

Many Major Football Titles Still Unsettled

UNBEATEN LIST EYES PASADENA

Leading Football Elevens Still Have Tough Games Ahead.

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 (AP)—Battles for sectional football crowns are free-for-all contests in three conferences, while only one major championship has been clinched.

With the season drawing to a close and the time for a Rose Bowl bid approaching, the races in the Southeastern, Southwest and Western conferences are wide open.

Tarheels Still Unbeaten
North Carolina's unbeaten Tarheels seem to have sewed up the Southern conference race, but they still have to get past Duke this week. The situation is much the same on the Pacific coast where the Golden Bears of California are far in the van.

The only Southeastern conference team with a clean league slate is Louisiana State, which may be tripped by Georgia this week.

More will be at stake in the Big Ten than the little brown jug when Michigan faces Minnesota Saturday. Minnesota shares the conference lead with Ohio State and needs only the one game to assure an unbeaten season, as their final game is with Wisconsin.

In the southwest, both Southern Methodist and Texas Christian are unbeaten and untied, and apparently nothing can be done about it until they come together Nov. 30.

California, with four Coast conference victories, has an "off" day against College of the Pacific before meeting Stanford, which now looms as the Bears' most dangerous rival.

Colorado university and Denver probably will settle the Rocky Mountain race on Thanksgiving day.

Portland Grid Champions Will Play Spokane

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 14 (UP)—The Portland Junior chamber of commerce today announced virtual completion of plans for a Thanksgiving day game here between the Portland interscholastic league champion and John Rogers high school of Spokane, undefeated team.

The game, to be played hereafter on a home-and-home basis, would replace the former Thanksgiving contests between the Portland champion and an undefeated upstate eleven for the mythical state championship.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 14 (UP)—Officials of Eugene and Medford high schools, which have undefeated football teams, opened negotiations for a mythical state championship game to be played either at Eugene Thanksgiving day, or Medford December 7.

WINTER SPORTS PLANS FORMING

General Meeting Set for November 22 to Discuss Program.

Plans for an extensive winter sports program in the Klamath Falls and Crater Lake areas will be shaped at a general community meeting called for Friday night, November 22, at the chamber of commerce.

A group of members of the Klamath Winter Sports association met Wednesday night and decided on the larger meeting as a means of getting the program before the entire community. Every effort will be made to bring a large turnout, and it is emphasized that everyone is invited, whether he be expert, or even competent, on skis and toboggans. Men and women both are urged to attend.

"We understand there is some hesitancy about attending our meetings among persons who do little or no skiing," said N. B. Drew, treasurer of the ski club. "Any one who is interested in seeing winter sports developed in the Klamath country, and in seeing Crater Lake made into a year-around park, should attend the November 22 meeting."

There are two proposed winter playgrounds near Klamath Falls. One is at Keno, where winter sports programs were held last year, and where a WPA project is proposed by Carl Cook, city recreation chief. The other is back of Moore park, where there is a long hill. Cook thinks the WPA project might be "transferred to the latter location, if that is believed best."

Weekly winter sports programs are planned for Crater Lake park, where the roads are to be kept open this winter for the first time. Activities will center at government camp. The Crater Lake Ski club, the Klamath club, and the Rogue Snowmen have been invited to cooperate in promoting these park programs.

At the Wednesday night meeting N. B. Drew and O. E. Packett were appointed to represent the Klamath club at inter-club meetings in connection with park sports. It is understood another session will be held at Fort Klamath within a week.

Local service clubs, the junior chamber of commerce, and other organizations are to be asked to send representatives to the November 22 meeting here.

Members of the Klamath winter sports group feel that the opportunities are greater this year than ever before to put across a winter sports program, both near here and in the park.

Two Governors in Trouble Over Football Bets

DES MOINES, Nov. 14 (AP)—Wager of a prize poker on the outcome of a football game had two governors in hot water today.

Virgil Case, secretary of the Des Moines Social Justice club, filed gambling charges against Governor Clyde L. Herring of Iowa. He said he would file charges against both the Iowa executive and Governor Floyd B. Olson, of Minnesota, under a federal statute which prohibits interstate transportation of gambling equipment or the "fruits of gambling."

Intense rivalry between teams from the Universities of Iowa and Minnesota last Saturday was the occasion for much bantering between the governors. Each wagged a pig on the outcome of the game.

Yesterday Governor Herring in a "pig in the parlor" episode at the Minnesota state house paid off his debt.

Today he returns home to face the gambling charge and a warrant for his arrest.

The Iowa governor appeared little concerned over the warrant.

"It is only disgusting to me," he said, "that my first and only venture in the game of chance should bring on a warrant. It looks as if I might have to write out a pardon for myself."

But Case said he saw no humor in the bet, declaring the governor "should set an example for other citizens of Iowa."

Portland Pilots Expect to Score Against Webfoots

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 14 (AP)—Two records will be at stake when the University of Portland meets the powerful University of Oregon football team here Saturday.

Hal Moe, Oregon State backfield coach who scouted Idaho, reported that Coach Ted Bank's team is much stronger than in previous years and has a bewildering offense.

The Beaver squad was in good condition for Saturday's game which will be witnessed by the Oregon State Dads returning for Dad's week-end.

The dads of football men will sit on a special bench with the players during the game while other dads will be in the grandstand in a special section. Someone even suggested that dads be given the same numbers as their football playing sons.

Huskies Discover Backfield Star

SEATTLE, Nov. 14 (AP)—Homer Tipton ended his football masquerade today with prospects of playing at half back for the Washington Huskies against Oregon November 23.

Starting the season as a fourth string half, Tipton, former Wenatchee, Wash., player, moved up several steps until Coach James Phelan finally had him taking the parts of Pelah of Santa Clara, Chuck McBride of Washington State and Paulman of Stanford.

He got his chance against Montana and made the most of it. While the first string stayed clear of scrimmage, Tipton romped through the reserve squads in a style that caught Phelan's eye.
