

STATE RULING BACKS ACTION OF BLACKMER

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authorizing or condemning the collection of unpaid or dishonored checks, or the charging of a fee therefor by a district attorney. There is no provision of our law creating or imposing any duty of that sort upon the district attorney.

"The practice formerly followed by you as district attorney with respect to charging a fee, when amounts due on account of unpaid or dishonored checks were collected, did not involve the performance or the non-performance of official service or duty as district attorney.

"For such reason, such practice, in my opinion, did not constitute malfeasance in office, and, consequently, you would not be liable therefor."

Blackmer said Thursday he might make a statement in a day or two on the matter.

Charges against Blackmer formed one of the most sensational features of the recent grand jury instructions. The grand jury, however, returned a not true bill, which was later disclosed to be in Blackmer's favor. Judge Ashurst then stated that he could not file the not true bill, but would re-submit the matter to the next grand jury to be named next month, and would name a special prosecutor to handle it.

Unexpected rains slowed the advance of Gen. Rudolfo Graziano's Italian southern army, as roads were clogged with mud, delaying the movement of guns, provisions and ammunition.

2000 Deaths Denied Sources close to the emperor said they believed he had issued definite battle orders to Ras Nasibu, Ethiopian southern commander, at Jijiga.

Denial of the Italian report from Amara that 2,000 Ethiopians were killed in a bombardment by Italian planes Monday was made by the Addis Ababa government. Instead, the official communique stated, the Ethiopian commander in the Makale area reported 30 killed and 50 slightly wounded.

Italy continued its efforts to combat league sanctions. It was announced some main avenues in Rome would be darkened to save electricity.

Explaining that the "next result of a large number of treaties is to whittle down the protection to American industries to practically all countries because of the most favored nation agreement," Dill said there would be no question but that damages have been suffered.

WALLACE RAFS CRITICS WASHINGTON, Nov. 21. (AP)—The nation's farmers were urged by Secretary Wallace to ignore those whom he called "enemies of agriculture" attacking the new Canadian-American trade treaty.

Publicly protesting the pact for the second time in as many days, Wallace said in a radio address that it is one of the "most hopeful and helpful things for American agriculture that has happened in a long time."

"When anyone says it is going to harm agriculture, ask him to apply the evidence—all the evidence, and ask him to include in that evidence the general welfare of the whole United States. This Canadian agreement is going to benefit American agriculture as a whole. The agreement is designed to avoid injuring any American producing group, and in my judgment does avoid such injury."
