SPUD OPERATOR PREDICTS LOSS IN NORTHWEST

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 13. (AP)—E. B. Williams, operator of extensive potato acreage in the Redmond district, said today "the public will find that the potato crop available this season at Pacific northwest points will be much smaller than it has been led to believe."

The Deschutes country shipped 1,000 carloads of potatoes last year, he said. Early prospects this season were for 500 carloads. Williams said the freeze has cut his estimate to 250 cars, with not more than 50 cars of first grade stock unsold.

Williams said the Klamath area shipped 5,500 carloads of potatoes last year and that this year's early estimate was around 2,500 cars. About 1,000 cars moved before the freeze, he said, and after the freeze operators bought around 500 cars at an average of \$1.50 up. The Redmond grower said the general opinion is that not more than 500 cars of first quality potatoes remain in the Klamath sector.

Willie Kamm Mentioned as Mission Chief

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13. (AP)—William Kamm, former Cleveland third baseman, was mentioned prominently as the likely successor to Charles "Gabby" Street, who resigned from the Missions club today to take over management of the St. Paul club in the American association.

Kamm was reported negotiating with Joseph R. Bearwald, president of the Mission club, for a contract as manager.

Street's resignation came as a surprise to Tuesday. It has been indicated he would remain as the Mission manager at least through the 1936 season.

Bearwald was also surprised when informed that Street had signed with the St. Paul nine.

"Although I knew he was negotiating with St. Paul, I had confidently expected him to return here for his third season," Bearwald said. "There were many rumors that Street was dissatisfied during the past season, but they were set at rest one month before the season closed when Street officially announced he would manage the club again next year."

Hunter Killed on Upper Deschutes

BEND, Ore., Nov. 13. (UP)—Clayton Barber, Springfield, Ore., business man and former city councilman there, died at St. Charles hospital Tuesday from injuries suffered while hunting geese on Upper Deschutes river Sunday.

Barber and Forrest Sholes, of Bend, were plunged into the stream when a rubber boat overturned. A shotgun was discharged at the same time, shattering Barber's leg. Sholes had to run a mile to get help from Vance Barber, brother of Clayton. The two carried the injured man to an automobile and did not reach a hospital for several hours.

Portland Pilots Drill Strenuously

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 13. (AP)—The prospect of rain failed today to alter Coach Gene Murphy's plans to shoot a dizzy aerial attack at the University of Oregon football team here Saturday.

Indictments Against Park Officials Killed

PORTLAND, Nov. 13. (AP)—Federal Judge James Alger Fee dismissed indictments pending against A. R. Edwin, former chief clerk at Grater Lake park, and E. C. Solinsky, former park superintendent, Tuesday.

The indictments charged payroll juggling.

Solinsky and Edwin were convicted on prior indictments charging the same offenses, and are serving federal sentences.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13. (AP)—A modest buying spurt in rails, steels and specialties swept the stock market back into an advancing trend during late trading today after an uncertain forenoon session. Gains of 1 to 3 points were well distributed and closing prices were around the best of the day. Sales approximated 1,950,000 shares.

Especially firm spots included Bethlehem Steel, up nearly 3 points on reports of a revival in the company's shipyard activity; International Nickel, which advanced around 2 on prospects of good earnings, and Radio "B," up 3 on further buying in anticipation of dividend action soon.

Others closing 1 to 2 higher included Youngstown Sheet & Tube, U. S. Steel, Johns-Manville, Weston Oil, American Smelting, Continental Corp., "A," American Bank Note, Westinghouse Air Brake, American Can, Chesapeake & Ohio, Union Pacific, Pullman, and Great Western Sugar.

Late news included announcement of an extra dividend of 25 cents on Eastman Kodak, in addition to the regular quarterly payment of \$1.25, and a cleanup of arrears on Container Corp. Preferred amounting to \$19.25.
