

CONGRESSMAN IN TULELAKE REGION

TULELAKE, Nov. 21.—Tulelake was fortunate in having Representative Harry L. Englebright of the second California district as its guest Tuesday when the representative was brought to the community by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Baker of Alturas. Mrs. Englebright also was in the party.

Met at the Alturas-Tulelake feeder road junction at 9:30 Tuesday morning by four carloads of Tulelake residents, the party from Alturas was taken to the lease lands and the sump area where they received their first view of the thousands of geese and ducks now resting and feeding there.

From the sump the party came to Tulelake where Carl Gentry, Frank Mosher, Earl Ager and H. R. Wolf escorted Rep. Englebright through the elementary school buildings and where Englebright saw conditions as they existed for himself. In commenting upon the situation, Rep. Englebright complimented teachers and pupils alike in their fortitude in attending school in such crowded and ill-ventilated conditions. He expressed his opinion that while actual allocation of funds for Tulelake's school have not been made that it will be done in the near future and that he would aid in whatever way he could.

Following the school buildings inspection, the party moved to the Mecca where a dinner for 30 was held for the representative who was much impressed with the reception accorded him on short notice. Information that Baker and Englebright would be in Tulelake was received by the Community club in their meeting Monday night at about 10 o'clock and arrangements were immediately made for his reception.

Earl Ager presided at the noon dinner and introduced Carl Gentry who made the welcoming address and outlined to the gathering some of the subjects which were taken up with the congressman. These ranged from streets, roads, school buildings, sump waters and city water to incorporation of the town.

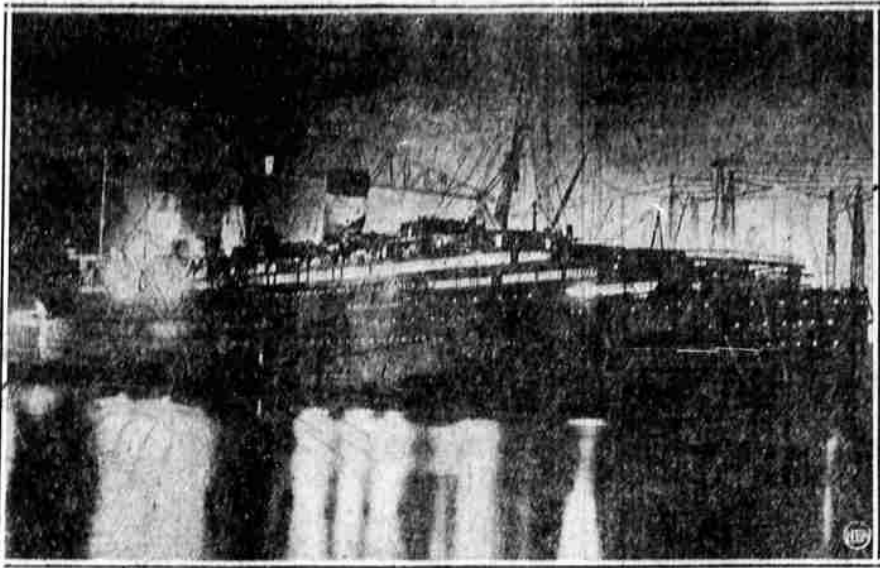
In his address to the gathering Rep. Englebright said: "I consider this to be the outstanding irrigation project that the government has ever opened. Its residents are of a different type than those to be found on old fashioned land areas. The Tulelake project has developed faster than any other irrigation district and is proving to be more stable than many others which are much older and more settled.

"You are in need of two things of vital necessity in your community which will do much for its growth. One of these is good water. Another is schools. I understand that steps are to be taken soon which undoubtedly will lead to securing of the water. As to the school, that will for the present have to wait until further allocations of funds are made which will include your classification, according to the information I have. I believe you need have no fear that you will not receive the money, however."

Representative Englebright thanked the citizens for the cordial reception given him and for the assistance he had received from many of them on business pertaining to this portion of his district which has been of direct benefit to him.

From Tulelake Rep. Englebright was to go to Susanville for a gathering Tuesday night. He stated that if possible he would return to Tulelake on December 7 for the annual Legion goose bake.

Jury Convicts Indian Woman On Wednesday

Lottie Clarkson Wilson, Indian, stood convicted last night on a disorderly conduct charge involving an attack on Wade Crawford, superintendent of the Klamath reservation.

The justice court jury which brought in the verdict recommended leniency by parole. Sentence was to be passed at 10 o'clock this morning.

Trial of the case required a full day's court session Wednesday. State's witnesses, headed by Crawford, the complainant, asserted that Mrs. Wilson had made an unprovoked assault on the superintendent in the Agency administration building, September 7, seizing him by the neck as if to choke him.

Defense, pleading not guilty, contended Mrs. Wilson had attacked the reservation chief only as a defense measure after Crawford had first unseated her. A long string of defense witnesses supported Mrs. Wilson's claims.

Jurors on the case were Frank Andrews, Chris Blanas, Artlett C. Edsall, B. F. Hogue, W. W. Denart and Ernest C. Stucky.

The case was tried in justice court here on a change of venue from Chiloquin. Loyd DeLap presided instead of Justice W. B. Barnes as DeLap had ruled on a reoccurring in connection with the case.

TULELAKE, Nov. 21.—A trio of hunters was arrested on Willamette creek, 14 miles south of the California-Oregon state line this week and two of them received \$50 fines, and one a \$25 fine, together with confiscation of their guns for hunting ducks out of season, and lack of hunting licenses.

Those arrested were Kenneth Davidson, Pine Ridge; Jack Cessman and Francis Beard, both of Modoc Point, Davidson and Beard drew the \$50 fines. Game officials state that this is Cessman's second arrest this year, the first being by an Oregon officer for violation of the Oregon fishing laws.

The confiscated guns will be held for auction at some future date, according to California regulations.
