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Stock Market Quotations
NEW YORK, Nov. 18, (U. S. D. A.)—Bullish forces were again at the helm during most of today's stock market, although profit takers finally succeeded in rocking the boat.
Just how much influence publication of the new trade treaty with Canada had on prices was debatable. A little purchasing and selling here and there, it was thought, may have reflected trading opinions of the document.
The close was somewhat irregular. The ticker tape was occasionally behind, and transfers approximated 3,300,000 shares.
Many new four-year highs were established in the upward movements. Rail equipment, merchandising, copper and utility issues were the best. The alcoholists lagged and the motors were backward.
The steels were not responsive to the estimate of the American Iron and Steel Institute that mill operations currently were at the rate of 52.7 per cent capacity, a new production peak since the week of June 18, last year. The gain over last week was 1.1 points. Output a year ago stood at 27.6 per cent of capacity.
Among shares advances of fractions to two points or more were shown by U. S. Smelting, Pullman, American Locomotive, Westinghouse Air Brake, Budd Mfg. preferred, Baldwin preferred, American Woolen preferred, Sears Roebuck, Caterpillar Tractor, Kennecott, Anaconda, Cerro de Pasco, Consolidated Gas, Public Service of New Jersey, Great Northern, Louisville & Nashville and Commercial Investment Trust.

Rather weak tone was suggested generally for eggs here although official prices were unchanged for the day.
