

Bend Bears, Klamath Play to Scoreless Tie

PELICAN PASS THREAT HALTED

Chance to Score Victory Through Safety Barely Missed.

BEND, Ore., Nov. 12. (Special)—A big Armistice day crowd saw Klamath Falls and Bend high schools play a scoreless tie in their annual football hostilities here Monday.

Two Klamath passing attacks were stopped by the Lava Bears at critical moments. Bend left half, broke up the Pelicans march to the goal line in the final minute of play with an interception.

Gun Halts Scoring Chance
At the end of the first half the Pelican squad was deep in Bend territory, advancing there through a series of passes. The gun ending the second period, however, prevented any possibility of a touchdown.

Just a few yards divided the Klamath lads from a 2 to 0 victory. In the first period, McCallum, the Bear quarterback, took the ball behind his own goal line and barely struggled through the Klamath tacklers to safe territory.

Green, Atkins and Rogers were the ball-carrying stars for the invaders. Green got off the longest run of the contest.

Many times, though, the Pelican line permitted Bend players, Powell in particular, to smash through to stop runners behind the line of scrimmage.

Rogers' passing was one of the features of the Pelican attack.

The field was fast and dry. There were few penalties but both teams fumbled frequently.

Webfoots Drill for Pilot Game

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 12. (AP)—The University of Oregon reserves faced the Frosh gridsters in a scrimmage today, as Coach Pink Callison looked for new talent.

The first string rested from its victory over Oregon State, but will engage the Frosh in a scrimmage tomorrow.

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Extension Heads Laud Selection of Game Leader

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 12. (AP)—Oregon State college extension service officials today hailed the appointment of Ida N. Gabrielson to chief of the Bureau of Biological Survey as "the best possible choice."

Gabrielson was named to succeed J. N. (Ding) Darling, retiring cartoonist-biologist.

Gabrielson came to Oregon in 1915 and was until a year ago listed as a member of the State College extension staff, because of his cooperative relationship as head of the rodent and predatory animal control in this state, under the biological survey.

For years Gabrielson was a friend of Darling and acquaintances here said they expected Gabrielson to continue Darling's general policies while bringing to the position a wealth of economic background to add to his technical preparation.

Football Toll Placed at 34

Five Deaths Last Week Increase 1935 Grid Fatalities.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12. (AP)—Football has taken more lives than usual this year.

Five deaths this last week brought the total on the Associated Press' list to 34, the highest since 1931. Forty-nine fatalities that year resulted in a revision of the rules.

Deaths this year already exceeded by nearly 40 per cent the toll of 24 for the entire 1934 season. The latest victims were two sandlot players and one each from college, high school and club rosters.

Sandlot and high school football has accounted for the entire increase over last year's toll.

A composite of records compiled by the Associated Press and Floyd H. Eastwood of New York university, who prepares death and injury statistics for the American Football Coaches association and the rules committee of the N. C. A. A., shows that 13 school boys and four sandlotiers died last year. The totals so far this season are 19 and 9, respectively.

Three fatalities each have been chalked up against college and club gridsters, trailing the 1934 total by one in each instance.

Eleven deaths have been reported from the east, 10 from the midwest, four each from the south and far west, three from the southeast and one each from Canada and Hawaii.

Vancouver Lions Top Hockey Loop

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 12. (AP)—By virtue of their 5-1 win over the Seattle Seahawks last night, the Vancouver Lions find themselves away at the head of the Northwestern Hockey league.

Presenting a nearly identical lineup which gave them a league championship last year, they outskated and outshot their southern opponents.

Vancouver carried most of the play throughout the game, and scored a lone goal in the first period and added a brace in each of the second and third.

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Wildcats Down Henley Eleven; Freshmen Win

The Wildcat and Freshman football teams of Klamath high school scored a double victory in the Armistice day football contests held on Modoc field.

The Wildcats upset Henley, 25 to 0, in a Klamath-Siskiyou conference game. The Freshmen smothered the Bonanza "B" team, 40 to 0, in the opener.

Led by Joe Webber, scoring ace, the Wildcats had little difficulty in subduing the Henley club. Henley threatened in the first period by working the ball to the Wildcat four. The Wildcats intercepted on the fourth down and ran the ball back 95 yards for a touchdown.

Jerry Marcus of New York invades Klamath Falls for the first time to meet Johnny Soos, Indiana. Soos, at a disadvantage through his lack of height, will base his attack upon Sonnenberg rushes and his dangerous pile-driving hold off the ropes.
