BEARS RESUME HARD PRACTICE

Big Holiday Crowd Will See Contest Armistice Day.

While the Klamath Pelican coaching staff drilled the reserve squad in a long scrimmage on Modoc field Thursday night, out of practice for nearly a week because of snow and cold weather, the Bend team rushed eagerly into training to meet the Pelican invasion Monday afternoon.

The Bears have by no means forgotten last year's game when Don Smith, Klamath halfback, grabbed a Bend Pass and raced the full length of Modoc field for the winning touchdown. The play came within a few seconds of the close of the game.

Armistice Day will be a general holiday in Bend and the season's largest crowd is expected to witness the clash between these old rivals.

The Klamath regulars got a rest Thursday night while Lee Avrit, head coach, and George Mabae, assistant, drove two reserve teams up and down Modoc field.

Most of the regulars came through the hard Modoc contest without serious injury. Mack Timms, star tackle, has an eye injury but it is not expected to keep him from the game.

Business Above 3-Year Average

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 8. (P)—New business totaling 51,952,000 feet, about 48 per cent above the 3-year weekly average for November, was reported today by the Western Pine association for the week ending November 2. Shipments were 56,612,000 feet, and production, 60,162,000 feet. For the corresponding week last year the same 197 mills showed orders of 32,616,000 feet, and production at 32,075,000 feet. For the year to date orders have been 43 per cent above the total for the corresponding period of 1934.

Replying to Madigan's statement that he was "off on the wrong track" in accusing the Gael coach of naming California as object of his accusations, Priestley reaffirmed his belief that the Bears had been made the target of Slip's barbs.

"Madigan is now calling black what he called white," Priestley said.

"I reiterate that St. Mary's was called offside only six times during the entire game. The records show it. Madigan claims the Gael's were penalized seven times for offside during California's touchdown march alone," Priestley said.

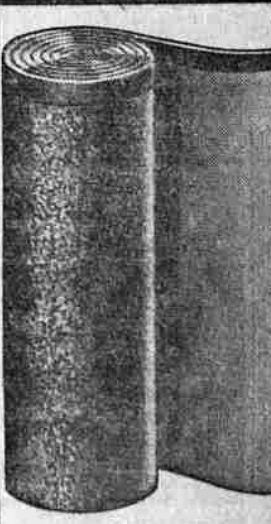
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ECONOMIC CLUB ELECTS OFFICERS

It was suggested that a clock for the girls' room would be a worthy aim, and a program dance seemed to be the most favorable plan for raising money.

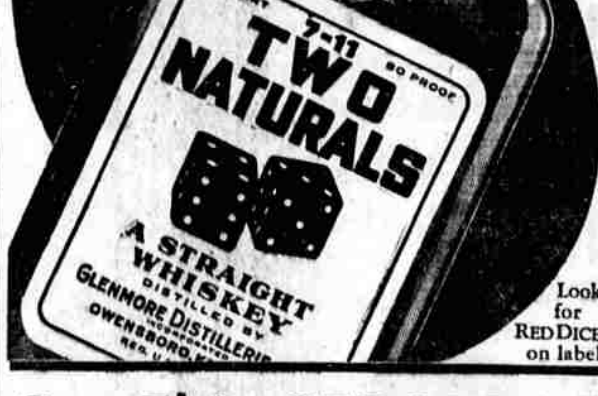
Nan Goeller was elected historian over Mona Dixon. Geanxe Goeller was chosen song leader. Her opponent was Florence Parks. Adele Morton won the
