## High School Cast Presents Mystery Play Tuesday

What promises to be one of the best student body plays ever produced by Klamath Union high school will be "Drums of Death," by Howard Reed, to be given Tuesday evening at 8:15 o'clock in the high school auditorium under the direction of B. B. Blomquist.  
Music will be presented by the high school orchestra directed by Harry Borel.  
Players who will appear in the cast are unusually talented, according to Mrs. Blomquist. A large percentage of the student body of K. U. H. S., which numbers over 1,000, entered the try-outs, and only the best were selected.  
Ada Lu Miller will be costume manager for the play; the stage crew, under Harold Teale is building the set, and others assisting in production of "Drums of Death" are: Eugene Grant, electrician, Dean West, drums, and Herbert Rasmussen, advertising manager.  
"Drums of Death" is a mystery play in three acts. The story involves a half-ruined mansion isolated by a desolate lagoon, to which there comes at midnight a group of oddly assorted people. They come in answer to mysterious telegrams; and they find, too late to escape, that some grim plot is back of the telegrams.  
An octogenarian girl, Celeste, goes into strange trances; a hooded figure appears; there is a ghostly suggestion in the air, and across the lagoon comes the ominous beat of muffled drums, creeping nearer and nearer.  
The element of suspense is sustained and the whole performance affords an evening of pleasure and interest to those who attend.
