

STATE OFFICER HEADS RAIDS ON WEDNESDAY

A special state officer who has been investigating conditions in Klamath Falls, accompanied by members of the local police department, staged a raid on "penalty auto" bootleggers Wednesday night, charging three with possession of untaxed liquor.

Those arrested were Joe Valley, Earl Gregerson and Louis Larson. Valley and Larson were fined \$100 each and sentenced to serve 30 days in jail. Gregerson was fined \$50 and given a 30-day sentence.

Valley paid his fine early Thursday and the jail sentence was suspended. Gregerson and Larson remained in jail with their fines unpaid.

Other city court proceedings Thursday were listed by Police Judge Richmond as follows: Andy Anderson and John Dolson, \$10 each or five days in jail on charges of drunkenness, and Jim Sullivan, 30 days in jail on the same count.

Three youthful transients, charged with defrauding an innkeeper, were released from custody as no formal complaints were filed against them. They were alleged to have ordered dinner Wednesday evening at a local cafe, paying the proprietor with thanks only.

The three were requested to leave the city immediately after being released from jail.

Judge Ashurst, in the order, stated she traveled 5368 miles under the subpoena. The second traveling expense warrant ordered was for \$165.23. Total cost to the county of her trip here as a witness was more than \$200.

Duke, on the witness stand in the case, testified Miss Duke owns the cab company he operates and has lent him sums for constructing a building and other purposes. Her equity in the Duke building, he testified, was \$26,000.

SALEM DISCOUNTS NORBLAD'S CHARGES

SALEM, Nov. 14. (AP)—State officials here generally discounted charges by Representative Walter Norblad of Astoria that the state capitol bill passed by the special legislative session was unconstitutional.

Norblad had challenged the legality of the \$2,580,000 capitol measure on the grounds it was not read in sections by the legislature as he said the law required.

Ralph E. Moody, assistant attorney general, said the journal showed the bill as properly passed, and unless there was something in the record to show affirmatively an irregularity, the bill would stand as enrolled.

It was stated that it had not been the custom of the supreme court to go behind the journal record in such cases, and that it had been the custom for years in both houses to read only the title of a bill.

It was further pointed out

that if the capitol bill were unconstitutional, all legislation for the past several sessions would also be illegal.

Road Employees Ask Pay Boosts

County road employees have asked an increase in wages. They filed a petition with the county court, pointing out that since the present wage scale was set, costs of living have increased. The court has the matter under advisement.

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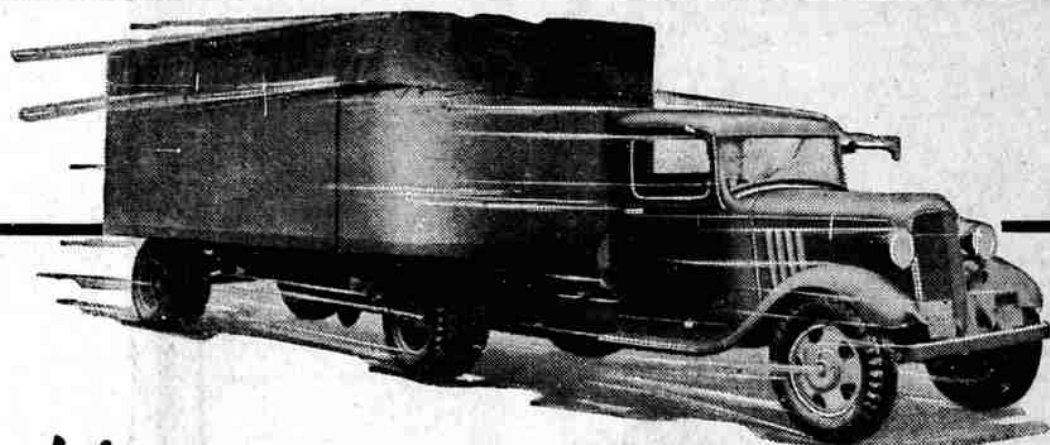


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
