

Pelicans Close Season by Defeating Cavemen

12 Points Mar Perfect Record

Only Two Touchdowns Separate Klamath from Undeclared Season.

There were five victories, three defeats and one tie for the Pelicans in the football season closing here last Saturday. It was a nine game schedule—heavy enough for an intercollegiate eleven.

Two wins over Lakeview and Grants Pass, a scoreless tie against Bend, and losses to Medford, Ashland and Eugene—that's the story of the year.

Really, however, it is only one story.

Looking at the season from another angle, the number of points separated the Klamath team from an undefeated record was only 12.

The edge in the Ashland game was a conversion after touchdown; Medford scored five more points than Klamath and Eugene six. The total is 12.

When you consider that the team was edged out of championship class by a mere 12 points you can be thoroughly satisfied in saying it played some fine football.

Every Klamath opponent in the Southern Oregon league, with the possible exception of Medford, had stronger teams this year than in 1934.

Two of Klamath's narrow defeats were against schools still undefeated in the race toward a state championship. These were Eugene and Medford.

Medford still remains the only regularly scheduled team a Les Avrit coached Klamath team has never defeated.

The most outstanding thing of the season was the remarkable spirit of the Pelican players. What they lacked in material, they more than made up in courage and determination. Their strength, too, was cut by injuries and withdrawals.

Under Avrit and George Mabee, assistant coach, the players showed real knowledge of fundamentals. A strong running attack and an effective set of passes, coupled with well-designed defense, made the team a threat at all times.

Financially, perhaps, the season probably was not an outstanding success. This was because of bad weather at almost every home game but Lakeview and Dunsmuir.

Had the weather been normal, the team undoubtedly would have played to sell out crowds at every night game on Modoc field.

Without him, the "Little Irish" lost 7 to 6 to the more powerful Central high school team, Friday night as he deliriously called signals and fought for Coach Bill Coughlin from his bed.

6-0 MARGIN BRINGS WIN

Klamath Stops Last Minute Rush by Grants Pass Machine.

The Klamath Pelicans, halting a last quarter rush upon their goal line, closed the 1935 season on Modoc field Saturday afternoon with a 6 to 0 victory over a heavy, almost ponderous team from Grants Pass.

Yet big and slow as they were, the Cavemen came mightily close to either victory or a tie in the dying moments of the battle.

Pass Brings Score

While the Pelicans piled up yardage, upon yardage with a fast running and passing attack, they succeeded only in shooting over a pass, Jim Rogers to Pete Green, in the second period to score the single touchdown of the game.

Fighting to maintain this narrow margin, Klamath had to muster all its defensive forces to end the season with a victory.

Suddenly coming to life in the fourth period, the big Cavemen marched to within a foot of a touchdown. It all started when a combination lateral-forward pass sent Joe, Grants Pass end, racing down the side lines from midfield to the Klamath 20.

On three plays Grants Pass made a first down within the Klamath five.

Bennett Stopped at Line

Then the bulky Cavemen started riling passes. The first two were knocked down at the goal line. Bennett, backfield ace, grabbed the third and then dropped it. He snapped in the fourth almost on top of the goal, but he was stopped cold by the Pelican defenders.

Victor Restano, whose punting was one of the highlights of the contest, kicked out to safety. The Pelicans were in possession of the ball when the gun sounded.

Throwing passes with considerable daring, Klamath dominated the entire first half.

Early in the second period Green dashed around the right flank of the Grants Pass line to the 40. It was a 20 yard run. Rogers, after two plays failed, heaved a pass to Reginald, sending the Pelicans down to the Grants Pass 19, and a first down.

A line play was stopped for no gain and then Rogers lofted a carefully timed, accurately placed throw that Green took on the run and crossed the goal.

The kick for the extra point went sailing to one side.

The Pelicans started the game with a spirited march carrying them deep into Grants Pass territory. Three times they lost the ball within the 20 yard line in those early minutes.

The Klamath attack was started almost entirely from short punt formation with Rogers packing the ball. The strategy had the Cavemen guessing whether the play was to be a quick kick, a pass or a run.

The Klamath line, topped by the fine offensive and defensive work of Mack Timms and Carl Van Emon, functioned effectively against their heavy opponents. Rogers was a stand out in passing, running and defending.

FOOTBALL ROUNDUP

MULTNOMAH STADIUM, Portland, Ore., Nov. 18. (UP)—Coach Frank Callison sent in his first strong Oregon team in the third period Saturday and Frank Michek and Bob Braddock carried the ball 55 yards in 12 plays to score and defeat a scrappy Portland university team 6 to 0.

Oregon's reserves were unable to score against the Pilots in the first, second and fourth periods. Besides demonstrating the authentic power of Oregon's best eleven, the game revealed weakness of Webeft reserves.

Determined to save his regulars for the important Washington game next Saturday, Coach Prince G. Callison fidgeted on the bench as Portland outshone and outgained the Oregon seconds, especially in the line.

TROJANS FINALLY WIN A GAME

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, Los Angeles, Nov. 18. (UP)—The University of Southern California, kicked around all season, staged a dramatic last quarter comeback here Saturday to defeat Washington State college 20 to 10, before a crowd of 35,000.

Two mighty drives engineered by David Davis, a 188-pound quarter back, coupled with the ability of Gene Hibbs, end, brother of Jesse Hibbs, U.S.C. all-American tackle several seasons back, gave the Trojans their win.

Previous to the Trojan hot streak, the Cougars of Washington State had amassed a 10-point lead. A touchdown came to them in the second quarter and a field goal in the third. The game appeared safely in the State victory bag when the fourth quarter started.

CALIFORNIA OUTCLASSES STAGGS ELEVEN

Only two games were left today on the Northwest conference grid schedule, but Willamette University's long-losing Bearcats had a dramatic comeback here Saturday to jump before they can carry the circuit crown home with them.

On top of the heap with three victories and no defeats, and with a record of 13 consecutive conference wins behind them, the Bearcats must conquer Whitman's Missionaries at Walla Walla, November 30 or find themselves dumped out of the championship picture.

Comparative scores of earlier contests give Willamette an edge, the league leaders having hung a 47-6 pasting on College of Idaho, as outfit the Missionaries barely got past 30-0. However, Whitman bobbed up with one very neat job of "giant killing" in its 7-0 decision over the University of Idaho, and the Bearcats are preparing for the contest convinced their season finale will be no tea-party.

The Missionaries dynamited Albany college's hopes of getting into the winning habit Saturday, cutting loose with a wide-open offense that netted three touchdowns, two of which came on long dashes following forward passes.

The score was 20-0. Linfield chalked up a decision over College of Idaho, Friday night, in another conference tussle, winning 14-0 and holding the upper hand all the way.

At Puyallup Saturday, College of Puget Sound took on the Gonzaga Bulldogs and went down 50-12. The Loggers turned in a pair of thrilling touchdowns plays, but couldn't cope with the heavy-scoring Gonzaga machine.

Besides the Willamette-Whitman fireworks, only one conference game remains on the schedule, Pacific entertaining Puget Sound Saturday. Linfield, however, has one more non-conference affair booked, meeting Monmouth Normal, Friday.

BEARS, CARDS IN BIG CLASH

California Victory Would Win Title; Oregon Meets Tusks.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 18. (AP)—In the huge eastern Stanford bowl next Saturday 90,000 fans will mass for the west coast's greatest gridiron struggle of the season to see whether University of California's undefeated eleven charges into the Rose Bowl or the Pacific coast conference race scrambles into a three-way clinch.

Winner of nine games, four of them within the conference, the mightiest California team in more than a decade faces its sternest test of the season. Stanford, the west's choice in the annual New Year's day classic at Pasadena the last two years, has lost one game this year, to the University of California at Los Angeles.

Bears Have Best Chance

U. C. L. A. likewise has one defeat in its record, inflicted by its "Big Brother," the University of California at Berkeley, therefore if Stanford wins this week-end, the conference will have three teams each listing one defeat.

For California and Stanford the regular season winds up with their "big game." U. C. L. A. has only the many times beaten Idaho team to meet. If Stanford defeats California, and U. C. L. A. beats Idaho, each of the three teams would have four wins and one defeat.

A win or a tie Saturday will definitely make the Bears first choice for the Rose Bowl.

Grayson Key To Attack

California's stone wall defense and many interchangeable back field stars probably will make it a slight favorite over Stanford, whose attack is built around one of the finest fullbacks the west has ever seen, Bobby Grayson.

While California and Stanford are fighting it out for top honors, the Universities of Oregon and Washington will meet in their annual game. Each team has lost two games, Oregon to California and U.C.L.A. and Washington to California and Stanford. Washington will probably line up as a slight favorite.

Oregon State college and University of Montana will meet in another coast conference contest with the former expected to win. U.C.L.A. meets Loyola and Idaho takes on Nevada in non-conference affairs.

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Chico Defeats Oregon Normal

*CHICO, Cal., Nov. 18. (UP)—Chico State college defeated Southern Oregon Normal, 21-7, Saturday for the Californians' first victory in five years over their rivals from the neighboring state.

The first half was scoreless, but soon after the third quarter began Chico backs began to put on power and they reached the goal line on a dash by Lambrecht before the period ended.

In the fourth quarter Kreigh found a hole in the center of the Southern Oregon line for another score and Colfax smashed over for the third touchdown.

Oregon's score came on a 96-yard sprint by Galiasky, visiting safety man, in carrying back a punt in the final period.

Jinx Prevails; Broncos Beaten by Gaels, 10-0

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 18. (AP)—The 12-year-old "jinx" blamed by Santa Clara for their inability to win a football game from the Galloping Gaels of St. Mary's since 1923, still held good today as a result of St. Mary's 10-0 victory over Santa Clara here yesterday.

A field goal from the toe of big Herman Meister, left tackle, in the second quarter and a fourth quarter touchdown and conversion gave the Gaels the game.

Herb Schreiber, St. Mary's left half, climaxed a 45-yard drive down the field just before the end of the contest by going over for a touchdown from the two-yard line. Meister's dependable toe added the extra point.

St. Mary's victory over its traditional foe marked the twelfth time since 1923 that Santa Clara has gone down to defeat at the hands of the Gaels. The 1923 game ended in a 6-6 tie. Santa Clara won the 1923 fracas 10 to 9.

Stone wall defense made the first half of yesterday's game a colorless affair, with Kelly of Santa Clara and Fiese of St. Mary's engaging in a kicking duel on fairly even terms.

Meister's place kick from the 24-yard line, a beautiful boot that sailed squarely between the uprights, gave St. Mary's three points that looked very big as the first half ended.

Santa Clara threatened in the third quarter when Carlson shot a pass to Smith that was good for 40 yards, but the clock bogged down. The Gaels' 15-yard line. Carlson tried a place kick, but it went wild.

Play in the final quarter was in Santa Clara territory throughout.

The Beavers scored in the second and third periods and stopped a desperate Vandal passing attack.

Joe Gray, the acrobatic red-haired Oregon State left half ran 69 yards for the second Oregon State score.

The field was muddy. A small crowd of 3500 witnessed the game.

Idaho never penetrated inside Oregon State's 30-yard line but Honsawetz's passes were a constant threat. The Vandals completed 11 out of 19 passes for a total of 97 yards.

Blunder Leads to Score

The first Beaver score followed a march from Oregon State's 36 to Idaho's 30 where Oregon State was forced to kick. War and Maxon became mired up as to who should catch the punt and the ball rolled over the goal line where Woody Joslin, last survivor of the famous 1933 "iron man" team, fell on it for a touchdown. Swanson converted.

The second score came in the third period when Joe Gray caught an Idaho punt on his own 31 and raced through the whole Idaho team for a touchdown. Gray has made at least one long run in each game this year. Swanson's conversion kick was wide.

Statens Outgait Idaho

Idaho outplayed the Beavers in the fourth period with L. Rich ripping big gains through the line and Honsawetz passing to Walker for long gains.

Each team made five first downs from scrimmage and three from passes. Idaho made one on a penalty. Oregon State made 155 yards from scrimmage against 119 for Idaho, but completed only four out of 12 passes for 43 yards.
