

GOVERNMENT ADVISED ON PACT EFFECT

President Roosevelt and department of state officials were fully advised of the "results to the northwest of lowered protection on lumber" long before the recent Canadian trade treaty was completed. It was stated in a telegram received by the Klamath Box company Friday from Senator Frederick Steiwer.

The local company wired Steiwer urging him to continue his fight for protection of northwest lumber and warned against detrimental effects of the treaty.

"Negotiations for Canadian trade agreement were under way for approximately a year and there were early indications reduction on protection afforded our domestic lumber industry were involved," said Steiwer's telegram in reply.

"I earnestly and continuously opposed such reductions and appeared before departmental committees and commissions. I appealed to president and secretary of state. I know these officials are fully advised of results to northwest of lowered protection on lumber. I appreciate information contained in your wire and believe it is needless to add that you may depend upon my continued efforts."
