

California Nears Coast Grid Championship

ONLY STANFORD STANDS IN WAY

Bears Take "Breather" Against Stag's Eleven.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 11. (AP)—With the Pacific Coast conference title and a bid to the New Year's Day Rose Bowl national football battle only a lap away, University of California's Bears turned from the conference championship race Saturday to take on a worthy little rival—College of the Pacific.

The game is one of the so-called "breather" variety, but the undefeated, untied Bears have not forgotten the meeting with Pacific a year ago. It was all California could do to edge out Amos Alonzo Stagg's fiery eleven 7 to 6.

Intersectional contests and three conference games help make up one of the most varied weeks of the gridiron season.

It opens today at Los Angeles with Southern Methodist matching its aerial circus with the ground power and stone-wall defense of the University of California at Los Angeles. In another Armistice Day clash Texas Mines meets Southern Arizona State Teachers at Phoenix.

If successful over the team from Texas, the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins will find waiting the University of Hawaii. The boys from the islands lost to Denver, 14 to 7, last week, but should find the warm weather in the southern California area more to their liking than the chill climate that greeted them in the Rocky mountains. The game will be played Friday.

Saturday's encounters in the coast conference will bring Washington State college and the University of Southern California together at Los Angeles with Stanford meeting Montana at Palo Alto and Idaho taking on Oregon State college on the latter's home field.

University of Oregon meets Portland in a non-conference game while the intersectional flavor next Saturday will be provided by Denver, playing University of San Francisco in the coast city and Michigan State meeting Loyola university of Los Angeles in the latter's stronghold.

Beaten 14 to 0 last week by California, the University of Washington remains idle this Saturday.

Albany College Back in Victory List Once More

(By the Associated Press) After four years of consistent beatings, Albany college's Pirates once again found themselves in the victory column today, but the Albanyites are more convinced than ever that a powerful potential jinx has been chasing them.

The Pirates came up with a 19-0 decision over Pacific college of Newberg, Ore., Friday night, marking the first time an Albany team had left the field on the pleasant end of the score since Thanksgiving Day, 1931.

Whitman college's Missionaries clambered into third place in the northwest circuit standing, jumping two notches from fifth position with a 3-0 decision over the College of Idaho in the week's only conference struggle.

Lindfield and Pacific Lutheran battled to a scoreless draw in a non-conference tussle, and Puget Sound's Loggers, also stepping outside the league, administered a neat 60-0 lacing to the University of British Columbia, Williams-ette and Pacific, originally slated to meet Saturday night, postponed their game for two days and will tangle in an armistice day argument.

Albany will meet Whitman and College of Idaho will battle Lindfield in a pair of conference engagements this week, while Puget Sound will take on the formidable Gonzaga Bulldogs.

Monk Moscrip Kicks Stanford to Grid Victory

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, Los Angeles, Nov. 11. (UP)—A last minute field goal by James (Monk) Moscrip, all-American end from Aldena, Ohio, gave Stanford university a 3 to 0 football victory Saturday over the most courageous eleven University of Southern California has fielded in two lean years on the gridiron.

The big Cardinal machine engineered a 45-yard march to the USC seven yard line to put Moscrip in position for his crucial try at the barrier.

Ducks Celebrate "Civil War" Win Against Beavers

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 11. (AP)—University of Oregon today celebrated its 13-to-0 "civil war" victory over Oregon State college.

The good right toe of Stan Hordan, Oregon State fumbler, and a powerful Oregon offensive that turned "breaks" in to two touchdowns, enabled the Webfoots to beat the dashing Beavers here Saturday.

Second Team Started. Coach Lon Stiner surprised the 15,000 fans by starting an entire second team of "shock troops." The second string remained intact until Oregon recovered Mountain's fumble on the Beaver 45, drove to a touchdown, and a few minutes later recovered another fumble by Mountain on the Oregon State 18.

Lassalle crossed from the one-yard line for Oregon's first touchdown a few minutes after the game started. Soon Oregon recovered a punt fumbled by Mountain, who attempted a shoe-string catch. But the Oregon State varsity dashed into the fray and halted the Webfoots cold on the Beaver 18.

Frank Mielek Stars. Hordan, whose end-around runs helped in both scoring drives, thumped a long punt over Joe Gray's head in the second quarter and Bjork recovered for Oregon on the Beaver 15-yard line. Gray touched the crazy-bouncing ball, but couldn't get hold of it.

Frank Mielek, Oregon fullback, rammed three yards over center to turn the drive into a touchdown. Win Pepper, sub-quarterback, converted a placement for extra point.

The Oregon State varsity fought gallantly, and took daring chances with forward and lateral passes. Many worked, but Oregon's alert defense halted Oregon State drives 33 yards short of the goal once, and 26 yards short again.

Braddock, left, and Carter, guard, of Oregon, distinguished themselves. Joe Gray's 44-yard kick-off return and other brilliant plays, Halfback Tommy Swanson's tackling and blocking, and McClurg's line play stood out for Oregon State.

Twenty College Teams Survive Saturday Games

NEW YORK, Nov. 11. (AP)—Twenty hardy survivors of the numerous early season football upsets stood well against further assaults on their position here Saturday.

The list of undefeated and untied teams lost only two members: Notre Dame, which was upset by Northwestern, and Western Reserve, held to a tie by Ohio Wesleyan.

Texas Christian and California pulled ahead of the pack, each recording its eighth victory of the season.

Dartmouth, piling up a 34-0 score against William and Mary, led the undefeated group in scoring with 248 points in seven games. Others above the 200-point mark were Butler, Spearfish Normal and North Carolina.

California continued to show the best defensive record with only nine points for the opposition. Superior (Wis.) Teachers, and Shippensburg (Pa.) Teachers had allowed only one touchdown each but had played fewer games.

GOLDEN BEARS DOWN HUSKIES

New Wonder Team Produced at Berkeley; Title Eyed.

MEMORIAL STADIUM, Berkeley, Nov. 11. (UP)—University of California's 1938 "wonder team" marched to its 8th straight victory Saturday, making the breaks and passing its way to a 14 to 0 triumph over University of Washington's Huskies.

The Bears settled once for all the question of their offensive power, while demonstrating once more the most powerful defense shown this season on the Pacific coast.

In the second quarter Byron Haines, Washington's great right half back, signaled for a fair catch of a high punt from Floyd Blower's toe. The ball shot through his hands and rolled back to the Huskies' 25, where Bob Herwig, Bear center fell on it.

Pass Scores. Blower, rated the best among California's great host of left halfbacks, pranced and kicked his way to the 10-yard line in three powerful thrusts. Then he faded back and shot a high pass to Quarterback Johnny Mook across the goal line for the first score. Henry Sparks, big San Francisco end, booted a perfect placement for the extra score.

In the third quarter Blower again powered a scoring thrust. Standing on the Washington 32 in punt formation, he hurled a 30-yard pass to Sparks, who went over the goal line standing up. Sparks again kicked the extra point.

Washington outgained California 151 yards to 134 from scrimmage, 197 yards to 181 from scrimmage and passes—but they couldn't put their advances together for real scoring threats.

Fluke Touchdown Gives Victory to Cougar Team

CHICAGO, Nov. 11. (AP)—At the pace the western and eastern divisions of the National Professional Football league is moving along, the fans may have to wait until the final day of the regular season to learn which eleven will meet in the title playoff.

In the eastern section, the defending champion New York Giants, Brooklyn Dodgers and Pittsburgh Pirates were running almost together today, with only one game separating the first and third teams. Only Philadelphia and Boston appear to be out of it.

The situation was even more lively in the west, with each of the four teams still definitely in the running. The league leading Green Bay Packers and second place Chicago Bears were only a half game apart, with the Chicago Cardinals and Detroit Lions one, and one-and-one-half games, respectively, back of the Packers.

Green Bay turned on a sensational drive in the fourth quarter, scoring three touchdowns and kicking the extra point.

Idaho had the advantage in all the statistics except the score. The Vandals made 163 yards from scrimmage against 133 for W.S.C. Idaho completed four passes out of 11 for 33 yards, the Cougars 3 out of 13 for 19 yards.

New York meets the Bears at Chicago Sunday, while the Packers play a return engagement with Detroit at Detroit. The Cardinals invade Brooklyn, and Boston plays at Philadelphia, in the other games.

Webfoots Have Strong Home Grid Record

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 11. (AP)—University of Oregon's record of not losing a football game on its own field for seven years has an excellent chance of continuing through next season.

University of Washington and University of California at Los Angeles travel to meet Oregon, but the games will be in Portland and not on Oregon's Jaxay Hayward Field. Oregon winds up this season with three road games.

Twenty-four home field wins broken only by a 0 to 0 tie in 1931 is the Oregon record.

Incidentally Saturday's win over Oregon State was the fourth during the four years Prink Calhoun has coached Oregon.
