## Chicago Bears Lead in "Pro" Grid League

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. (UP)—The Chicago Bears continue to lead offensive play in the National Professional Football league, according to statistics released Monday.

In eight games the Bears gained 2447 yards and scored 150 points. The Green Bay Packers are second in yards gained with 2040, and the Detroit Lions are runners-up in points scored with 129.

Chicago is rated the strongest team defensively. The opposition has gained only 1062 yards and scored 56 points against the Cardinals.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. (AP)—Sam Langford, one of the greatest of negro fighters, lay critically injured in a hospital today.

Witnesses said last night that Sam probably didn't notice that the light was red when he shuffled into the street and was struck by a taxi cab. Benefit fights had provided money for a series of operations on his one eye, the last in April, 1935, but it was said that at best Langford had only 50 per cent vision in that eye.

## New Rules Given For California's Hunting Season

The roar of scatterguns will be heard over Tule lake Wednesday morning as the 1935 migratory fowl hunting season opens in that zone. The season closed north of the line at 4 p. m. Tuesday.

Many hunters have been shooting pheasants in California, waiting for the opening of the duck season, according to C. G. Fairchild, game management agent for the biological survey. The pheasant season closes in California Wednesday night.

Hunters are allowed ten ducks a day in California, and four geese or brants. It is against the law to kill certain species of birds, as is the case in other zones.

Hunters are permitted to take ten ducks over the state line in one calendar week. They can kill 30 ducks a week, and the bag limit of geese is eight in a week, all varieties.

Migratory bird stamps are required of all who hunt fowl. The non-resident hunting license in California is purchased for \$10.

General rules regarding size of gun, etc., hold in the California zone as they do in the Oregon section.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 19. (AP)—California's one month open season on ducks and geese opens at 7 a. m. tomorrow with some new rules, established as a conservation measure by the United States bureau of biological survey, in force.

Important rules include: Hunting only between 7 a. m. and 4 p. m.

No shooting from scullboats, blinds or other boats which are more than 100 feet from shore.

Pump guns and automatics must not contain more than three shells at a time.

Duck limit is 10 per day, with not more than 10 in any person's possession at any time. Limit on geese is four per day with not more than four in any person's possession at any time.

## Idaho Vandals To Meet Nevada

MOSCOW, Idaho, Nov. 19. (AP)—Idaho's yardage-grabbing "Midfield Marvells" will train their focus on Boise and the goal line this week.

The Vandals will meet the University of Nevada at Boise Saturday in the state capital's first major football game since 1932.

Coach Ted Bank's team, a ground gainer in all its games but a scorer in few, will be seeking desperately to score its second victory of the season. The team came out of the Oregon State game in condition to throw virtually its full strength against the Nevadans.

The Linfield Wildcats, with one of their strongest teams in history, defeated Southern Oregon Normal 27 to 0. The Sons gave Monmouth Normal a close game.

## TRIPLE EVENT SET TONIGHT

Three 60-Minute Matches Scheduled for Armory Ring at 8:30.

A triple wrestling main event featuring the Australian round system in the two opening matches comes to the Klamath armory tonight.

Pete Belcastro, junior heavyweight champion of the coast, Toots Estes, one of the claimants for the heavyweight title of Hawaii, Les Wolfe and Johnny Soos are four favorites who will take top positions. Two less known grapplers, Jerry Marcus of New York and Frankie Peck of San Francisco, will clash in the first match at 8:30 o'clock.

Belcastro, his coast title not at stake, tackles Estes for the second time. Not long ago the young grappler from the islands upset the champion in a main event at Medford.

This leading bout will be wrestled over the one-hour time limit to the best two out of three falls.

Belcastro, because of the improvement shown since returning from a tour of Mexico and because of the effectiveness of his dropkicks, rates a slight edge over his fast, scientific opponent.

The Australian round plan will be introduced to Klamath Falls in the two opening matches. The hour period will be divided into six ten-minute rounds with a minute rest between. A fall will be the end of the round. The match will be over as soon as one grappler wins two falls.

Popular Les Wolfe, rangy Texan with the sensational figure four scissors, was a favorite to win from stocky Johnny Soos of Indiana. Wolfe, a consistent winner here in the past, returns to this section of the west after several months of grappling in Salt Lake City.

Last week Soos lost to Marcus of New York on a foul. Usually sportsmanlike in the ring, Soos was disqualified for roughing.

Peck is a newcomer to Klamath Falls. He was substituted for Dick Craddock, also of San Francisco, Tuesday morning when Mack Lillard, promoter, was informed Craddock could not appear. Peck is a former prize fighter but has been competing as a wrestler for the last four years.

## OREGON COUNTS ON LONG PUNTS

Stan Riordan's Toe Will be Offensive Threat Against Huskies.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 19. (AP)—The good right toe of Stan Riordan, University of Oregon's great punting end, is the ace in the hole which the Webfoots hoped today would gain long yardage against University of Washington in Saturday's game at Seattle.

Oregon's pass defense against Oregon State was strong, and the Oregon line yielded little.

Riordan averaged better than 42 yards on his punts against the Beavers, and placed two out of bounds within their one-yard line.

Coach Prink Callison gave Oregon secret practices this week.

"Washington has stronger first string lineup than Oregon," Callison said. "Nevertheless we don't care for the role of underdogs and aren't starting work for next Saturday's game at Seattle with that in mind."

SEATTLE, Nov. 19. (AP)—Coach James Phelan centered his attention today on perfecting the running and passing attack of his Washington Huskies who meet the Oregon Webfoots Saturday.

Back from the Washington State-University of Southern California game, Phelan had his men gambling a little more than usual with laterals and forwards, a hint the Huskies make take to the air.

## Dispute Rages Over Army-Irish Football Battle

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. (AP)—Motion pictures the Notre Dame-Army football game stirred anger today the argument as to whether the penalty for interference which gave Notre Dame its chance to tie the score was justified.

Notre Dame was given the ball on the Army two-yard line after attempting a pass, and with one minute to play plunged over to tie the score at 6-6.

The pictures showed both Walter Grove, Army halfback, and Bill Grohs, quarter, close by Wayne Miller, Notre Dame's intended receiver. They indicated, however, that Grove did not touch Miller in any way until after the ball had grounded.

It consists of part of the Greek manuscript of the gospel of St. John written 200 years before the codex sinaiticus.

## COAST LEADERS MAP STRATEGY

California, Stanford Deep in Training for "Big Game."

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 19. (AP)—His tentative lineup named for Saturday's all-important encounter at Stanford, Coach Stubb (Fear 'Em) Allison sent his University of California football team deeper into new strategies today as they mapped preparations for their first game this year against the Warner system.

Allison, whose undefeated Bears are knocking at the Pacific coast championship portals for the first time in a decade, planned a hard scrimmage this afternoon. He said he was reconstructing California's defense to meet the varied offense Stanford is working up for the game.

Sparks to Start  
Allison announced Henry Sparks, who was moved from left end to the right after injuries to Jack Brittingham, Jack Hay and Jack Callaghan left the latter spot almost bare, will be at right end again.

Jack Howard, sophomore fullback who did big things against College of Pacific, earned his starting spurs at that spot.

The others are: Bob Brittingham at end, Larry Lutz and Ray Nordstrom at tackles, Dave Anderson and Conrad Tenney at guards, Bob Herwig at center, John Meek at quarter, Don Fowler at left half and Sam Chapman at right half.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY Cal., Nov. 19. (AP)—The possibility existed today that a sophomore, Bill Paulman, from Oxnard, Calif., might be a key man in Stanford's attack against the University of California football team here Saturday.

The quiet-mannered youngster, who stepped into fast competition and has upheld his end successfully, has not been given heavy burdens this season by Coach "Tiny" Thornhill. Despite being an accurate passer, his only added chore has been the punting.

Hamilton Improves  
Thornhill now believes Paulman is ready—seasoned enough to blossom out. The husky quarterback gained great fame as a passer in his freshman year, completing 16 passes in a row at one stage, but he has done comparatively little toasting in the present campaign.

With the addition of more passing plays for Saturday's Pacific Coast conference championship contest, some critics believed that Paulman would be on the delivering end, thus helping Fullback Bobby Grayson and forcing the Bears to watch a greater variety of threats.

"Bones" Hamilton, the injured backfield man who returned to competition last week-end, continued to improve in his workouts and probably will be at right half. The left halfback spot remained undecided today, with Jimmy Coffis, another sophomore, appearing to be the man.

## Young Portland Football Player Critically Ill

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 19. (AP)—Buck O'Halloran, 17, Jefferson high school football halfback, was near death today from pneumonia.

He became seriously ill over the weekend and went to a hospital Sunday. He was placed under an oxygen tent.

His condition today was "unchanged," or possibly slightly weaker, St. Vincent's hospital reported.

Eric Waldorf, Jefferson coach, said O'Halloran had complained of head colds for several years and missed practices frequently this season.

The youth played last Monday against Washington and then was out of school and practice until Friday. He injured his hip in practice and was dismissed immediately and told to go to a doctor, Waldorf said.

Saturday morning he complained of nausea, and a doctor found he was running a temperature of 101 plus.

## Baylor's Singing Halfback to Test Southern Eleven

WACO, Texas, Nov. 19. (AP)—Lloyd Russell, the "Singing Halfback" hero of Baylor's 13-6 upset of Southern Methodist last year will try to repeat the performance at Dallas, Saturday, against the unbeaten Mustangs.

Russell's resonant tenor and off-tackle smashes completely baffled the Mustangs last year. He took the ball-carrying job into his own hands and sang as he ran.

"Did You Ever See a Dream Walking?" he caroled to enraged would-be tacklers whose hands he eluded as if he were himself a sprite.

He hasn't done so much singing this season, having been shifted to quarterback where his melodious voice calls signals, but he's the main cog in the Bruins' ground-grinding machine.

## ROSE BOWL VOTE DUE ON NOV. 29

Outcome of Stanford, California Game Awaited.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 19. (AP)—While the annual grid classic between Stanford and California at Palo Alto Saturday in all probability will decide the question of which team will represent the west in the Rose Bowl game the official announcement will not come until November 29.

This was the statement from the office of Prof. Hugh C. Willett, chairman of the Pacific Coast conference today.

"Voting by members of the Pacific Coast conference on the west's representative in the New Year's Day game," said Prof. Willett, faculty representative of southern California, "will not take place until Thanksgiving Day and the announcement of the results will be made here the following day, November 29."

"In case no school receives a majority of six or more votes, another call will be made. If after three ballots have been taken no majority exists, then the selection will be made by lot between the leaders."

Prof. Willett admitted that if California won from Stanford Saturday to keep its record perfect, the vote would be a matter of formality.

"If Stanford wins, then the vote might give California, Stanford or U. C. L. A. the honor, depending entirely on how the respective members look upon the defeats suffered by each of the three schools and their comparative records."

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
