING DIFFERENTLY and that President Roosevelt's re-election in 1936 is no longer a ten-to-one easy money shot.

HERE is another draw: "Smashing gains of one to more than five points on the

New York stock exchange today (Wednesday, the day after the elections) brought the first three million share day since July, 1931 and sent the industrial average (stock price average) to a new high since 1931."

WHY?
 Well, presumably, hard-headed people with money to invest interpreted Tuesday's elections as a forecast of an impending political change and FELT ENCOURAGED as a result. Feeling encouraged, they spent their money in the belief that business will improve, profits will increase and values will rise.

HERE is some good advice: Never believe a politician when he is talking about politics. Politicians seldom believe what they themselves say about politics, and they NEVER believe what another politician says. The best rule is to look the facts in the face and draw your own conclusions.
