Four Suits Filed Against Coal Act

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Nov. 20, (UP)—Four suits attacking constitutionality of the Guffey coal control act were filed in federal court here late Tuesday.

The bills were filed simultaneously by four major West Virginia bituminous coal producing companies. Each complaint is similar to the Carter Coal company's test case which will be argued in District of Columbia supreme court tomorrow.

Crash Injuries Fatal to Pilot

SEATTLE, Nov. 20, (UP)—Leaile Tower, chief test pilot for the Boeing Aircraft company, died Tuesday at Dayton, Ohio, from injuries suffered in the crash of the huge Boeing bomber, officials of the firm were informed.

Tower, veteran pilot who took the "flying fortress" east, was burned critically when it crashed to the ground during U. S. army tests. An army airman also was killed in the crash.

GRAPPLERS END CLASH IN DRAW

Estes, Belcastro Crash in Head-on Drive; Wolfe Winner.

A head-on collision between two charging young wrestlers brought an unexpected end to last night's armory main event between Pete Belcastro of Klamath Falls and Toots Estes of the Hawaiian Islands.

Launching similar attacks exactly the same time, the grapplers crashed in a double Sonnenberg rush. Both fell to the floor and were counted out by Ray Frisbie, the referee.

Estes Still One Up

Thus the second meeting of Belcastro and Estes ended in a draw. The result left the visitor from the islands one up. Recently he scored a main event victory over his opponent in Medford.

A new hold which Belcastro claims he learned while on his wrestling tour to Mexico City accounted for the first fall in 19 minutes and five seconds. It was a Mexican deathlock.

The long opening fall saw both men working at top speed to gain the advantage. Belcastro missed a drop kick, landed on his head and then recovered sufficiently to toss Estes from the ring. Estes was groggy when he climbed back through the ropes and fell a comparatively easy victim to the Mexican twister.

Wolfe Beats Soos

Estes squared the match by converting one of Belcastro's Boston crab holds into a double arm lock and body press in three minutes.

Given little time to recover from Les Wolfe's figure four scissors between rounds, Johnny Soos of Indiana lost to the Texan when he was unable to answer the bell for the fourth period.

The bell saved Soos from losing a fall in the second round. The end of the ten minutes saw him securely tied up in a scissors. Wolfe applied another scissor hold at the start of the third and won the round in two minutes and 15 seconds.

Soos couldn't come back for the fourth.

Peck Stops Marcus

Frankie Peck of San Francisco took the first match by downing Jerry Marcus of New York in straight falls.

The first came in the second round with head scissors in 35 seconds. The final fall was gained in the third with a body slam in five minutes and 53 seconds.

All three matches were well wrestled.

Dale Laxelle, Oregon's best passer, will start against the Huskies. While mystery surrounded a score of new plays given to the Webfoots the past week, it was conjectured they included new pass plays to spread the Husky defense for Mike and Bradlock's line smashes.

Gene Shields, Oregon line coach and scout, said Washington was much better than last year's team, but "Oregon can win if our ball carriers perform up to par and the line functions as well as it did against Oregon State."

Cochran Wins Three Cushion Billiard Title

CHICAGO, Nov. 20, (AP)—Walker Cochran of San Francisco, again ruled as king of the world's three cushion billiard players today.

Willie Hoppe, of New York for nearly two generations the idol of American billiard fans, failed to realize his long ambition—to annex the three cushion title along with other billiard championships crowns he has won.

In the title game last night, the 37-year-old Cochran defeated Hoppe 50 to 46 in a game that went 45 innings. In a dramatic finish Cochran went to the table in the 45th inning trailing 43 to 46. The San Francisco player, calling on all his billiard wizardry, cut loose with an unfinished run of seven, that returned him to the championship he lost to Johnny Layton, of Sedalia, Mo., a year ago. His run of seven was the high run of the match. Hoppe's best effort was six.

Hoppe, one time boy wizard of the cue, played in hard luck. On difficult leaves he was in rare form, but missed his opportunities on easy shots. He miscued in the 41st inning, and a few minutes later kissed off a comparatively easy shot, giving the San Francisco player the break that brought him victory.

President Foresees Benefits to Lumber

PORTLAND, Nov. 20, (UP)—The lumber industry will benefit along with other American activities rather than suffer from tariff and excise cuts on Canadian fir and hemlock, President Roosevelt told Marshall N. Dana, of Portland, according to a dispatch to the Journal Tuesday from its Washington correspondent.

Mr. Dana, associate editor of the Journal, said the president told him in substance that he believes the lumber price level will be maintained by steady orders, and that because of the general business benefits from the treaty and the upward movement in building, no detrimental effects will be felt by the lumber industry.

CARD PLAYERS UP FOR SALE

Baseball Deals Pending At Dayton Minor League Meet.

DAYTON, O., Nov. 20, (AP)—Baseball trade winds blew today as the minor league meeting opened—but few deals were consummated.

Branch Rickey, vice president of the St. Louis Cardinals, was very much in the spotlight with his announcement that 30 of the 38 Red Birds were on the auction block.

Only "Dizzy" and Paul Dean, and Jesse Haines, hurlers; outfielders Joe Medwick and Terry Moore; infielders Leo Durocher and James (Ripper) Collins, and Manager Frank Frisch are sure of Cardinal berths in 1936, Rickey said.

Among the reports was one that Billy Evans, former general manager of the Cleveland Indians, would take over the presidency of the Detroit Tigers. The world champions passed under control of Walter O. Briggs. Tuesday, and Briggs announced that he has neither health nor time to assume the club presidency.

Bishop to Portland

Other deals resulted in managerial changes. Max Bishop of the Boston Red Sox dropped out of the majors to take over the reins of the Portland club in the Pacific Coast league. San Antonio of the Texas loop signed Bob Coleman, a former manager there, as the 1936 skipper.

Among rumored major league deals was one which would send Burgess Whitehead, Cardinal second sacker to the New York Giants in exchange for Pitcher Carl Hubbell.

The American league came in for its share of talk with a rumor that Washington would send Outfielder Heine Manush and Pitcher Jack Russell to the Red Sox; Washington would get Outfielder Ben Chapman and Pitcher Johnny Murphy and Jimmy Doherty from the Yankees, and the Yanks would get Roy Johnson, outfielder, from Boston, and Pitcher Bump Handley and Outfielder Jonathan Stone from Washington.

The minors, with about 650 delegates present, considered about 90 amendments to the national agreement today. Most of them were for the purpose of setting up Judge W. G. Brannham of Durham, N. C., the organization's president, as the "Judge Landis of the Minors."

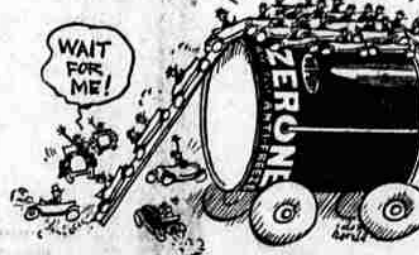
