

Old Fort, Sons of Italy Win Opening Games

CITY LEAGUE PLAY STARTS

Lost River, Balsiger Defeated in First Games At Armory.

Old Fort and the Sons of Italy have to the front as City league basketball championship contenders Thursday night when they scored victories in the opening doubleheader at the armory.

Old Fort piled up a 42 to 22 margin against Lost River, while the Sons of Italy posted out a stubborn Balsiger quintet, 19 to 17.

Approximately 100 persons saw the contests. The success of the league, operating under the city recreational director, Carl Cook, will depend to a great extent upon public support. The organization has considerable expenses to meet, and what profit is made, if any, will be turned over to further the recreational program.

Old Fort's victory was something of an upset. Following its victory over Bonanza CCC, Lost River was considered a pre-game favorite. Dursaha, forward for Old Fort, loomed in seven field goals to tally 14 points.

The second contest was the thriller of the two. Balsiger entered the last period on the short end of a 13 to 9 score. Four Balsiger field goals while the Sons were sinking two brought the teams on even terms.

The Sons clinched the battle with two free throws.

League play will continue next Wednesday. The Knights of Columbus will meet the Bonanza CCC and Waldorf will tackle the Macabees.

State Angling Conditions Show Improvements

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 22. (AP)—State game commission reports showed angling materially improved in Oregon the past week. Good catches of sea-run cutthroat, jack salmon and silver-steeles, as well as a few early steelhead were reported.

Streams are low and clear along the coast, it was reported. Trout fishing has been excellent in the north fork of the Siuslaw in tidewater and in Tahkenth, Siltcoos and Mercer lakes. F. E. Hewitt, secretary of the Siuslaw Rod and Gun club advised. Some bass have responded and ocean fishing has been good where the water is not too rough.

The salmon run is on at Ten Mile lake in Coos county, and trout angling at tidewater is good in Curry county, it was reported.

The Rogue river, it was reported, has been a bit muddy for angling, but other streams of the vicinity have been better.

Rex Mobley, Star of Three Years Ago, to Return

Inability of Tiger Taskoff, the Bulgarian, to come to Klamath Falls next Tuesday for a match with Pete Belcastro has opened the way for the return of Rex Mobley, grappling star of three years ago.

Mobley, an Alabamian, will enter the armory ring against Belcastro, junior heavyweight champion of the coast, in a 60-minute clash under the Australian round system.

The southerner competed here when Mack Lillard, promoter, was first assigned to the job of bringing wrestling and boxing to the old Legion hall. Mobley's best-

remembered match was with Yaqui Joe, the Indian.

PASADENA GRID BARRIERS DOWN

Coast Winner Willing to Meet Team From Any Section.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 22. (AP)—California or Stanford, if either gets the Rose Bowl bid through victory in the "big game" tomorrow at Palo Alto, are willing to let down the bars of so-called sectionalism and take on any football team in the country.

This statement, expressed today by the rival coaches, is the first official revelation that parties which may be most interested hold no brief for precedence which has always called for a visiting team from east of the Mississippi river.

Texas Teams Apply

The field, so far as the coaches are concerned, is thrown wide open. It can be either of the two strong Texas universities, Southern Methodist or Texas Christian, as well as the presently unbeaten Dartmouth, team, Stanford, if victorious, might even be willing to take on the University of California at Los Angeles, to try to even up the only defeat which mars its record.

This, however, is merely supposition.

Hitherto Coach Leonard "Stub" Allison of California has been unwilling to talk of Rose Bowl competition while 90,000 fans are tuning up their vocal cords for the most important clash of the regular season. He yielded to say: "If we're lucky enough to get the Rose Bowl, we don't care which team we play. The location of the school won't mean a thing."

Win or Lose for Cal

Similar sentiments were echoed by Coach Claude "Tiny" Thornhill, whose Stanford team has played and lost the last two Rose Bowl engagements. "If either Southern Methodist or Texas Christian turns out to be the best team in the country, I don't see why we can't play them," he said. "Of course we have to get back to the Rose Bowl first."

University of California already has come out flat-footed in the belief it should be named the western choice, whether it loses or ties Stanford. Graduate Manager W. W. Monahan issued the following statement yesterday:

"If California wins or ties the big game Saturday it is logical to believe that our selection as the west's representative will be purely a formality as far as the Southern Methodist conference is concerned."

"If Stanford wins we will still feel that our record for the season entitles us to utmost consideration in the vote of the conference next Monday. California has won nine straight games, engaging in a schedule which is regarded generally as being the most exacting on the Pacific coast. The record includes victories over two major non-conference opponents, St. Mary's and Santa Clara and four major conference teams, Oregon, U. C. L. A., Southern California and Washington."

Oregon State's starting lineup Saturday will be Casserly and Joslin, ends; Miller and Fisher, tackles; McClung and Strack, guards; Dornier, center; Duncan, quarter; Gray and Swanson, halves, and Kolberg, full.

St. Stephens Wins Catholic Title

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 22. (AP)—St. Stephens high upset the Columbia Preps for the Portland Catholic football championship last night in one of the wildest scoring sprees of the season.

The lead flitted back and forth, with touchdowns coming on a Statue of Liberty play, a pass good for 65 yards, an intercepted pass, a blocked punt and a 55-yard dash with the bounding ball, a lateral pass, and a center smash following another blocked punt.

It was the first St. Stephens victory in five years.
