

Stanford Favored Choice for Rose Bowl Game

BIG RED TEAM NEEDS 6 VOTES

Cardinals Have Backing Over Bears, Bruins; Ballot Due Today

The Associated Press reported this afternoon that Stanford had been named as the west's representative in the Rose Bowl game. Story on page 1.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 25. (AP)—Announcement that Stanford has been selected to represent the west in the annual Rose Bowl football game was expected today when the ballots of the Pacific Coast conference are counted.

Votes of the 10 members were due in the office of Prof. Hugh C. Willette, conference chairman, by noon with California and the University of California at Los Angeles, who are tied with Coach Claude Thornhill's team for the title, also figuring in Rose Bowl picture.

Six Votes Needed
But on the basis of Stanford's 13 to 0 triumph over California's Golden Bears Saturday, it appeared that the six votes necessary would be in favor of the big red team that has answered the call and lost in the last two years.

While the balloting was handled by telegraph in code Wednesday, it was generally agreed that Stanford, beaten only by U.C.L.A. this season, had the strongest backing of the three.

California, anxious to get the bid in spite of the fact that it suffered its first defeat of the season on Saturday, was by no means out of the running. U.C.L.A. on the other hand hardly was expected to get more than its own vote in the matter as a result of its defeat by the Bears and the ineligibility of Ted Key, who figured in three conference victories.

Opponent Problem Difficult
While the western half of the knotty Rose Bowl problem will be untangled today, the country probably will be forced to wait until next Saturday, or later, for the selection of the opposing team in the January 1 classic at Pasadena.

Stanford, if it is invited, has indicated its desire to play an undefeated team and these had become increasingly scarce today. Of the eligibles Southern Methodist, Texas Christian and New York university stood out and at least one of these was expected to be missing by Saturday since the two Texas teams meet at Fort Worth to decide the Southwest championship. The eastern team also stands in the chance of disappearing from the picture since N.Y.U. meets its toughest rival, Fordham, on Thanksgiving afternoon.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25. (AP)—A double dose of competition this week will settle most of the remaining sectional arguments stirred up by a renewed football campaign, but the biggest dispute of all never will be settled to everyone's satisfaction.

The list of national championship contenders—just about as mythical as the championship itself—consists today of Minnesota, Princeton, Southern Methodist, Texas Christian and New York university. If it must be limited to teams neither beaten nor tied.

Gophers Gain Title
If not, such outfits as Louisiana State, Alabama, Holy Cross and Stanford, for instance, can be tossed into the reckoning. Minnesota, unbeaten in 24 games over three seasons, has wound up competition for the year and thus rests its championship case on its 1935 record of eight successive triumphs. Princeton, apparently, is certain to wind up with a perfect record, and so too, it seems, will either Texas Christian or Southern Methodist, depending on which wins their crucial duel this week.

Violets Meet Rams
N. Y. U. is conceded scarcely a chance to get past Fordham but if the Violets win, they will have some part in any argument over national honors.

The Rose Bowl at Pasadena New Year's day may eliminate one of the remaining contenders, but there seems to be no real hope that a generally acceptable champion can be settled on.

Six Junior Heavies Assure Speedy Armory Program

Six wrestlers, each listed in the junior heavyweight division, assure Klamath Falls of a fast, pre-Thanksgiving grappling card at the armory Tuesday night. Not one of the half dozen competitors will weigh more than 190 pounds.

Bearcats Must Defeat Whitman To Avoid Tie

Whitman's Missionaries and the Willamette Bearcats will wind up the Northwest conference grid schedule at Walla Walla Saturday in a contest that the Bearcats must win if they want sole possession of the league crown.

The game will mark the final appearance of dynamic Johnny Graves, as a college gridman. The sensational little halfback, who scored more touchdowns last season than any other player in the nation, has seen action in every Willamette game during the last four years, and will bow himself out of the grid picture against an outfit that has yielded only 12 points thus far in the 1935 campaign.

Only a single conference game was played last week-end. Pacific chalking up a 6-0 decision over the College of Puget Sound Loggers. Albany and Linfield, however, took on non-conference opponents, and both finished on the long end of the score, the former dishing out a 40-0 pasting to Oregon Tech, and Linfield beating Monmouth normal 29-7. Willamette also saw action in a game against a team composed of Bearcat alumni and decided the oldsters, 7-0.

FOOTBALL ROUNDUP
MISSOULA, Mont., Nov. 25. (UP)—Montana University salvaged a remnant of prestige from a dolorous season conference season Saturday by holding the heavier Oregon State eleven to a scoreless game.

The teams ended their conference seasons on muddy Dornblaser field which before the game was swept clear of light snow that had fallen intermittently during the preceding 14 hours, and before a crowd of 4,000.

Staters Over-Confident
Oregon State, en route to Lincoln, Neb., to play the Nebraska Cornhuskers on Thanksgiving day, appeared over-confident and unable to organize its offense.

Montana used only two subs. The Grizzly backfielders, Seakash, Popovich and Blastic, matched the performances of Gray, Mountain and Kolberg, the Bearcats' sparkling sophomores.

U.C.L.A. BATTLES TO DEFEAT LOYOLA
MEMORIAL STADIUM, Los Angeles, Nov. 25. (UP)—University of California at Los Angeles turned in a 14 to 6 football win here Saturday against a Loyola (L. A.) eleven which contested every inch of the way and came within grasp of victory.

Heavily favored, the UCLA players found themselves forced to turn back the inspired Loyola team. Twice Loyola drove unsuccessfully to the Bruin five yard line and on another march

got to the 20 before a pass interception foiled them.

PASSES DOWNFALL OF RICE OWLS
FORT WORTH, Tex., Nov. 25. (UP)—Twenty thousand Texas Christian University fans were not only talking but literally shouting "Rose Bowl" Saturday after the TCU football machine rolled relentlessly over a helpless Rice Institute team. The score was 27 to 6.

Sam Baugh passed the Rice Owls dizzy and Lawrence and Meyer gave a great exhibition of being there to receive the passes.

SOUTHERN METHODIST KEEPS IN RUNNING
DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 25. (UP)—Fighting a stubborn Baylor team through three scoreless periods, Southern Methodist University emerged with a 10 to 0 victory Saturday to remain undefeated for the season.

Maurice Orr, Mustang right tackle, who kicked the field goal which jolted the Ponies out of their non-scoring doldrums at the start of the fourth period, was given an ovation as he left the field.

True to their reputation, the Mustangs' only touchdown was scored on a pass from Bobby Wilson, the Methodists' flashy left half, to J. R. (Jackrabbit) Smith, over the goal line. Orr converted with a placement kick.

CARDS DEFEAT BEARS, 13 TO 0

Two Touchdowns in First Quarter Decide Annual "Big Game"

STANFORD STADIUM, Calif., Nov. 25. (UP)—Powered by eight "vowing seniors" in a crushing offensive team, Stanford humbled University of California 13 to 0 Saturday to regain its Rose Bowl hopes and a tie for the Pacific Coast conference title.

The victory gave the Cardinals a tie with California, previously unbeaten and untied, and University of California at Los Angeles for the conference championship.

90,000 See Game
Ninety thousand berserk fans watched the Stanford team rise to magnificent heights pushing over two touchdowns in the first quarter after being rushed into the shadows of its own goal posts.

The Golden Bears, driving in after Tackle Larry Lutz recovered a fumble by Jimmy Coffis, Stanford safety, passed and slashed their way to the Indians 13 within the first five minutes of play.

Field Goal Misses
Then Right End Henry Sparks, big sophomore getting his baptism of fire as substitute for injured Jack Brittingham, tried a field goal from a sharp angle. The ball sailed low and wide of the uprights.

Bobby Grayson, all-American fullback, crashed 25 yards from his own 30 on the next play. The Stanford march was on. In exactly 5 plays the Indians marched to the Bears 19. Then Robert "Bones" Hamilton and Grayson teamed to carry the leather in seven plays to the 2-yard line.

Grayson Scores
With one tremendous lunge Grayson smashed through the California line and over the goal line. End Jim "Monk" Moscrip's try for the extra point was good.

The score climaxed an 80-yard march in which the Stanford backs sifted through the Bear line and secondary almost at will.

Demoralized by this sudden reversal the Bears lost the ball on their own 30 a minute later when Quarterback John Meek fumbled and big Wes Muller, Stanford center, recovered. Grayson passed to Coffis, who lateraled to sophomore Quarterback Bill Paulman to take the ball to the Bears 12. Coffis grabbed a reverse from Grayson and spun over the goal line on the following play to decide the contest.

Scoring Punch Lacking
Moscrip missed the try for extra point.

Five times in the game the Bears passed and punched their way within Stanford's 20-yard line. Once they hurried seven forward passes in a desperate thrust—only to have Stanford's lineemen and secondary bunt receivers out of the play, or ride them out of line for any possible attempt to take the ball.

The eight vowing seniors, who started three years ago with a brave oath that they would never take defeat from U.S.C.—or any other team if they could help it, showed their tremendous power time and again.

Seniors Perform Brilliantly
Grayson, Hamilton, Moscrip, Muller, Keith, Topping, Larry Roubie, Woody Adams, Bob Reynolds—their's was the victory. Sluggish in their showing prior to today's game, ragged at times, outthought by certain teams—they snapped back Saturday to exert pressure that ground California into the ground and probably out of the Rose Bowl picture despite nine straight victories.

Western Reserve Fullback Leading Nation's Scorers
NEW YORK, Nov. 25. (UP)—High scoring honors for the 1935 football season apparently rest with Ray Zeh, Western Reserve fullback who has amassed 112 points by 15 touchdowns and 22 points after touchdowns.

Zeh has another chance to boost his total when Western Reserve plays Case this week. His nearest competitor, Eddie Stanley of Williams, hung up his moleskins a week ago Saturday after having registered 16 touchdowns for 96 points.

The sectional and conference leaders remained in the same positions they held a week ago. The only change was in the Pacific coast standing where Chesapeake of the University of California at Los Angeles moved in to a tie with Gray of Oregon State, each with 42 points.

Oily Waters Kill New England Ducks
NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 25. (AP)—Survivors of a flock of broadbill ducks, rendered helpless by the oily waters of New Haven harbor, floated with the wind and tide in Long Island sound today. Many already had died.

The birds were trapped Saturday when they alighted in the harbor here on water covered by crude oil pumped out of a sunken barge earlier in the week. The ducks' feathers rapidly absorbed the sticky substance and they were unable to fly.

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OREGON VICTOR OVER HUSKIES

7-6 Margin Gives Ducks Surprising Win Against Washington

WASHINGTON STADIUM, Seattle, Nov. 25. (UP)—A stunning upset in an already top-heavy football year was witnessed by 22,000 spectators Saturday when the Oregon Webfoot defeated the Washington Huskies, 7 to 6, under leaden, rain-laden skies.

Winfred Pepper's successful conversion after Oregon's first period touchdown drive was the margin of victory in a smashing, hard-socking game between the old and friendly rivals.

Field Goal Missed
Late in the third period Washington drove to Oregon's 14-yard line. Quarterback Elmer Logg, dropped back for a field goal attempt from an angle. He met the ball squarely, but it hit an upright and bounded into the end zone. Had it been a few inches the other way, it would have given the Huskies their expected win.

LOGG also missed a try for point after Washington's touchdown and a second field goal attempt in the fourth period was also wide of the uprights.

Michiek Hurt
Oregon's running attack functioned immediately after Washington kicked off at the start of the game. The Webfoot got the ball on Washington's 30-yard line after an exchange of punts between Rioridan, Oregon end, and Logg. Halfback Bradlock, one of the strongest runners in the game, made eight yards and Fullback Frank Michiek drove hard for five more yards and first down on Husky 17-yard line.

Michiek injured his left knee on the play and the Oregon rooters groaned as he was carried off the field. Jerry Donnell of Monrovia, Calif., replaced Michiek. Goodlin, Bradlock and Donnell made a first down in three plays, taking the ball to the five-yard line. Bradlock smacked to within six inches of a touchdown on the next play. Donnell immediately carried the ball over left guard for a touchdown. Pepper, kick-kicking expert, replaced Right Guard Codling, and kicked the winning point.

Huskies Penalized
Washington had been on the defensive up until this time, but Haines took the Huskies into Oregon territory when he returned one of Rioridan's punts 50 yards to Oregon's 25. The Huskies, however, were caught clipping, and were penalized 15 yards to Oregon's 40.

It took Washington only three plays from that point to get a touchdown. Fritz Waskowitz, the Huskies' best passer, picked one to Captain Dan Lazarevich

for a first down on Oregon's 21-yard line. Haines made two at left guard. Waskowitz, aided by fine blocking, faked back and then passed 25 yards to Haines, who caught the ball in the end zone for a touchdown.

Long—usually sure of a try for point—missed the uprights and it meant defeat for Washington.

The Huskies' third period drive appeared as if it were headed for a touchdown when Novogroski and Waskowitz ripped off 10 yards at a clip on reverses.

Rioridan Wins Duel
The attack was finally halted on the 14-yard line and Logg's try for a field goal went flush into the face of an upright.

The heralded kicking duel between Rioridan of Oregon and Logg of Washington was won by the Oregon end, who averaged 40 to 23 yards on nine punts. Logg averaged 32 yards on seven kicks.

Washington made 10 first downs to seven for Oregon. Oregon made 128 yards from scrimmage against 93 for the Huskies.

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
