

Pelicans Open Basketball Training Thursday

FRENCH LOSES ALL REGULARS

New Team Must Be Built For Defense of District Title.

The Klamath Pelicans, defending champions of this basketball district, will start formal practice next Thursday with uncertain hopes of retaining the honors of past seasons.

With the starting regulars of last season missing, Dwight French, head coach, saw little opportunity for a successful defense of the title and another trip to the state tournament at Salem.

Major Rivals Strong. Bend, Klamath's major rival in the district, will offer a powerful combination. Ashland, Grants Pass and Medford, Southern Oregon conference foes, but not members of this district, will also present stronger and more experienced teams than the Pelicans.

Victor Reginato, who has starred all season as end on the Pelican football team, will be the single letterman returning to the basketball lineup. Reginato, however, did not play regularly last year. He is a candidate for either center or forward.

Wildcats Form Nucleus. The bulk of the squad will be made up of young men who played for the Wildcats in the Klamath-Siskiyou conference a year ago.

Among these inexperienced candidates will be Earl Sanders, forward and center; Chester Muselman, forward and center; Earl Atkins, guard; Gall Putman, guard; Bob Durbin, forward; Dominic Giovannini, forward and guard.

Two players who were members of the Pelican squad, but who saw little action, will be Allen Smith and Jerry Muselman.

All "Home-Grown" Boys. French pointed out Saturday that the up-coming team will be a "home-grown" product entirely. Every player on the squad has come up to the high school through the Klamath elementary school ranks, where many of them competed in the grade school leagues.

The majority are sophomores and junior and will have at least two years of competition before graduation.

First games are scheduled the third week in December with Dunsmuir and Mt. Shasta. The opening "big games" here will be against Ashland the first week-end in January.

Four Successive Titles. French has led four successive district championships to the state tournament. Two years ago the team reached the finals, losing the championship to John Warren's Astoria Fishermen.

Because of the recent success of French's teams, there is no doubt but what every school in this district, particularly Bend, is pointing for the Pelican contests.

ESCOBAR WINS BANTAM TITLE

Puerto Rico Fighter Defeats Lou Salica of New York.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16, (AP)—Sixto Escobar of Puerto Rico, 117½ pounds of fighting fury, today was king of the bantam-weight.

The little fellow decisively belted the crown from the cocky brow of Lou Salica of New York in Madison Square Garden last night. For 15 rounds, Escobar, weighing three-quarters of a pound more than his opponent, played a steady left-hand tattoo on the features of the game but on-classed New Yorker intermittently crossing over right-hand smashes which at times had Salica in a bad way.

The Associated Press sheet gave the Puerto Rican 14 of the 15 rounds. A series of right crosses dropped Salica to his haunches in the third round. The New Yorker deemed it best to stay down for a count of nine before rising to meet another storm of leather.

In the fifth, Escobar had his adversary groggy with a series of uppercuts, and in the seventh had cut his nose with a left jab. He repeatedly streamed punches into Salica's face without a return.

Salica gathered all his waning strength in the ninth and tenth rounds, and sailed in with one intent, to land a knockout punch. Escobar finally stalled the outburst with savage body blows that snapped Salica's remaining energies.

The Garden was less than half filled, with an official attendance of 8,077, and gate receipts of \$18,460.49. It was a return match, Salica having been awarded a questionable decision in their last encounter.

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UCLA BRUINS TRIM HAWAII

Los Angeles Scores 19 To 6 Win; Islander Makes Long Run.

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, Los Angeles, Nov. 16 (UP)—A beefy pack of Bruins from the University of California at Los Angeles Friday subdued major league aspirations of the University of Hawaii's team of pint sized footballers, 19 to 6.

But 15,000 fans who came to watch the Bruins gobble their trans-Pacific foes remained to cheer the exploits of a 145-pound package of loaded dynamite from the Hawaiian Islands—Travelling Tommy Kaulukukui.

He contributed the single score for the Roaring Rainbows by jogging 101 yards from behind his goal line to the Bruins home stripe, while teammates howled over scattered foes like duckpins.

He threw passes, caught them, ran ends, twisted through holes in the line and disported himself as few young men have in these parts.

After spotting their bigger opponents to six points in the first quarter, the Roaring Rainbows whistled back into a tie in the second and were knocking on the door of a second touchdown at half time.

Islanders Outweighed. Outweighed and outpowered, they proved a match for the better drilled Bruins through three fourths of the game, but they lost where they were supposed to best—in the air. Only in the dying moments did Hawaii's hardy little band of green sweat-soaked athletes begin to make their passes click, and then the time was too short.

The Bruins scored on a rifle pass, Don Ferguson to Earle Harris, tallied again in the second on another pass, Billy Bob Williams to Fred Funk, and wound up their point making when Chevre rambled 30 yards to a touchdown in the last quarter.

Sandwiched in between the scoring was Mr. Kaulukukui's exploits—a half dozen runs from 10 to 30 yards, with a kicking and passing assignment thrown in.

Schell's kick after the first UCLA score was bad, and it was then Hawaii sprung its stuff.

Mr. Kaulukukui, taking the kickoff one yard behind his goal line, set straight through the charging Bruin linemen, bunted a couple out of his way, shot through into the clear and with Gonzales, his left end, riding off the Bruin safety, rambled 101 yards to the opposite goal.

About Dogs

These Articles Will Be Presented Each Week by the Klamath Kennel Club and Humane Society.

Last week we wrote about the "general appearance" of Boston terriers. This week we will take up the different parts of the body and the ideal proportions.

Skull: Square, flat on top, free from wrinkles; cheeks flat; brow abrupt, stop well defined.

Eyes: Wide apart, large and round, dark in color, expression alert but kind and intelligent. The eyes should be set square in the skull, and the outside corners should be on a line with the cheeks as viewed from the front.

Muzzle: Short, square, wide and deep, and in proportion to skull; free from wrinkles; shorter in length than in width and depth, not exceeding in length approximately one-third of the length of skull; width and depth carried out well to end; the muzzle from stop to end of nose on a line parallel to the top of the skull; nose black and wide, with well defined line between the nostrils. The jaws broad and square, with short, regular teeth. The chops of good depth but not pendulous, completely covering the teeth when mouth is closed.

Ears: Carried erect; small and thin; situated as near the corners of the skull as possible.

Head Faults: Skull "domed" or inclined; furrowed by a medial line; skull too long for breadth; or vice versa; stop too shallow; brow and skull too slanting.

Eyes small or sunken; too prominent; light in color or wall eye; showing too much white or haw.

Muzzle wedge-shaped or lacking depth; down faced; too much cut out below the eyes; pinched or wide nostrils; butterfly nose; protruding teeth; weak lower jaw, showing "turn-up."

Ears poorly carried or in size out of proportion to the head. Boston terrier points will be continued next week.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 16 (AP)—Joe Freck, Jr., sports director for the Portland Junior chamber of commerce, said today the Portland High and the Oregon State High School Athletic associations in October approved out-of-state game for the Portland football champion.

The state association unanimously approved the plan for the Portland champion to play the champion of Seattle or some other northwest city, Freck said.

He said the plan was devised to do away "with the controversial mythical 'state championship' game."

Coast League Delays Naming New President

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 16, (AP)—The Pacific Coast Baseball league will have another month to go without a president.

This was the decision of the board of directors yesterday when they postponed until December 16 the problem of selecting a man to succeed Hyland Bagerly, resigned.

The directorate did, however, make Bill Lane, Hollywood, first vice president; Charles Graham, San Francisco, second vice president; and E. J. Scheffer, Portland, third vice president.

Lane will be empowered to represent the league at the national minor league meeting at Dayton, Ohio, next week in the absence of a president.

The directors also decided yesterday to rescind their rule of 1935, in which they held the power to hire and fire umpires. That responsibility will revert back to the president when he is elected in the December meeting in Oakland.

Dave Fleming, Los Angeles; Graham and Bill Klepper, Seattle, will investigate the various candidates for the presidency, and make a report to the directors at their winter meeting.

Duck Hunters Sight Elks in Klamath Area

KLAMATH AGENCY—While elk hunters are reporting few animals sighted, a group of Klamath county duck hunters saw three elk cross the road in front of their car Sunday when they were returning from a trip on the other side of the lake.

The party, composed of Willis Schull, Johnny Vaughn and Mrs. Vaughn and Albert Christy, report these were fine looking elk. It is said there is a herd of about 500 animals in the mountains on the west side of the lake.

A large elk, which weighed only about 600 pounds because it was thin, was brought into the Agency Thursday by Lew Hammer of Selma. It was bagged in Grant county.

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Tiger Won't Consider Game at Pasadena Tournament

PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. 16, (UP)—The Rose Bowl football game at Pasadena, Calif., is a "commercial classic," and Princeton's undefeated Tigers would not consider a bid to the post-season game even if one were received, the Daily Princetonian, student publication, said in an editorial this week.

The editorial was in response to an open letter written by a New York sports writer suggesting that the Tigers accept the bid if one is offered.

Undergraduates Want Game. Feeling among undergraduates was bitter toward the paper for its ungracious reply to a friendly letter. The students apparently are in sympathy with the editorial, but definitely opposed to the vitriolic manner in which the views were presented.

"The Princeton undergraduates and most of the football players themselves, not to mention the faculty and the administration, are unalterably opposed to considering for a moment an invitation to play in the annual commercial classic, in case it should be received at the end of the season," the editorial said.

Agreement With Yale. It suggested that sports writers forget about Princeton in making their Rose Bowl nominations, and direct their "propaganda" some place else rather than toward "Princeton and the weavers of the Orange and Black where, we assure them, it is wasted."

Professor Burnham N. Dell, chairman of the University council on athletics, refused to comment, other than to point to Princeton's agreement with Yale against post-season games.

"This is not a restriction on freedom of action but an expression of policy based on the promise that athletics, if properly conducted, are an integral part of a well rounded college training," he said.

"Only when it is confined to a normal schedule of games prearranged with natural rivals, can football be kept within its proper grounds. Athletics are beneficial only as long as they occupy a normal and natural place in the whole college educational program."

Cook Reminds Managers of League Meeting

Carl Cook, director of the city recreational project, Saturday reminded basketball team managers of the meeting scheduled for the Elk hotel, Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

At this time the schedule will be adopted and the names of the competing teams announced. All clubs entering the loop will be required to file a list of players and post a \$10 forfeit fee.

Linfield Ends Football Year Without Loss

MEMPHISVILLE, Ore., Nov. 16, (AP)—Linfield college finished its Northwest conference football season undefeated for the first time yesterday with a 14 to 0 victory over College of Idaho.

A scoreless tie with Pacific university and wins over Whitman and College of Idaho completed Linfield's conference games.

A game with Albany college was cancelled, and Linfield does not play with Willamette university, which is undefeated and untied in three conference games. Willamette plays Whitman Thanksgiving Day in the final conference clash.

Williams, Linfield center, caught a knocked-down Linfield pass on the College of Idaho 12-yard line and "raced across for the first touchdown.

Bachelor, Wildcat fullback, smashed over for the second touchdown after Leblanc, Linfield end, intercepted a pass on the Idaho 33-yard line. Harrington converted after both touchdowns.
