40 Ethiopians Killed In Ambush Attempt

LONDON, Nov. 8. (U.P.)—Forty Ethiopians were killed and 18 captured in an attempt to ambush advancing Askaris (native Italian troops) on wooded slopes of Amba Salana, southeast of Agula, the Exchange Telegraph Agency Thursday. Agula is about 15 miles north-east of Makale.

The Askaris replied to Ethiopian rifle fire with a withering machine gun fire but only routed the Ethiopians after repeated charges with bayonets.

Recipe Round-up Next Will Feature Thanksgiving Dish Formulas; Winners Given

Fruit is one of the few foods that should be included regularly in the daily diet, we are told by nutrition experts. The attractive appearance, fragrance and appealing flavor of fruits tempt even the laziest appetite. Recipes of any kind using fresh fruit must be included in the daily menu. It is needless to mention that the selection of recipes using fruits in season and reasonably priced are the deciding factors. Oregon is a state in which many valuable fruits are produced. What is better than to advocate the use of home state products?

In mentioning a few of the valuable Oregon fruits, we find prunes near the top of the list in supply of iron. Apples furnish vitamins A, B and C; pears being rich in calcium and phosphorus. "Money spent in purchasing a regular supply of fresh fruit is economical health insurance," states one food authority. "The well then to have available a variety of recipes in order to interest your family in one of the biggest health factors—FRUITS."

Recipes best answering prize winning requirements this week are:

Apricot Custard
Mrs. L. L. Hendricks, 313 N. 2nd, Drain: The juice thoroughly from 1 cup of soaked and stewed apricots. Rub them through a sieve. Add 1 cupful of sugar and 1 cupful of orange juice. Cook them until thickened or about 5 minutes. Fold into the whites of 4 eggs stiffly beaten, pour into a greased baking-dish and bake for 20 minutes at 375° F. Serve with cream.

Fruit Salad
Mrs. Lulu Hill, 219 Pine St. 1 cup diced pineapple
1 cup oranges (cut fine)
2 bananas
1 cup apples (chopped)
(Fresh peaches may be substituted)
1 pound marshmallows
Dressing—
Mix and heat in double boiler, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 3 tablespoons pineapple juice and 3 tablespoons orange juice. Then stir in 3 eggs, well beaten, to which has been added 1 cup sugar. Stir constantly and cook until thick. When cold add thick cream, beaten stiff, to which has

been added 1 tablespoon sugar. 25 cent Awards—
Pear Chips
Alfa Gaynor, 1125 Grant Street. 4 pounds sugar
1 cup preserved ginger
Juice of 4 lemons
Grated rind of 2 lemons.
Chop pears very thin. Add other ingredients and let stand over night. (Don't stir mixture, but let the sugar seep down through the pears.) In the morning cook slowly until a golden brown and thick.

Strawberry Pie
Mrs. Jack Evans, 553 Market St. 1 box of well ripened strawberries.
1 cup of sugar
1 package of strawberry jello
1 pint of whipping cream
1 baked pie shell

Dissolve the jello in one cup of water and while it is cooling, mash the berries and the sugar together. Pour the berries and sugar into the jello and stir well. Then pour into the baked pie shell and set away to jell or until you are ready to use it. Then whip the cream and spread over the top. You will find this a great favorite with men, especially.

West Coast Banks Report Extensive Deposit Increases

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8. (U.P.)—Money, jingling in the pockets of several million western investors, clicked a cheering report Thursday when six San Francisco banks announced substantial increases in loans as well as record breaking gains in deposits and resources.

tions stressed the advances in loans, commenting that they indicated both industry as a whole and individuals were regaining confidence.

The bank reports were made in response to Comptroller of the Currency J. P. T. O'Connor's call for a statement of condition, and an additional call by the California state superintendent of banks, Friend W. Richardson.

Financial observers have watched for an upturn in loan figures since the trying days of

the bank moratorium in 1933. It was felt that such a rise would give the most substantial indication of returning confidence and willingness to invest.
