Big Army Gathers

Officers of the Italian headquarters at Makale said 15,000 to 20,000 Ethiopians were gathering south of Makale and Dolo and may attack soon.

Premier Mussolini of Italy called together the leaders of the nation's fruit and vegetable growers syndicate to plan increased production of their products, as part of his program to increase national production in opposition to league of nations sanctions.

Under a gold monopoly inaugurated yesterday, the national institute for foreign exchange took control of all gold transactions.

France Expresses Hope

In Paris, an authoritative source stated France feels that settlement of the war depends on the fighting of a decisive battle between Italian and Ethiopian forces.

France was understood to have expressed hope of an Italo-Ethiopian peace agreement as soon as possible, in a note replying to Mussolini's protest against league sanctions.

Officials in Cairo announced five persons had died from wounds received in recent anti-British rioting in Egypt, although Egyptian sources claimed at least ten have died.

A dispatch from Harar said Emperor Haile Selassie, whose whereabouts had been kept secret by officials since he left Addis Ababa yesterday by airplane, had passed through Harar in an automobile.

This report stated the emperor was headed in the direction of Dire Dawa, strategic point on the Addis Ababa-Djibouti railroad, about 35 miles southwest of Harar. The latter city is approximately 250 miles almost due east of Addis Ababa.

It was believed by observers in Addis Ababa that the king would visit the headquarters of Itas Nasibu, commander of the Ethiopians on the Somali front. He was also expected to visit hospitals at Jijiga, 75 miles east of Harar.

Harar, Dire Dawa and Jijiga are three principal points toward which the Italian southern army has been reported driving.

Officials at Addis Ababa stated the emperor's planned review of the Ethiopian armies in the north will be postponed for several days.

Ethiopian Fatalities Listed
The Rome government asserted more than 100 Ethiopians were killed in an engagement at Monte Gandi, on the northern front, November 11.

Asmara reports said the Italians in this area were seeking Itas Seyoum, Ethiopian commander in the north.

Some aviators who took part in Monday's battle between Italian planes and Ethiopian land forces, in which the Italian headquarters at Asmara claimed 2000 Ethiopians were killed, said they saw Itas Seyoum fall from his horse, apparently shot. There was no other confirmation of this report.

The Ethiopian government announced it had no official knowledge of the reported killing of 2,000 of its troops.

He would not discuss the statement attributed to Japanese sources that American and English financial policies were responsible for the autonomous movement in north China.

Treasury officials withheld comment on the Tokyo statement that the north China "movement for autonomy" was attributable

to American and British monetary policies.

Treasury officials recalled the American policy growing out of the silver purchase act had resulted in an advance of about 25 cents an ounce since its inauguration November 19, 1934. Silver then was selling around 40 cents.

The silver purchase act directed the treasury to continue buying silver until it reached \$1.29 an ounce or until it reached a ratio where the monetary base consisted of three parts gold to one of silver.

The contrast government of China, on November 3, abandoned the silver standard and replaced it with a "managed paper currency."

Some quarters said this move was hastened by pressure of silver purchases made by the United States under the silver purchase act, which prevented China from maintaining its currency on a stable level.

Internal political disturbances in China in addition to external difficulties with Japan, which induced large transfers of Chinese capital to foreign countries, were held in part responsible for China going on a managed currency basis.

The other car allegedly continued to a point in front of the highway shops.

Collins went to the county jail and reported his car had been hit and stolen and that he had been hit on the head. He told officers he had picked up two men and a woman between Klamath Falls and Merrill, and that he did not remember what happened. Deputy Sheriff Rex McMillan arrested him.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20. (AP)—President Roosevelt, after saying the federal government would allow no person to starve, placed next year's budget at the top of his work schedule today as he made ready to leave on his annual visit to Warm Springs, Ga.

Daniel Bell, director of the budget, and Representative Buchanan of Texas, chairman of the house appropriations committee, have been asked to meet the president at Warm Springs next Monday to go over departmental budget requests and perhaps give some thought to relief before congress meets in January.

It was to both reporters and to a group of American mayors who called on him in the White House later that the chief executive gave his assurances of "no starvation."
