

BOND REFUND PLANNED BY CITY HEADS

Refunding of \$541,000 of city of Klamath Falls improvement bonds, callable in January, is now being planned, according to Mayor Willis E. Mahoney.

About \$310,000 of this amount is drawing 6 per cent interest,

and the remainder 8 1/2 per cent. Mahoney estimates that \$8400 annually will be saved in interest if the city can get the same rate it has received on other improvement bond refunding issues.

The city has already refunded \$785,000, at a saving of approximately \$10,000 a year.

Mahoney was in Portland early in the week, and there conferred with bond houses regarding the forthcoming Klamath issue. On his recent trip east he discussed Klamath securities with officials of New York financial houses.

In connection with the January bonds, it is planned to advertise the bonds for bids this fall, without calling the bonds immediately. That will make it possible for the city to reject unsatisfactory bids and try again before calling the outstanding issue.

STATE OFFICER SPEAKS BEFORE HEALTH GROUP

Responsibilities of the home, the school and the community in building child health were outlined by Sadie Orr Dunbar, secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association Thursday at a meeting of the Klamath county health association. Mrs. Dunbar also spoke later in the afternoon at a meeting of Fairview P-T. A.

Correlating her subject, "Health," with that of education, Mrs. Dunbar quoted Herbert Spencer's definition: "Education is a preparation for complete living," in her second address before the Fairview P-T. A.

Health is definitely the first requirement for a complete life, and every child is entitled to a sound body, according to the speaker. However, it is only by close cooperation of the home, the school, the community as well as all social organizations, that health of childhood may be protected.

Mrs. Dunbar quoted statistics from findings of the White House conference on child health, and especially urged that children be guarded from tuberculosis, which is both preventable and curable, but which has its largest death rate between the ages of 10 and 24 years of age.

Twenty per cent of the patients in the two Oregon tuberculosis hospitals are under 20 years of age, Mrs. Dunbar said.

"With life becoming more strenuous and arduous all the time, it is necessary that the youth of the country be sent out to meet it with sound bodies," declared the speaker, "and this can only be done when all agencies join their efforts and work toward the same goal."

Mrs. Dunbar's messages of Thursday were particularly timely in view of the fact that the annual Christmas seal sale will begin soon, and because of the annual Red Cross membership drive now in progress.

All funds derived from the sale of Christmas seals go toward the fight against tuberculosis.

Mrs. Dunbar was the guest of honor at a luncheon given Thursday noon at the city library by the county health association of which Mrs. Twyla Ferguson is president. In addition to her work as secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, Mrs. Dunbar is vice-president of Women's Federal clubs of the United States and an active worker in educational fields.

Present at the noon covered dish luncheon at the library sponsored by the Health association were: representatives of the city government, the county court, Federation of Business and Professional Women, School District Number One, the Klamath-Lake Medical association, Woman's Library club and P-T. A. groups from the city, Modoc Point and Altamont.

Mrs. Dunbar stated there that the depression had wrought havoc with older members of society, who, while trying to protect their children, had themselves fallen prey to the dread tuberculosis scourge.

She quoted figures showing that tuberculosis took more lives than the highly publicized automobile accident.

In addition to advocating co-operation between home, school and community in building up child health, she recommended in the strongest terms that the tuberculin skin test in the schools and throughout the community should be given the greatest support in order that tuberculosis reactors might be found and treated before the disease gains headway in young and old alike.

Ruble Stabilized At Twenty Cents

MOSCOW, Nov. 15. (UP)—Stabilization of the Russian ruble at five rubles to the dollar was indicated Thursday by a decree of the sovnaikom.

Beginning January 1, 1936, the new rate will be in effect. The sovnaikom consists of 11 peoples' commissars and a chairman.

Interesting Thanksgiving Dishes Suggested in This Week's Recipe Competition

Klamath Union High School Thanksgiving comes but once a year and that's why we like something quite unusual for the annual big dinner. Turkey has long been associated with this holiday. However, among our recipes this week, there is an excellent suggestion for use of roast duck, with apple stuffing. Something such as this is especially appropriate for this community with its plentiful supply of ducks.

Among the necessary accompaniments for the Thanksgiving fowl is cranberry jelly or cranberries in some form. So we have included a good recipe for cranberry salad among our prize recipes for this week.

It seems that we have invariably think of pumpkin pie as the closing item of Thanksgiving dinner. Below is listed a substitute for pie, which really might be very welcome after we have gorged ourselves on turkey and the other tempting goodies. Or perhaps you would like something else—then the cherry spanish cream is my suggestion.

These prize recipes are presented for your consideration soon enough so you may include them in your Thanksgiving plans.

Orange aspic with Turkey
Mrs. E. M. Thomas,

- 2 c. cooked turkey
- 2 c. turkey stock
- 1 tsp. white pepper
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 pint. chopped
- 1 c. cream
- 1 T. granulated gelatin soaked in 4 T. cold water
- 1 small onion, chopped
- Cut turkey in small pieces. Soak gelatin in cold water and dissolve in boiling stock. Cool and add turkey and other ingredients that have been mixed together with cream, (beaten stiff).

Cranberry Salad

- 1 qt. cranberries
- 1 c. water
- 2 c. sugar
- A package lemon gelatin
- 2 c. diced celery
- 1 c. chopped walnuts
- 1 c. boiling water
- Boil the cranberries in the cupful of water for 10 minutes. Add the sugar and allow to boil for 2 minutes longer. Dissolve the gelatin in the 1/2 cup of boiling water. When the gelatin has set, but before it is hard, beat in the cranberries which have been pressed through a colander. Add the diced celery and chopped nuts and allow to harden. Cut in squares and serve on lettuce leaves, garnish with mayonnaise.

Roast Duck with Apple Stuffing

- 1 duck
- 1 c. soft bread crumbs
- 1 c. chopped apples
- 1 c. raisins—cut small
- 1 T. minced onion
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. pepper
- 2 T. melted butter
- 2 slices fat salt pork
- Dress and clean duck. Mix all ingredients for stuffing. Moisten with hot water and place in the duck. Place on a rack in roasting pan with slices of pork on breast. Dredge duck and bottom of pan with flour and place in hot oven. When it has browned add a cup of hot water and baste every 15 minutes. It will take about 2 hours for baking. During last 15 minutes of baking, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Serve on hot platter when done.

Pumpkin Ice Cream

- 1 pint scalded milk
- 7 egg yolks, well beaten
- 1/2 c. sugar
- Pinch of salt
- 1 tsp. butter
- 1 c. whipped cream
- 1 T. vanilla
- 1/2 c. blanched almonds, split
- Pulp of 1 orange, pulled into shreds.
- Pumpkin shell
- Mix egg yolks, sugar and salt.

Pour on the scalded milk and cook in double boiler until it coats the spoon. Add butter, strain and beat until cold. Add the whipped cream and vanilla. Partly freeze, then add the blanched almonds and the orange pulp. Finish freezing and pack in ice and salt for a few hours before serving. Turn ice cream into a scooped out pumpkin and serve on a large platter with a pumpkin vine at the base of pumpkin. (The vine can be made out of paper).

Cherry Spanish Cream

- 1 1/2 T. granulated gelatin
- 1 c. cold water
- 1 c. Borden's condensed milk
- 2 c. hot water
- 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 3 egg whites, stiffly beaten
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. almond extract
- 1 c. syrup from cherries
- 1 c. chopped maraschino cherries.

Soften gelatin in cold water. Dilute the condensed milk with hot water. Bring to a scalding point in a double boiler. Add the softened gelatin to the hot milk. Stir until gelatin is dissolved. Pour slowly over the egg yolks, blending thoroughly. Return to double boiler and cook until slightly thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from fire and add salt and flavoring. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Add maraschino syrup and chill. When mixture begins to thicken, add cherries. Pour into individual molds. When firm serve with whipped cream.

Tear Gas Disperses Georgia Lynch Mob

MOULTREE, Ga., Nov. 15. (UP)—Two companies of Georgia national guardsmen used tear gas and rifle bullets Thursday to disperse a howling mob seeking to take a condemned negro from sheriff's deputies.

Under protection of national guard bayonets, the negro, John Henry Sloan, 21, was rushed to the state penitentiary at Milledgeville where he must die in the electric chair December 10.

Two persons were beaten by gun butts and a third cut by a bayonet as the guardsmen repulsed a rush of a mob of over 2000 enraged South Georgians.

Stage Dedicated to Will Rogers

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Nov. 15. (AP)—The stir of movie making was heard today in a new studio sound stage dedicated to the late Will Rogers.

Three hundred friends of the actor-humorist, including four United States senators and two governors, participated in memorial services on his "home lot" at Twentieth Century-Fox yesterday.

All paid tribute to his life and work. Little Shirley Temple spoke: "I loved him, too."

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KIWANIANS HEAR PENSION SPEAKER

A glowing picture of the Townsend plan and the results promised for it was given to the Kiwanis club Thursday by W. A. Selwood, district organizer and former Klamath Falls resident.

Selwood asserted the plan would take the place of war in reducing the number of candidates for jobs. He denied the transactions tax, basis of financing the Townsend plan, is the same as a sales tax, and insisted the country's business is big enough to yield the billions of dollars necessary to put the revolving system into operation.

The Townsend plan, he declared, will give old people the rest and ease they have earned, and will give young people a better chance.

Selwood presented figures which he said showed the operation of the plan would boost business tremendously in Klamath Falls.

The calves, which were unweaned, were held in Nelson's weaning corral. They had been dehorned but were unbranded.

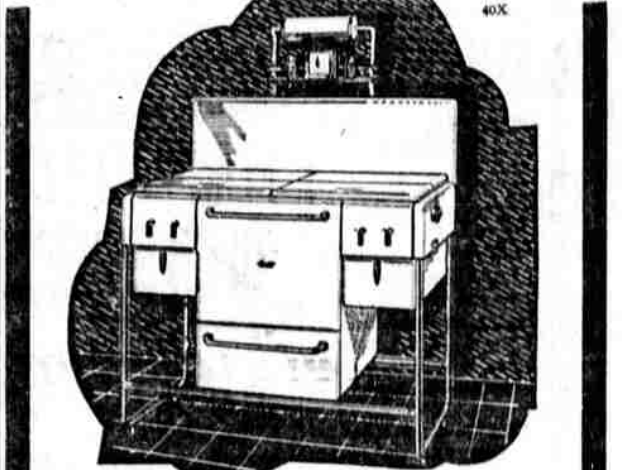
Dorris and Flournoy, becoming suspicious, drove the mother's of the calves into Nelson's corral.
